### THE MOTORIZED HOBO.

The Far West has been observing for some time a remarkable social transformation. This is the disappearance of the hobo who beat his way over mountain and desert and plain upon the freight trains and the rise in his place of a kind of hobo who travels in his own automobile.

This modern hobo—there is a distinction between him and the tramp—is not altogether unwelcome in the communities he visits, though too many of him excites uneasiness. He despises such prosaic work as digging or plowing or laboring in the harvest fields or pounding ballast on the railroad. But he loves to tinker with the innards of motor cars and, by reason of experience with his own weird machine, he has developed a rare adeptness. So as he journeys upon his erratic way he serves the countryside as a superior doctor in the stranger diseases of automobiles.

His wants are the fewest and simplest, as become a child of nature. 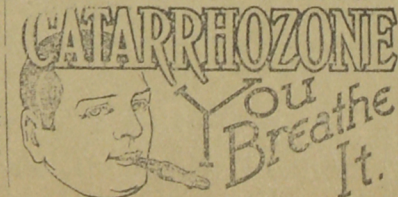

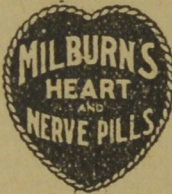
