### CONFERENCE RULES CALL FOR PLAYOFF

**No Doubt About Meaning of Provisions—Cases Existing in Two Sections are Fully Covered.**

In view of the fact that the statement as appeared in the press that University of New Brunswick was laying claim to the Western Intercollegiate title because having the lowest number of goals scored against it, it would not be amiss to publish extracts of the minutes of the proceedings of the annual meeting, which was held in the Stanley House, Truro, N. S., October 6th, last.

Motions concerning the existing situation in the Western Hockey Section were adopted as follows:—"That in a three-cornered tie the team with the greatest number of points wins."

"Note—Matter is dropped if all teams have same score in three-cornered tie."

"Note—Two cornered tie means tie in points in a three-cornered tie in games, the teams play off."

"That in a two-cornered tie the two teams play off."

"Note—Two cornered tie means that two teams have defeated the third."

"That in case of a play-off as covered by above rules, one team through any reason whatsoever defaults, the other team shall be declared the winner."

### INTERNATIONAL COLLEGE HOCKEY TITLE AT STAKE

**Dartmouth Will Tackle Toronto University at New York Thursday—Toronto Team is Strong.**

Toronto, Feb. 22—University of Toronto and Dartmouth will meet in an international sudden-death game at New York, Thursday night, with the North American college title at stake. A valuable cup has been presented for this event and keen interest is being taken in the game by the fans in New York.

Coach "Conny" Smythe had his players out for a practice at the Arena Gardens and they were going great guns. Dave Trotter has been placed at left wing, and the regular firing line will be composed of Louis Hudson, Hughey Plaxton and Trotter. Kirkpatrick, Devins and Richards will do the relief work. "Red" Porter and Ned Wright on the defense and Joe Sullivan in goal will compete one of the strongest U. of T. teams in years.

The oca students are fast and clever and they are exceptionally good goal-getters. Hughey Plaxton is setting the pace, and he generally manages to bulge the twine two or three times in every game. There is no trickier attacker than the former U. T. S. player. Built somewhat after the lines of Nelson Stewart, the great Montreal Maroon centre man, Plaxton seems to be just as effective.

Trotter is brilliant in all departments. He is the artist type of player a finished product. He lacks the fine fake passing and shooting that characterizes Plaxton's play, but he is faster and a great stick handler. On right wing Hudson will out-skate any opponent sent against him, and he will also get goals. Hudson who is captain of the team, is just as effective as he ever was and the fans know that this player has been a star for years.

Wright supplies the experience and Porter the speed on the defense, while Joe Sullivan rates with the best net guardians in senior hockey.

If Dartmouth defeats this team they will have accomplished a feat that will go a long way toward bringing about international contests for supremacy. The locals realize that much is expected of them and they will endeavor to show United States fans that hockey in this country is still far in advance of the Uncle Sam brand.

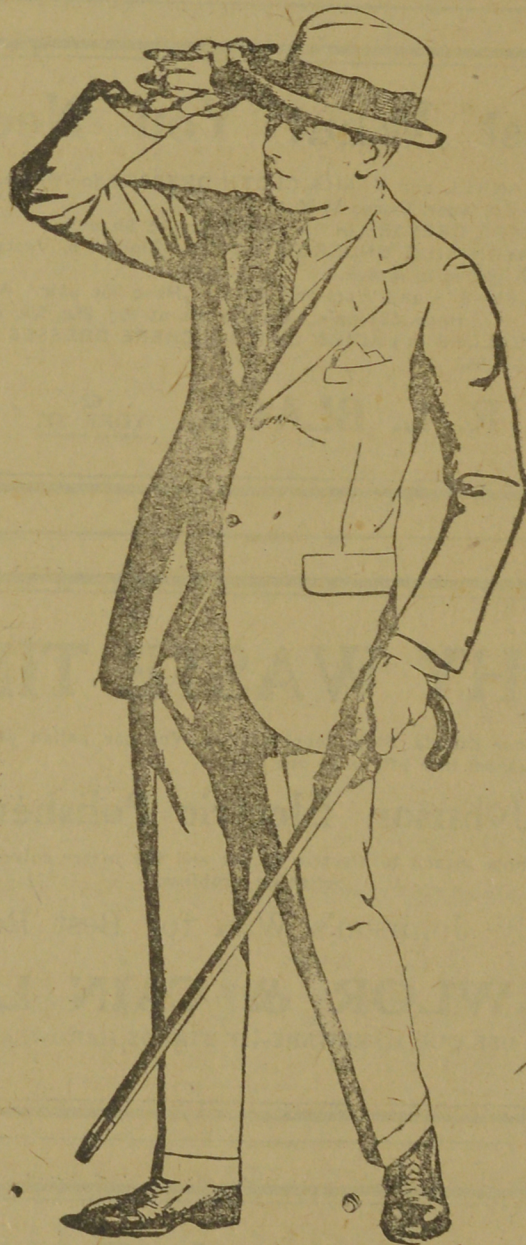

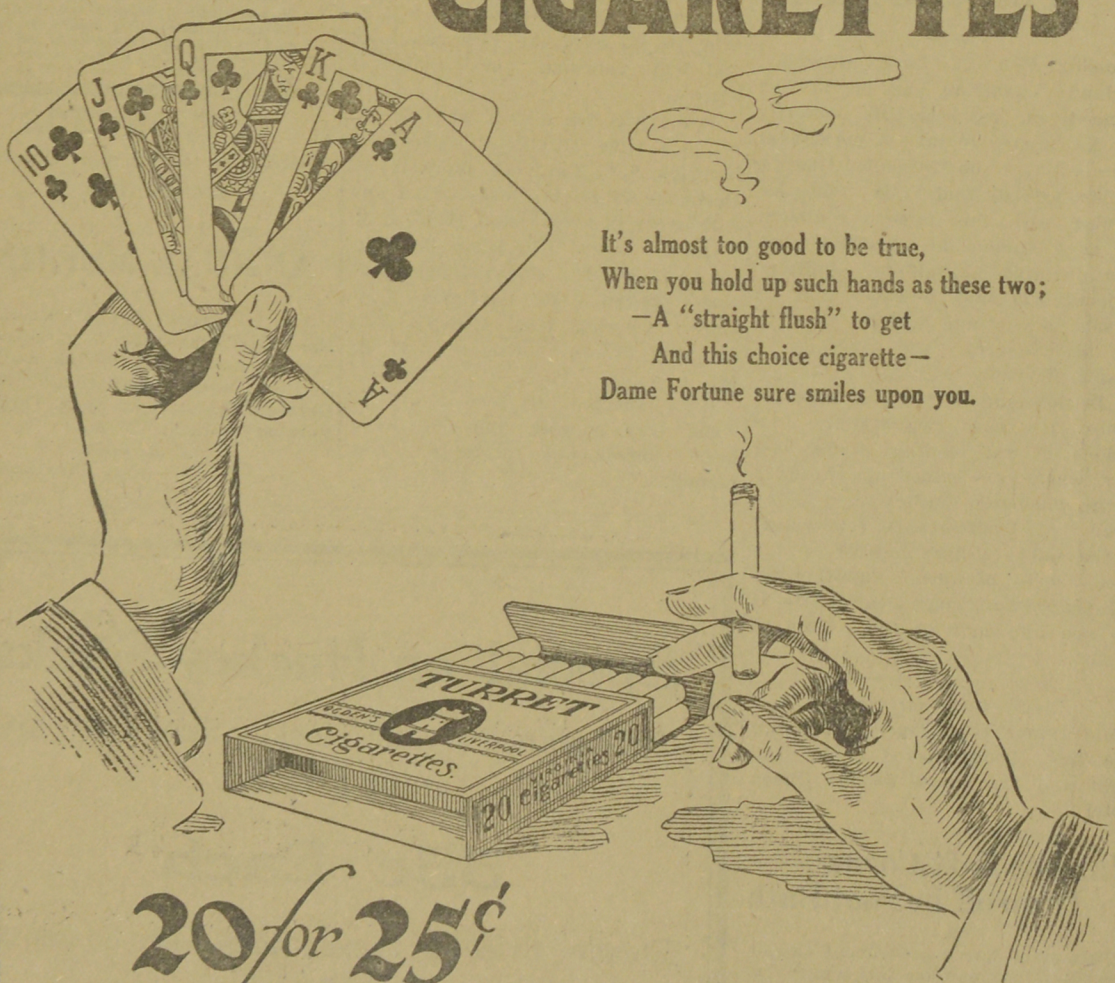
