

THREE DECREES OF DIVORCE ARE ORDERED TODAY

March 16th Named for Further Hearing in McIntosh vs McIntosh — Camick Case Dismissed by Court.

Mr. Justice Crocket in the New Brunswick Divorce Court this morning ordered decrees of divorce to issue in three actions and set March 16th as the date for further hearing the case of McIntosh vs. McIntosh, in which the plaintiff wife is in England and the defendant husband in Hartland. Another action was dismissed, R. W. McLellan appearing for the plaintiff in the McIntosh case made application for further adjournment stating that the commission under which evidence was being taken in England had not yet been returned through illness of the plaintiff.

W. P. Jones, K. C., appearing for the defendant in the same case objected that it had been two and a half years since action had been begun and he thought the commission might well be discharged.

Mr. Justice Crocket replied that under the circumstances he would grant adjournment and named March 16th.

Three Decrees Ordered

Court then proceeded to judgments. In the case of Eleanor Ada Garland vs Alfred Absolom Garland, a decree was ordered to issue. This action was from Moncton and was defended. Infidelity was alleged.

In the case of William D. Robinson vs. Agnes D. Robinson a decree was ordered to issue. In this action the plaintiff husband resides in St. Stephen and the defendant wife in Grotton, Mass. Impotence was alleged as ground for divorce. The case was undefended.

In the case of Frederick Thomas Stewart vs. Letitia Stewart, a decree was ordered to issue. The parties in the case reside in Saint John and are colored. Infidelity was alleged.

Action Dismissed

In the case of Gertrude A. Camick, court commented upon the evidence as extraordinary and unconvincing. The dismissal of the case was ordered. In this action the plaintiff resides at Mispic and the defendant in Saint John. Infidelity was alleged.

POOR WATER PRESSURE WHEN RESIDENCE OF WALTER P. FENETY, UNIVERSITY AVE., IS GUTTED

Fire Chief Says Pressure so Weak in Attic of the House it Had Hardly Any Effect — Loss is About \$6,000 with \$ 3,500 Insurance — Occupants Had to Leave House Hurriedly—Some of Contents Lost — University Students Roomed There.

The residence of Walter P. Fenety, 317 University Avenue, was gutted by fire early this morning and part of the roof burned off the building. Mr. Fenety who is in the Federal Immigration Service is located in Saint John and was summoned by telephone this morning. His wife and family resided in the damaged residence. A number of students of the University of New Brunswick had rooms there.

The fire seems to have originated in the cellar possibly from the furnace. One of the occupants smelled smoke early in the morning but found nothing wrong. Later he was awakened by fire roaring in the partitions.

The loss on the property and contents is estimated at \$6,000. Insurance amounted to \$3,500 of which \$500 was on the furniture.

Water Pressure Very Poor.

Fire Chief Roy W. Smith when asked today concerning the reports that the water pressure was poor while the fire was fought said that such was the case. In the third-story attic of the house where streams were led to drown out the fire in the partitions, the streams were so weak that they had practically no effect on the blaze. Driver Melvin Bearisto, said Chief Smith, telephoned the Pumping Station during the fire and was told that the gauges showed ninety pounds of pressure there.

Reduction Somewhere.

Under the circumstances there was a reduction of pressure somewhere between the pumps and the fire. The pressure at fires in that section of the city on former occasions has been satisfactory according to Chief Smith.

University Students Routed.

A number of students of the University of New Brunswick occupied rooms in the damaged house. They were forced to leave in a hurry and some lost some of their belongings. One refused to leave the house until he

Little Fire in Sight.

The fire apparatus made a quick response to the alarm which was rung in from box 54. Two streams soon were laid and although weak did the work after a long time. It was three hours before the "all out" signal was given. Little fire was in sight when the firemen arrived but the streams were taken into the cellar. Later they were used in the upper part of the building. The fire had eaten its way all through the structure with the final result that it was seriously damaged. In the late stages the flames showed through the roof.

Much of the furniture of the house was removed safely but it was impossible to reach some parts of the house.

The fact that the thermometer was below zero made the incident all the more unpleasant for those who had to turn out so quickly. The work of fire-fighting also was carried on under a disadvantage.

Leaving for New York.

Mr. Edgar C. MacDonald will leave this evening for New York, having been called there by word of the illness of his daughter Miss Helen MacDonald a student nurse. The condition of Miss MacDonald is reported to be very serious.

Train Killed Bull Moose.

A fine big bull-moose was killed on the main line of the C. P. R. not far from Tracey by the McAdam train Monday night. The animal was on the right-of-way and the snow had been ploughed into high banks which prevented the moose from climbing out. Had it pressed to one side the train could have passed but the bull evidently became frightened.
