SOME POLITICAL HISTORY.

Mr. Frederic Yorton, editor of the Montreal Standard, contributes an illuminating article to his paper on the political career of Right Hon. W. S. Fielding, ex-Minister of Finance, who recently observed his 78th birthday. Mr. Yorton's article while it does full justice to Right Hon. Mr. Fielding, is not strictly accurate when it refers to Mr. H. J. Logan, ex-M. P. for Cumberland, N. S., as "the conqueror of Sir Charles Tupper". As a native of Nova Scotia and a son of a once prominent Liberal politician, Mr. Yorton should know that Sir Charles Tupper, during his long political career extending over a period of nearly half a century, only met defeat at the polls on one occasion, and that was in 1900 when as leader of the Conservative party he and a colleague, appealing for re-election in the then double constituency of Cape Breton, N. S., were defeated by Dr. Kendall and the present Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Mr. Alex. Johnston. Mr. Logan was a boy candidate in the Federal election of 1896 in Cumberland, N. S., but his unsuccessful opponent on that occasion was the late Hon. A. R. Dickey, who was Minister of Justice in the cabinet of Sir Charles Tupper. The veteran Sir Charles had represented Cumberland for thirty years in the Legislature of Nova Scotia and Parliament of Canada, but his last election in that constituency was in the year 1888. He was elected in the previous year while holding the portfolio of Finance in the government of Sir John Macdonald, but a petition being filed against him he resigned and was re-elected. Soon afterwards he again resigned to resume his duties as Canadian High Commissioner in Great Britain. He returned to Canada and took over the Premiership in 1896 and was elected by acclamation in Cape Breton. It was on his appeal for re-election in that constituency after the dissolution of the House under his Premiership that he met with his only personal defeat. As before stated Sir Charles represented Cumberland for thirty years without a break, and it might be added here that Mr. Logan was the only Liberal who ever had the honor of representing that historic constituency in the Federal Parliament.

Many friends in this city and throughout the province will regret exceedingly to learn of the death at Saint John yesterday of Mr. Frank B. Ellis, for many years editor and chief proprietor of the Saint John Globe. Mr. Ellis recently disposed of his interest in the Globe and had planned to spend the winter abroad, but failing health compelled him to abandon the trip. The late Mr. Ellis was undoubtedly one of the best if not the best all round newspaper men in the province. He had a wonderful capacity for work and was ever loyal to his native city and province and their best interests. His death is a distinct loss to journalism in New Brunswick.

What gives promise of being an important session of Parliament was begun at Ottawa this afternoon when the House met and unanimously elected Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux to the Speakership. It is expected that the House will sit about a fortnight and then adjourn until some time in January. The most important business will be the voting of supply and the re-enactment of legislation which went by the board when the House was suddenly dissolved in July last. A further reduction in taxation has been promised and it is to be hoped that this promise will be implemented by legislation.

Dr. R. G. Reynolds, Columbia university, knows his business when he says parents need to be educated as well as pupils. They ought to be taught to appreciate higher educational standards. Lack of sympathy on the part of parents with what the schools are trying to do is one of the big handicaps in the effort toward the spread of education. Teachers, to do good work, need the sympathy and understanding of parents. Many parents are out of sympathy with what the schools are trying to do. The best that can be said for most parents is that they are indifferent.

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux who was re-elected to the Speakership of the House of Commons this afternoon is recognized as the dean of the House. He was first elected to Parliament in 1896 for the constituency of Gaspe,

Quebec and has been a member continuously for more than thirty years. He is an able man, a fluent speaker in both languages, exceedingly well informed on parliamentary practice and has presided over the deliberations of the House with dignity and impartiality.

Friends of Mr. John F. Rogers are heartily congratulating him on his appointment to the staff of the Provincial Normal School during the absence of Principal Bridges. As principal of the Model School here for many years Mr. Rogers earned the reputation of being one of the most efficient and painstaking teachers in the Province. The educational department was fortunate in securing his services to act during the absence of Dr. Bridges.

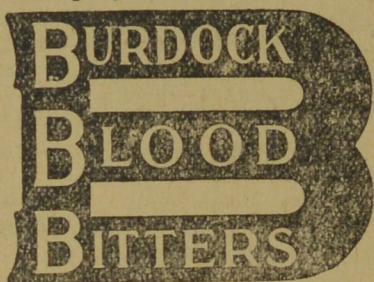
