GOLFERS WILL DECLARE WAR ON GRUBS AND WORMS

Poisoning Surface of Soil is Suggested—Possible to Have Grass Without Worms Beneath.

Chicago, Jan. 11—Death to worms and life to grass formed the text of discussion at the annual meeting of the United States Golf Association delegates listening to experts in eradication and cultivation. The business sessions open tomorrow.

Although for every one of the millions of golfers there must be a million blades of grass, play would become ideal only by the extirpation of at least a quintillion of slugs and earth worms, speakers from the Federal Department of Agriculture and in the employment of the association said.

After O. B. Fitts of the United States Golf Association experiment station had told how grass could be grown by proper top dressing with compost and fertilization with ammonium, B. R. Leach of the Department of Agriculture related experiments in poisoning the soil for a depth of four inches to kill off the grubs and worms.

RUGBY GAMES DREW DEFICIT

In view of the wide diversity of opinion as to the desirability of adopting a uniform football code for British Columbia as between Rugby, the United States game or the Canadian game, the financial report of the Vancouver Rugby Union for last season is interesting. Advocates of the Rugby code endeavored to stimulate additional interest by bringing a team from Edmonton and one from San Francisco, the latter composed principally of members of the 1924 Olympic champions, who had just returned from a tour of the Hawaiian Islands. The venture resulted in a loss of \$500. Games with the Edmonton team showed a deficit of \$300. During one of the games with the Olympics the fog was so intense that spectators could scarcely see across the gridiron.

ABANDONS BASES TO POUND BEAT

Ludlow, Ky., Jan. 11—Neal Brady who was a pitcher for the Cincinnati Reds and who was sold to the Buffalo club of the International League, has decided to become a night patrolman for the city of Ludlow at a salary of \$130 a month. He is one of two patrolmen appointed.

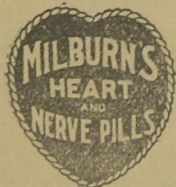

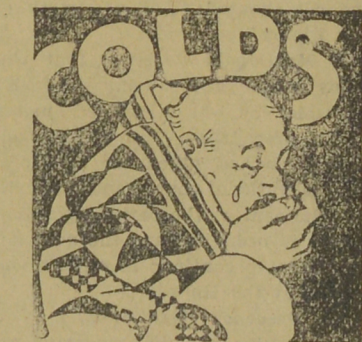

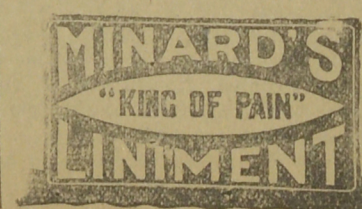

NORWEGIAN POLE VAULTER HAS ARRIVED

World's Title-Holder is Ready to Compete in United States—Also Middle Distance Runner.

New York, Jan. 11—Charles Hoff, holder of the world's pole vault record and all-around athlete of Norway, arrived in this country accompanied by his bride of a few weeks, for a three months' visit in which he will compete in many of the leading indoor meets.

Hoff is the first of a quartet of foreign athletes who are coming here for the indoor season. The others are Hubert Houben, German sprinter; Adrian Paulen, Holland middle-distance star, and George Goodwin, English walker.

Hoff called at the offices of the A. A. U. immediately after his arrival and presented his credentials from the athletic governing board of Norway. His permit from the Norwegian authorities extends from Feb. 4 to May 4.

Hoff's first appearance will be at the Millrose A. A. games in Madison Square Garden, Feb. 4, when he will enter the pole vault, the 600-yard special and the international relay. In the latter event Hoff will be paired with Paulen, Houben and a Canadian runner yet to be named. The Norwegian did not bring his favorite vaulting pole with him, but expressed the belief that he would be able to purchase a suitable stick here. He speaks good English. He plans to leave on Monday for Hanover, N. H. where he will train under the supervision of Harry Hillman, Dartmouth track coach.

Local A. A. U. officials said they had received 22 requests for Hoff's services at indoor meets all over the country, but outside of New York, Boston and Chicago, no invitations had yet been accepted.

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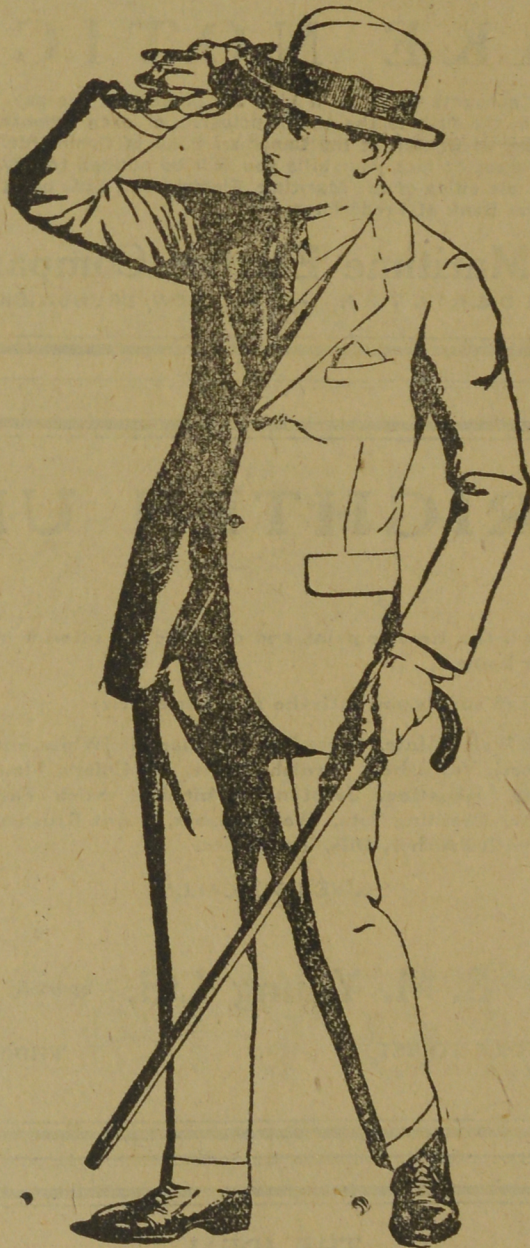
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
