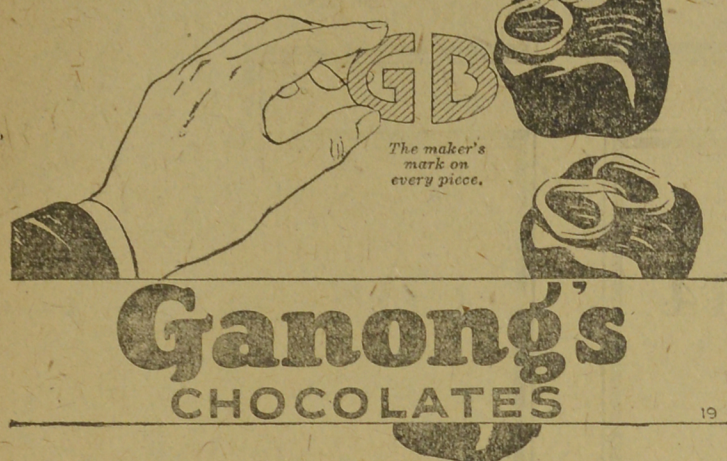

## Canadians Legion on Sunday Held Decoration Service, Attended Church

### Forty-eight Graves Decorated in The Cemeteries—Impressive Ceremony at Cenotaph Sunday Afternoon—Memorials Dedicated at Parish Church at Morning Service.

The customary decoration proceedings took place here this afternoon on the Sunday preceding the anniversary of the Armistice. Forty-eight graves in the cemeteries of Fredericton were decorated with poppies by members of the Canadian Legion. Prior to the decoration proceedings in the cemeteries there was a brief service at the cenotaph near the foot of Queen street. That service was attended by a large gathering. The Canadian Legion, Boy Scout Troups and fraternal societies marched to the cenotaph. The York Regt. Band played for march and service. The address was delivered by Rev. N. P. Fairweather of St. Mary's Church, Devon. A firing party fired three volleys and "Last Post" was sounded by a bugler follower by "Reveille."

**At Parish Church.**  
In the morning the Fredericton Branch, Canadian Legion with the York Regt. Band, marched to Christ-church Parish Church where the sermon was preached by the Rector of Fredericton, Rev. A. F. Bate. Part of the service was taken by Rev. W. J. Wilkinson formerly rector of St. Peter's Church, Springhill, who lost his son in the war.

**The Sermon.**  
The Rector preached from the text, "They loved not their lives unto the death." The preacher referred to the memories which come in a flood when the anniversary of the armistice comes around. One memory was of the first thirty thousand who responded in 1914 after the fatal date of August 4th. They and many others who followed proved that Canada's men were equal to any. It was a pleasure to welcome to the service the members of the Canadian Legion and it was particularly fitting that they should attend at the time of the dedication of memorials.

Victory had been purchased at a terrible price. Canada's casualties totaled 210,000 and of them more than 50,000 were dead. Many a scarred and maimed man had come back and many a chair was vacant.

There could be no forgetting of the dead. Shame upon the thought! Those who had given their lives were the men of Christ. The reason was not far

to seek for Christ had given his life. Many of them had gone out in the high spirit of adventure but others with a spirit which was more serious.

Those who had not returned had placed their country under a debt which was unpayable. From those who had gone came a message. It was a call to return to God, a call to make Canada a better country in which to live.

#### Memorials Dedicated.

Prior to the service took place the unveiling and dedication of memorials which had recently been given to the Parish Church. The unveiling was performed by the two daughters of the late Albert H. Boddington who was killed at Vimy Ridge, April 14th, 1917. The dedication was pronounced by Rev. Mr. Wilkinson.

The memorial altar is a bequest of Mrs. Kate A. H. Garnsey nee Beek in memory of her parents James Scott Beek former Auditor General of New Brunswick and Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Beek.

The inscription on the altar is, "To the Glory of God and in Loving memory of James Scott Beek and Mary Elizabeth Beek."

The reredos is the gift of Mrs. L. M. Boddington in memory of her husband Albert H. Boddington.

It is inscribed as follows:—"To the Glory of God and in Loving Memory of Albert H. Boddington, Killed at Vimy Ridge, France, April 14th, 1917."

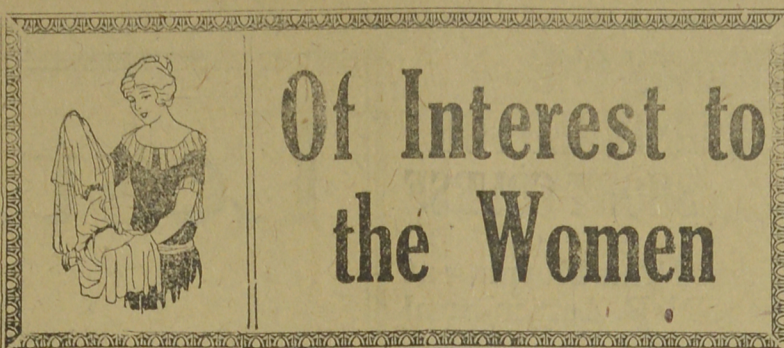
A brass alms dish is the gift of Mrs. Ada Clark in memory of her son LeRoy Clark who died on service December 13, 1918.

The inscription is, "To the Glory of God and in Loving Memory of LeRoy Clark, Died in the Service of his Country, December 13th, 1918, aged 27 years—The Gift of His Mother."

A fair linen altar cloth was made by Miss Grace Quartermain and presented in memory of her father the late Arthur Quartermain. The working of the lace on the altar cloth required some five months for completion. The deceased was at one time a member of the vestry.

This makes delicious shortcake for the winter season.

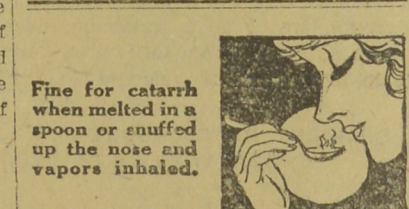
### MRS. CALVIN COOLIDGE'S PINE-APPLE SALAD.

Place on a lettuce leaf a slice of Hawaiian pineapple; cover with salad dressing; over this press through a potato sieve cream cheese; place a preserved cherry on top.

### LADY NANCY ASTOR'S VIRGINIA BUTTER BREAD.

1 egg  
1 pint of buttermilk  
1-2 teaspoonful of soda  
Little piece of butter and piece of lard the size of small egg  
3-4 cupful of meal  
Melt butter and lard together. Mix ingredients and put in last one heaping teaspoonful of baking powder bake twenty to thirty minutes.

Boil five large sweet potatoes and cut them crosswise into pieces one and one half inches in thickness. Lay in pan and put two tablespoonfuls of butter, cut in slices over them, then three tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar and two tablespoonfuls of Porto Rico molasses and cook in oven for ten minutes to get nice and brown.

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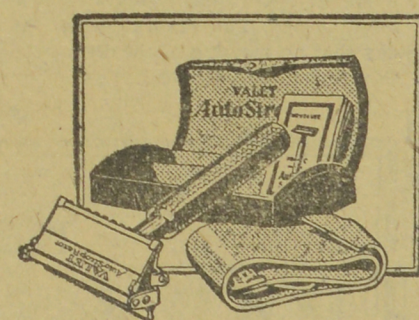
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
