N. B. Power Co. Case is Struck Off—Appeal in the McIntosh Divorce Case to be Made.

The Supreme Court this morning heard common motions. On the motion of J. J. F. Winslow, K. C., an extension of time was granted for the filing factum in Bertha E. L. Grace vs George B. Moore and John F. O'Connor. This was an action for damages tried at Fredericton following the death of William F. Grace.

In Annie D. MacIntosh vs Lorne de C. MacIntosh a motion of C. R. Hawkins for the plaintiff for extension of time to file was refused with leave to reapply on second common motion day. This case was a divorce action tried before Mr. Justice Crockett.

Leave was granted on the motion of E. E. B. Smith for defendant to enter the case of Devlin vs Moore's Mills Creamery Co. at the foot of docket of present term.

N. B. Power Case Off.

The docket being taken up by consent of all parties the Crown Paper case, The King vs Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities ex parte New Brunswick Power Company was struck with leave to re-enter.

Court began hearing of the appeal of the defendant in Desrosiers vs School Trustees of District No. 1, Balmoral. J. T. Hebert supported the appeal and E. B. McLatchey appeared on the other side.

A motion to amend pleading made by Mr. McCarthy was refused.

The case concerned the engaging of a school teacher.

DR. T. C. ALLEN
HONORED BY THE
APPEAL COURT

Seventy-fifth Birthday of Registrar Marked by Bench and Bar—Best Wishes of the Judges.

When the Appeal Court re-assembled this morning for common motions, Dr. Taylor, President of the Barristers' Society, called the Court's attention to the fact that today was the seventy-fifth anniversary of the birth of Dr. Allen, the Registrar of the Court, and stated that the members of the Bar felt that some recognition should be placed upon the minutes of the Court of this occasion, as an appreciation of many years of service rendered the Bench and Bar by Dr. Allen.

Dr. Taylor said that his relations with the Bench and Bar had been such as endeared him to every person who came in contact with him, and in his office as Registrar, Deputy Attorney, and for very many years Secretary of the Barristers' Society, he had filled a most important position in the legal life of the Province. The members of the Bar regretted very much to hear that he was temporarily indisposed on his seventy-fifth birthday, and it was the sincere wish of every member that he would soon be restored to health and be able again to take up the important duties of his offices.

Comment By Court.

The Chief Justice, rising, said he thought it was very proper that this matter should be brought to the attention of the Court, and he would direct that an entry be made of the occurrence on the minutes. Speaking for himself, he could say how much the Bench and Bar appreciated the services of Dr. Allen. He was not only a courteous official of the Court, but he was an extremely able lawyer, and no person had a more profound knowledge of the practice of the Court than Dr. Allen. He was always ready and willing to give the benefit of his knowledge and experience to the Bench and the Bar, and he unfailingly performed the duties of his office to the benefit of the public.

Mr. Justice White said he heartily concurred in what had been said.

Mr. Justice Grimmer said he wished to associate himself with the remarks of the learned Chief Justice. He had known Dr. Allen for many years, and he unhesitatingly say that no person could more fittingly fill his important offices, and it was his sincere wish that he would shortly be restored to health to again take up his duties as Registrar of the Court and be spared for many years to perform his public services.


The formalities in connection with the opening of the course took place this morning and classes were organized and the work was begun.

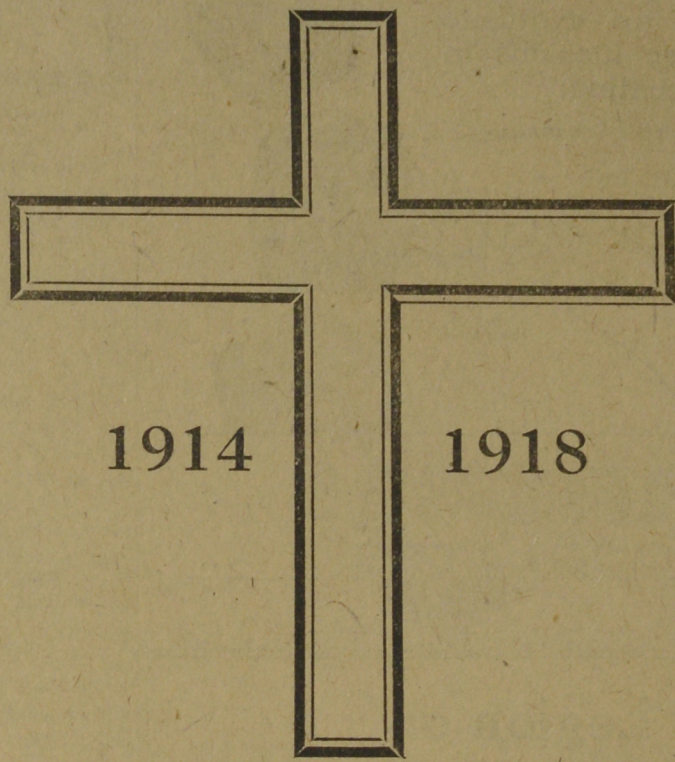

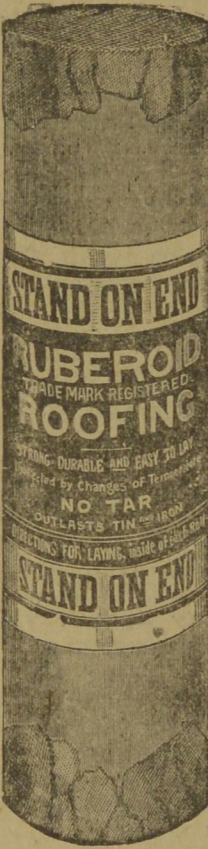
