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A MEDICAL OPINION.

The greatest achievement which stands to his credit was the organization on a co-operative basis of the marketing of California's enormous orange and raisin crops. Hon. J. A. Walker, Nova Scotia's Minister of Natural Resources was responsible for Mr. Sapiro's visit to Nova Scotia.

The leases are sold at auction on an annual rental basis.
