

ROD FISHING
ON TRACADIE IS
AGAIN FOR SALE

N. B. Fish & Game Protective Assoc. Objected to Previous Attempt — Area is Reduced.

Notice is given of the sale of exclusive right to fish with rod in front of ungranted Crown Lands on all the waters of Tracadie River below the timber block line between Blocks 2 and 3 and above the point where Main Tracadie River is intersected by the line between Block Ranges 5 and 6, on June 24th at the Crown Land Office. Upset rental price is fixed at \$300 per year. George Gilbert is the applicant. Notice of sale of fishing rights in Tracadie waters given in March resulted in objection on the part of interested parties and the notice was withdrawn. The upset price then was \$100 and the applicant the same as in this case.

Association Objected Before.

The distance on the river in which fishing rights are given by the latest notice is much less than that announced in the first notice which was withdrawn. The New Brunswick Fish and Game Protective Association raised objection to the sale. It is considered doubtful if the alteration will meet the objection although the public is excluded from a smaller distance on the river.
