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## PREMIER MEIGHEN REPLIES TO HON. MACKENZIE KING IN A GREAT SPEECH AT SYDNEY, N. S.

Sydney, July 26—"On constitutional matters, the late Prime Minister enjoys bad health," declared Premier Meighen here tonight, dealing with the campaign keynote speech of Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King.

"He loves to rail about usurpers and to be doubled up with constitutional pangs," Mr. Meighen added. "Whenever Mr. King is out of power the constitution is in danger."

"Mr. King complained," went on Mr. Meighen, "that we insulted parliament by securing dissolution without completing the business of the session and having formal prorogation. If this is so Sir Wilfrid Laurier insulted parliament also in 1911 for the dissolution then was just as sudden there was no formal prorogation, no finishing of business—the members learned of dissolution in the corridors and on the streets. No one then complained of parliament being insulted because there was no one in politics at that time who had chronic constitutional phlebitis. Sir Wilfrid Laurier's course was perfectly proper; so was ours."

Just Chatter.

"Had Mr. King got his dissolution when he asked for it on Monday, June 28, the result to parliament would have been exactly the same, and Mr. King and everyone who has the slightest knowledge of parliamentary affairs knows it. Mr. King would like the country to believe now that all he asked the governor-general for was an assurance that some time later he could get dissolution; that is, after the session's work had been completed and formal prorogation had taken place. This, in face of the record, is just chatter and nonsense. In the first place a prime minister would scarcely resign because he couldn't get a promise of what a governor-general might do at some later time and under some other circumstances. If a prime minister could be found who would resign on that account, he would not likely choose the moment between a debate on a vote of censure and the vote itself to announce his resignation."

What King Told House.

"In the next place, Mr. King told Parliament on June 28, that he had asked His Excellency that day at noon to grant a dissolution, and that His Excellency had refused. He told Parliament also on June 29, that he

had the day before presented to His Excellency an order-in-council dissolving parliament, which order-in-council His Excellency said he was unable to assent to. If His Excellency had assented to such order-in-council presented to him by Mr. King, and delivered it to Mr. King, Parliament would by that act have been dissolved. Mr. King told Parliament that he resigned because His Excellency refused to do this. It is a little late now to be telling us that he really intended His Excellency to sign and deliver the order, but that it was only presented as a mere formality."

King's Proof Amusing.

"The proof adduced that Mr. King's government intended formally to prorogue is amusing. He says he had the formal order prepared. So had we. Indeed, the Speech from the Throne to be delivered at prorogation was also prepared by myself and completed. Those things are always prepared in advance of prorogation. But when later dissolution was decided on whether by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, by Mr. King or by the government of which I am the head, this superceded all else, and the assent of His Excellency thereto immediately dissolved Parliament."

Low Intelligence Level.

"Mr. King assumes a low level of intelligence on the part of the people of Canada. In this he has proved himself mistaken more than once in the past."

"Very suddenly Mr. King has become exceedingly solicitous that no one should think he would attack the Governor-General. His first word in Parliament on the famous June 18, just before he announced his resignation, was to complain of His Excellency for having refused him dissolution. Those who will read Hansard of June 30 and July 1 will have no difficulty in understanding the character of the campaign. Mr. King then intended to conduct. He has learned a lesson since and now seeks to convince the people that he intended only to attack himself. It seems a pity that he gave the wrong directions to his lieutenant, Mr. Bourassa, and to many another Liberal who is now ringing the charges against the Governor-General wherever it is thought that such a campaign can be safely waged."

## FOREST FIRES RAGE IN MAINE

The latest blaze is reported at the head of the lake near Seboomook and another on Misery Township. Several smaller fires on the east side of the lake have been checked without much spread. The woods are very dry and conditions require the full force of the fire protection service and extra men.

## NON-STOP FIRE-FLY NEW FEAT OF SCIENCE

New York, July 27—A method of making a firefly burn with a steady light, instead of flashing and then going out, has been found in experiments conducted by Dr. Frank E. Lutz, curator of entomology at the American Museum of Natural History.

The firefly's illuminating system is stepped up it was discovered by a tiny hypodermic injection of adrenalin. A heavy shot of adrenalin will make a firefly glow uninterruptedly for 24 hours.

The experimenters have so far discovered no commercial use for this discovery. There is no demand at present for non stop fireflies.

## COMMISSION RESUMES WORK AT HALIFAX

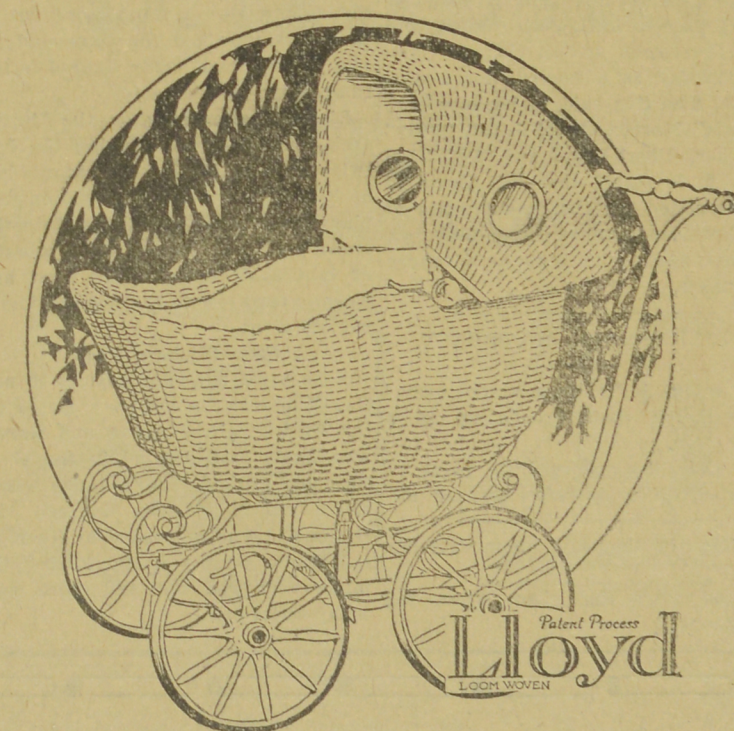
Halifax, N. S., July 26—Continuing the presentation of Nova Scotia's case before the Royal Commission investigating the situation of the Maritime Provinces within the Canadian Confederation, Lieut.-Col. E. C. Phinney today reviewed the claims of the province with respect to Federal grants and debt allowances, western lands, and boundary extensions, and introduced the subject of railway freight rates. Tomorrow at 10 a. m., F. C. Cornell, freight rate expert employed by the Maritime Provinces, will take the stand and elucidate the case of Eastern Canada for a lower freight tariff.

Lieut.-Col. Phinney confined his arguments this afternoon to an outline of what the province would lay before the commission to support its claim that Nova Scotia had not benefited in the matter of transportation facilities as had been expected under railway agreements, entered into and that the province was bearing an unfair share of the burdens that should be carried by the entire Canadian National System as a whole.

The case would show, he said, that traffic had been diverted from the natural north and south course to an artificial east and west route and that artificial rails would have to be set up to offset the resultant situation.

The death of Dorothy L. Nason, little daughter of Fred Nason of Fredericton Junction occurred at that place Monday. The child was aged five years.

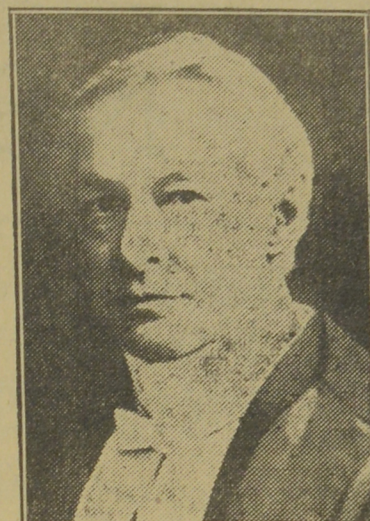

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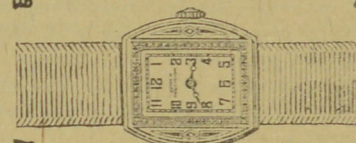
