FIERY CROSS BURNED ON LAWN IN TORONTO

Toronto, Sept. 23—A fiery cross was burned at 10.30 o'clock last night on the lawn in front of the home of F. Ronald Graham, 88 Wells Hill Avenue. Members of the Ku Klux Klan are suspected of being responsible for the placing of the cross in front of the house, but at a late hour last night no person could be found who had seen any Klansmen in the vicinity.

Mr. and Mrs. Graham are at present out of the city.

The cross, about six feet in height and four inches wide, was erected on a pole made from gas piping. It was stuck in the lawn and lighted. The cross was found with cotton wool and other inflammable material which had been soaked in coal oil.

Once lighted the flames spread for many feet on all sides. The reflection was thrown through windows of houses and caused quite a stir in the community.

Police were called from Markham and London Street Divisions, and when they arrived the cross had practically burned out. They tore it down, and it was not necessary to call firemen. What was left of the cross was taken to No. 11 Station.


