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PAINLESS PHOTOGRAPHY.

It is good news to hear through the Photographers' Association of America that it is no longer necessary to go through an awful ordeal in order to have your picture taken. This is another way of saying that the day of painless photography has arrived. An amazingly large number of persons are camera-shy. They will be gratified to learn that the present day process is not as painful as having a tooth extracted or being vaccinated. A generation ago the man who finally plucked up sufficient courage to visit a studio was always prepared for the worst. He was planted in a chair in the most uncomfortable position possible, and the back of his head was forced into an iron band that seemed like a relic of the ages when criminals were subject to cruel and barbarous punishment. After that he was told to cast his eyes heavenward, and while in this ridiculous posture he could feel the operator arranging parts of his clothing; the poor fellow by that time began to think he was really an executioner in disguise.

But there had to be an end to the preliminaries; and, after the last stray hair had been properly placed and the subject made to resemble a comic valentine, he was blandly requested to "look pleasant." 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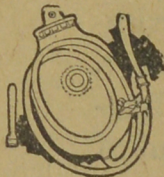
