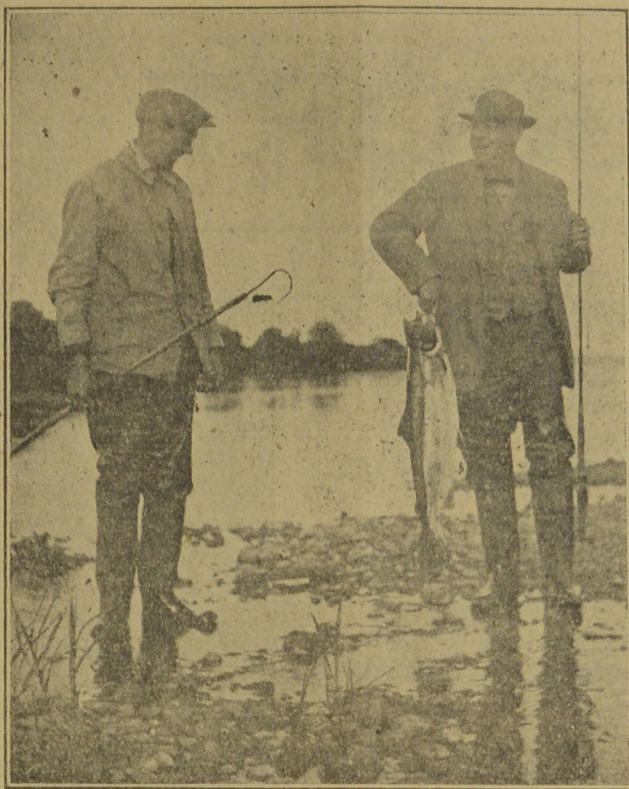

SYNAGOGUE HAS BEEN SEIZED IN UKRAINE

Riga, Sept. 22—Jewish circles in the Ukraine are greatly incensed by the action of the Soviet authorities in seizing Brodsky Synagogue, the greatest synagogue in Kieff.

Built in the Moorish style and situated in the centre of a Jewish quarter it was erected by a sugar industrialist named Brodsky and under the Bolsheviks was administered by the religious Jewish community. A group of Communist Jews petitioned the authorities to hand over the synagogue to them for a club and although it was pointed out on its alienation from the religious community would violate the Soviet Constitution the authorities granted the petition.

Jewish believers appealed to the supreme Soviet authorities at Khar-koff but these confirmed the Kieff Soviet's decision and finally authorized the group of Communists to convert the synagogue into a community club.

DEMPEY FELT VERY BADLY OVER DEFEAT

Philadelphia, Sept. 23—Jack Dempsey broke down and cried like a baby when he reached the seclusion of his hotel and was alone in the room with Jerry the Greek his faithful little trainer, and Mike Trant his companion. He was tremendously affected by his defeat but bravely held up while making the trip from the Stadium to the hotel.

After the battle Dempsey declared: "It's the old story. The best man won. I have no allbbs. Give all the credit to Gene. He's a great champion."

The champion badly battered as he was, rushed from his corner after the announcement of the decision and embraced Tunney in the middle of the ring.

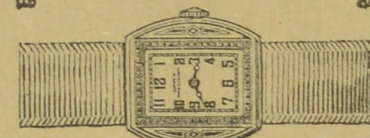
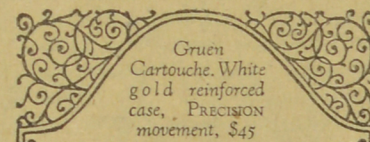
