ment to the world that France has turned away from what might be called the policy of Poincare, though Poincare is still in power and is prepared to safeguard France's frontiers and her economic position in Europe by other methods than military force and defensive alliances.

#### Has Seen New Light.

Many things have happened to bring the French Government to this change of heart. Internal crises have educated French public opinion to the necessity of economy for the prevention of a national catastrophe.

Above all perhaps Italy's threaten ing attitude to France has caused and is still causing, uneasiness in French minds and is forcing them to the belief in the League of Nations as their best instrument for maintaining peace As realists, also, they have at last

understood that commercial dealings with Germany are likely to be more valuable to them than political hostilities and far less dangerous.

There are some advanced minds in France as well as in Germany who believe that this commercial understanding may lead in the not distant future, to a real alliance which would dominate Europe. This is repudiated in both countries by moderate public opinion, satisfied that by working slowly and cautiously through the League of Nations and using such instruments as the Treaty of Locarno

2 teaspoon baking powder Let stand thirty minutes before bak ing and stiv down. Bake in very tiny cup cake tins and roll in powdered sugar when done.

NUT WAFER COOKIES.

- 1 cup brown sugar 1 cup granulated sugar 1½ cups melted shortening 1 teaspoon salt 5 cups flour 3 eggs 2 teaspoons soda
  - 1 teaspoon cinnamon
  - 1 cup chopped nuts

When all are mixed together, hape the dough into a roll and put it on a greased pan in ice box. When ready to bake, slice and bake in hot oven. Recipe makes 100 cookies.
