CONTRACTS ARE

AWARDED

Hon. D. A. Stewart Announces Contracts Aggregating About \$14,200 — Keen Competition for the Work.

Four bridge contracts have been awarded by Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works for New Brunswick, who has been engaged in departmental work here for some days. Announcement was made this morning. Competition for the contracts was keen. The lowest number of tenders for any one was six. The aggregate contract prices amount to about \$14,200.

The awards are as follows:

Robinson Brook Bridge, Parish of Havelock, King's County, awarded to Alex. & Roy Forbes, Fredericton. Price about \$4,500. Eight tenders.

Rogers Brook Concrete Arch Culvert and Roadway Embankment Parish of Weldford, Kent County, awarded to Armstrong Bros., Perth. Price about \$3,000. Eight tenders.

C. H. Mott Concrete Arch Culvert and Roadway Embankment, Parish of Waterborough, Queen's County, awarded to W. M. Durost, White's Cove. Price about \$3,000. Seven tenders.

Jeffries Mill Road Bridge, Parish of Sussex, King's County awarded to Frank L. Boone, Devon, price about \$3,700. Six tenders.
