EVERETT SCOTT ON WAY TO HIS SEVENTH SERIES

**Iron Man of Baseball
Has also Been Shrewd
Business Dealer—
With Cincinnati Reds.**

Everett Scott, baseball's "luckiest player," already without a rival in one big league record, still continues to enjoy the favors of old Dame Fortune. If the Reds continue to set their pace for the other National league contenders, Scotty may establish another major league record this coming October.

Known as the "Iron Man" of baseball, Deacon Scott, former Red Sox star, long ago established a record for consecutive games played, figuring in over 300 consecutive contests more than any player who ever wore the big league livery.

And up to the time that Chicago allowed him to get away and join the Cincinnati Reds, he had shared with Eddie Collins alone the distinction of figuring in six different World's Series. He was an active participant in the World's Series battles of 1915, 1916 and 1918 while with the Red Sox. And then when the Sox were shot to pieces and sold one by one to New York he was one of the men traded to the Yankees, fighting in two World's Series under the leadership of Miller Huggins.

Fortune kept right on his trail again, and his subsequent sale to the Washington club permitted him to share in the World's Series receipts last year, when the Senators battled the Pirates. And now, as a member of the Cincinnati Reds, he stands a very fine chance of being on a World's Series contender for the seventh time.

Scott is a capable business man. When made a free agent by Washington he sold his services to the White Sox for a fancy price. He was allowed to join the Reds at the waiver price, but it is shrewdly suspected that he will draw down from the Cincinnati club a much better salary than he received while wearing a Chicago uniform.

BERLENBACH MADE BIG MONEY WHEN BEATEN

New York, July 19—Paul Berlenbach was paid off today at the rate of \$2,493 a minute for his hour's work in fighting Jack Delaney at Ebbets Field last Friday night.

Dan Hickey, the former champion's manager received a certified check for \$149,548.85, representing the former champion's 37 1/2 per cent of the net receipts.

Delaney received \$821 a minute for his hour's labor in winning the title. Pete Reilly, Delaney's manager received a check for \$49,229.69, representing the challenger's 12 1/2 per cent.

DELANEY SCIENCED BOXER AND VERY FAST

**Pooch Donovan Gives
New Light Heavy-
weight Champion the
Warmest Praise—De-
lay Hindered Him.**

Delaney is given the credit of being one of the greatest boxers of his day by "Pooch" Donovan now trainer for Harvard University. Donovan writes as follows:—

New York, July 16—Jack Delaney fully came up to my expectations at Ebbets Field, Brooklyn, tonight when he dethroned Paul Berlenbach the champion from his reign over the light heavyweights of the world.

It was a case of a smart, light footed, scientific boxer out-sharp-shooting a less agile and slower-thinking, pure and simple fighter.

The fact that Delaney did not put his opponent on the mat for the necessary count and thus win by a knockout matters little as far as winning the battle went. His victory on points is just as decisive, as I cannot see where the champion got more than three or four rounds out of the 15 that the battle went.

Had Everything.

Delaney had everything this evening that a champion should have except a knockout punch. He hit to advantage with both his right and his left and mixed up his blows to such good advantage that Berlenbach never was able to tell what was coming next or where it was going to land.

To my mind it is very lucky for the fight fans that the battle was put over from last night on account of rain. Had they gone into the ring last evening Delaney would, without a doubt have disposed of Berlenbach long before the 15 rounds with some of the blows that sent the champion reeling.

The delay after weighing in yesterday enabled Berlenbach to regain pounds of strength that he sorely needed last evening to weather the storm. On the other hand, Delaney might have been a little better himself.

The only real blow that Berlenbach was able to deliver was his left. As predicted, his right was the same as useless. Paul tried to inflict punishment in the clinches and with his superior strength wear down his opponent but Delaney was generally prepared for him and the New Yorker found him an entirely different man to shove and maul around the ring than the Delaney's he met in the last encounter.

CANADIANS FORCED HARD IN CUBAN MATCH

**Crocker Beat Banet But
Wright Lost to Paris
— Play Took Place in
Havana.**

Havana, Cuba, July 19—Canada and Cuba divided honors in their first meeting in the second round of the Davis Cup American zone play.

Willard Crocker won his match against Dr. Vincente Banet in straight sets, 6-4, 6-4, 6-1, while Jack Wright lost a bitterly contested five sets struggle to Rogelio Paris, 2-6, 6-4, 2-6, 6-3, 6-4.

The latter event was the feature of a torrid afternoon. The temperamental young Montrealese began in fine form, taking the first set, 6-2 to the admiration of a large gallery which included numbers of Canadians. After losing the second set 6-4, Wright took the next 2-6 and began the fourth and what looked like the final set by winning two games. He had a bit of hard luck here, Paris developing some pretty tennis to break through the Canadian champion's service for five straight games. The gruelling game and the unaccustomed heat began to tell on Wright in the final set although he fought strongly to take four games.

Both Wright and Paris commented after their match on the "tantalizing play" they had been forced to face. Crocker was exhausted after his win from Banet. The Canadian, who had taken the event in whirlwind fashion, was not in the best of condition as the result of a cold he had caught soon after his arrival here. He stretched himself on a bench in the clubhouse in a state bordering on collapse.

It was said by some that his action in pouring ice water down his back after the second set had not had the best possible effect, despite the fact that he won the third set with ease.

Both Crocker and Banet began their match by feeling out their opponents. Crocker thought he had discovered a weak backhand, but successive shots to Banet's left back court deceived him. The Canadian's side line driving was good enough for the match.

SOREL CHAMP'S BIRTHPLACE

Toronto, July 19—For the first time since the days of Tommy Burns (Noah Brusso), Canada has a native son world's boxing champion. Burns was a great little man and held the heavyweight championship until Jack Johnson relieved him of it at Rush-cutter's Bay in the Antipodes but he was never seriously regarded as a representative titleholder. Jack Delaney (Ovila Chapdelaine) who beat Paul Berlenbach for the world's light heavyweight crown in Brooklyn last night was born in Sorel Que., and now resides in Bridgeport Conn.
