## TRAGEDY ON THE ST. LAWRENCE

### WILL LAY OFFERINGS AT HIS FEET

Chinese Prelates Will Present Gifts to the Pope.

### SILVER VASE IS INCLUDED

Was Made 2000 Years Before the Birth of Christ.

Rome, Oct. 18.—Bearing six cases of rich gifts six prelates from China, where rulers in the nineteenth century resented enforced relationship with the outside world, arrived here yesterday to be consecrated as Bishops October 28 by Pope Pius XI.

A solid silver vase made two thousand years before Christ is the treasure they will give the Pope. For Cardinal Gasparri, Papal Secretary of State, and officials of the Government, and Treasury of St. Peters there are other gifts.

### QUEEN OPENS DANCE, KING A WALL-FLOWER

London, Oct. 18.—King George was a smiling spectator when Queen Mary took the floor at the annual "Gillies ball" and led off the opening reel with one of the higher officials of their Balmoral castle. The Queen finished the dance but sat out most of the others—which did not include a modern dance and not even a little bit of jazz.

King George does not dance, but Princess Mary and Viscount Lascelles danced through most of the evening.

### RECIPES FOR COOKING TO BE STANDARDIZED

Atlantic City, Oct. 18.—In another 10 years cooks and baking recipes will become as standardized as income tax returns with the result that apple pie and baked beans will have one universal taste, said Mrs. Marjorie P. Wardman, home service director of the Brooklyn Gas Company, at the convention of the American Gas Association.

"The adoption of the automatic temperature method of cooking food makes standardization of recipes and cooking practices inevitable," she said.

### ONTARIO VOTERS MAY GO TO POLLS DECEMBER 8

An Announcement by the Premier Expected Soon.

### WILL HAVE A LIQUOR POLICY

Local Option is to be a Plank in the Premier's Platform.

London, Ont., Oct. 18.—London's most prominent Conservatives, members of the party executive, are authority for the forecast that not later than Monday, Premier Ferguson will announce an election.

The Premier, they state, has notified London that the Government has decided upon a general election in the week of Dec. 6. In view of municipal elections in various cities on the sixth, the date of the Provincial polling is scheduled to be Wednesday, Dec. 8.

#### Local Option Plan.

The Premier, they state, will announce as the chief plank of his liquor policy the sale of strong liquors in Government stores without doctors' prescriptions, such stores to be operated in communities which elect to go wet under a local option plan. There is a report that the proposal to sell beer and wines in hotels will be set aside for the time being on the ground that so complete an upset of the prohibitory laws would be too much to attempt at once.

The dry rural communities will be placated, the Government hopes, by extremely severe penalties to be imposed on any one who carries liquor from a wet area into a dry one.

Influenced by the effect of the Robb Budget in the Federal general election, the Premier will promise certain more or less specific reductions in taxation. There is also a possibility of some further concessions to the farmers in the distribution of rural Hydro.

### FIRST AID TEAM IS WELCOMED AT M'ADAM

McAdam, Oct. 17.—McAdam's champion first-aid team returned home this morning fresh from their conquest in Winnipeg, where they won the Lord Shaughnessy Challenge Cup, indicative of the championship of the entire C. P. R. system, from the Western Shops teams. About 200 townspeople were on the station platform when the Montreal train arrived and all members of the team were heartily congratulated.

The appearance of Captain W. F. Bailey was the signal for an outburst of cheering. He carried with him the beautiful silver cup won in Winnipeg, also the shield, emblem of the eastern lines championship. The team also have won the N. B. district championship cup.

Plans are now underway to place a tablet in the new school to commemorate the many victories of the team. It is doubtful if a town of McAdam's size has ever before won a national championship in competition.

The members of the team are: G. W. Gehan, C. W. Lee, I. H. C. Bogart, Frank Sheehan, William Dawson and W. F. Bailey (captain).

### QUEEN OF ROUMANIA WILL BE ENTERTAINED AT AMERICAN CAPITAL

Will be Escorted From the Station by a Squadron of Cavalry—Will Dine Tomorrow with the President and Mrs. Coolidge—Government Authorities Not Elated With Commercial Atmosphere Surrounding Her Tour.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Roumania's Queen Marie will be received tonight with honors befitting her rank and her place as a two day guest of the Government.

A war strength squadron of cavalry will turn out to escort her from the union station and tomorrow she will dine with the President and Mrs. Coolidge. But the hospitality accorded her will be somewhat strained, even though it observes all the proprieties and niceties.

For it was an open secret here today that many govt. authorities were displeased with the "commercial" atmosphere thrown around the Queen's tour. Publicly, they do not violate the rules of hospitality by commenting but privately they do not veil their displeasure at the money making elements in the trip, the trumpeting that heralds Marie's coming and the almost press agency with which she is being "put across".

### TO REMODEL THE JORDAN SANITORIUM

Moncton, Oct. 18.—J. W. Fraser, architect of the Jordan Memorial Sanatorium, was authorized yesterday afternoon to call for tenders in connection with the remodelling and extension of the present buildings, at a meeting of the commission held here. The matter has been under consideration and it was decided to call for tenders and then take the matter up with the provincial government after they are received. The work will cost in the vicinity of \$100,000.

Captain J. W. Carter and A. E. Trites were appointed a committee to look into the matter of opening up a road to Petitcodiac, to connect with the Albert railways, thus shortening the distance of hauling coal to the sanatorium from five to two miles. Routine business occupied the remainder of the session.

### MANITOBA HAS A STORM OF SNOW AND RAIN

Winnipeg, Oct. 17.—Manitoba was swept by snow and rain storms over the week-end and as a result farmers in many districts, whose crops are still in the fields, face another extended delay in harvesting.

Winnipeg awoke this morning to find itself blanketed under three inches of snow which had fallen during the night. A light rain which began shortly after daylight turned the streets into seas of slush. Temperatures dropped during the day and the snow-fall was renewed tonight.

Telegraphic reports were that the snow was general as far west as Portage La Prairie and east to the Manitoba boundary. Brandon and the district surrounding were drenched with a heavy fall of rain. Towns in southern Manitoba reported rain.

### MUSSOLINI IS MAKING A NEW ITALY

Pittsburgh, Oct. 18.—Premier Mussolini is "making a new nation out of Italy," in the opinion of Andrew W. Mellon, Secretary of the Treasury. The secretary, here yesterday to speak at Founders' Day Exercises of the H. J. Heinz Co., said he had been much impressed by the Premier whom he met on his recent European tour.

"He is one of the world's most vigorous personalities," Mr. Mellon said. Asked whether he thought Mussolini's work sound enough to stand on its own merits without the aid of the Premier's personality, the secretary replied in the affirmative: "It is sound and there should be time enough for him to build strongly. He is a young man yet."

And then Mr. Mellon added: "That is, of course, if they stop throwing bombs at him."

### HOPES FOR TRADE AGREEMENT WITH SOUTH AFRICA

London, Oct. 18.—Vincent Massey, who is now in London, will be Canada's first Minister to the United States, Premier Mackenzie King stated shortly after his arrival here yesterday to attend the British Empire Conference which opens Tuesday.

Premier King, last of the delegates to the conference to arrive, said that he hopes within the coming year to effect a mutual trade agreement between Canada and South Africa, similar to agreements Canada now has with Australia, New Zealand and the West Indies.

#### Five Fires From Lightning.

### INTERNATIONAL TO ASK ASSENT NEW FINANCING

Mills at Three Rivers and Gatineau are Involved.

### MEETING ON OCTOBER 28

The Capacity of Mill at Three Rivers to be Doubled.

New York, Oct. 18.—Although stockholders of International Paper Co. will be asked at meeting, October 28, to authorize an increase in non-par common stock to 1,000,000 shares from present authorization of 750,000 no-par shares, no plans are under consideration for utilization of the increase is to be considered at this time simply to facilitate any future financing.

Increase in 7 per cent. preferred will take care of the convertible feature of the \$25,000,000 6 per cent. 15-year debentures. These call for conversion at any time into 7 per cent. preferred, on the basis of 10 shares for each \$1,000 debenture. Sufficient common stock is held in the treasury, included in the 500,000 outstanding no-par shares to take care of the provision that permits subscription to one share of common at \$50 for each \$1,000 debenture if conversion privilege is exercised within two years.

#### A Large Issue!

Issuance of the \$25,000,000 debentures, public sale of which will soon be made by a banking group, is to reimburse the company for past expenditures in carrying out its development program in excess of the amount provided by common stock financing last year. It will also provide part of funds required in the future for the same purposes.

One important development, for which the treasury will be reimbursed is the doubling of capacity at the Three Rivers mill to about 700 tons. Completed plant represents a cost of about \$20,000,000.

The new Gatineau mill, construction of which is well advanced, will approach in size the Three Rivers plant. It will have a capacity of about 600 tons of newsprint or about 150 tons greater than originally planned. International Paper has acquired since last October timber limits carrying well in excess of 10,000,000 cords of pulpwood. These are principally Canadian Crown land leases. Various other mills, particularly Kipawa sulphite mill and the Bastrop La., kraft paper mill have also been enlarged.

It is the plan of the company wherever feasible, to finance power developments separately through independent power companies, rather than by direct issues of the International Paper Co. Financing will probably be done next year by the St. John River Power Co. to cover construction of a 60,000 horsepower hydro-electric development at Grand Falls in New Brunswick.

Consumption of newsprint in the United States and Canada is running at least 15 per cent. ahead of last year, according to an announcement of A. R. Graustein, president of the company.

### WHY WOMEN EMPLOYEES GET SMALL PAY

### BOAT UPSET 18 DROWNED SATURDAY

Celebration of Festival Had Disastrous Results.

### CELEBRATION IN INDIA

Only Minor Scraps Between Mohammedans and Hindus.

Calcutta, Oct. 18.—Eighteen persons were drowned when a boat used in celebrating the "Durga Pujah" festival capsized Saturday night in Hooghly, India.

Hindu and Mohammedan outbreaks in connection with the celebrations were few. Twelve persons were injured slightly in fighting between Mohammedans and Hindus at Howrah. Strong military forces were stationed throughout Calcutta but only minor fights occurred.

### SELLING OF GAME IN CUTS NOT FORBIDDEN

Holder of the License Under Which Animal is Killed, However, Must be Seller.

Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon when asked today concerning the practice of those who have killed moose and other game legally, cutting the carcasses up and offering the meat in cuts, stated that there was nothing in the Game Act to prevent the practice. All the Act called for was the sale of the carcass by the person to whom the game license had been issued.

Several times since the game season opened game has been sold in cuts in the Fredericton country market.

With regard to the retailing of game the Chief Game Warden said that the Act forbade it except by the holder of the game license under which it had been killed.

### PRINCESS LIKES CHOW OF SAILORS

The Hague, Oct. 18.—Little Princess Juliana of Holland attended naval manoeuvres in the North sea on board the cruiser Sumatra, and insisted on sharing the sailors' jobscouse of beef, red cabbage and potatoes.

With the hearty appetite of 17, she pronounced the food excellent, but the noise of the big guns, she thought, was a rather disturbing element in the enjoyment of a quiet meal.

#### ANOTHER HEAVY RAIN.

More Than an Inch Recorded in Sunday's Storm—Auroral Display Preceded it.

Another heavy autumnal rain fell on Sunday. At the Dominion Experimental Station the gauge recorded a fall of 1.05 inches of rain for the entire storm. That is a heavy fall for the period.

The rain followed closely upon the marked display of the aurora borealis on Thursday and Friday nights. Many claim that an especially brilliant display of the light is followed by rain at this time or snow in the winter.
