## TWO DEAD, TWO HURT IN GANG WAR

Chicago, Sept. 24.—The advent of a new era in gangster warfare was marked today in Cicero, where a broad side of rapid-fire from a cavalcade of eight motor cars outroared the suburb's previous volleys from pistols or a lone machine-gun.

At least two persons were wounded by the fusillade, which raked the Anton Hotel and the Hawthorne Inn, a short distance from where Assistant State Attorney McSwiggin and two companions were slain in April by machine gun fire.

Police sought two other reported casualties in an effort to determine the motive of the bold sortie, which instantly cleared the street of pedestrians and emptied nearby shops.

A witness said the wounded or dead bodies of two persons were dragged into one of the automobiles while a machine gunner knelt on the sidewalk and spread a covering fan of bullets.

One who fled with the opening shots yesterday was Al "Scarface" Capone, one-time vice lord of the suburb, who recently gave himself up and was released in connection with the McSwiggin murder. He was dining in the Hawthorne Inn, his reputed headquarters, and found hasty exit through a rear door.

From information through underworld channels, detectives advanced the theory that Capone was the objective of bullets fired by rival boot-leg gangsters by way of warning him against efforts to retrieve his former prestige in the traffic. Capone was seated in plain view of the street.

The known victims of the gunfire were Mrs. E. C. Freeman of May, La., and Louis Burko. Mrs. Freeman was wounded in the left arm when shots swept the automobile in which she sat with her small son and husband, a horse owner racing at the nearby Hawthorne plant. Burko, a hotel guest and follower of the races, was hit in the shoulder as the hotel and shops in the building were sprayed with bullets from the slowly moving cars.

## TEXAS MAN SEES BOSTON AND TALKS THEREOF; AND WRITES AN ARTICLE FOR THE FOLKS

Last spring I had occasion to write an article comparing the Lubbock and Elainview jails. Some of my customers in both these towns thought I gave the best of it to the other town's hoosegow. As a matter of fact, I was strictly impartial as between the Plainview and Lubbock bastille, but now I feel free to say that both of them are infinitely superior to the Suffolk county jail in Boston. This Boston gaol is a drab and dreary wickup, one which offers neither visual satisfaction, nor physical comfort. It is in fact, an effete calaboose, writes J. J. Taylor in the Dallas (Tex.) News.

Boston is a splendid city for the most part, but rather careless of its complexion. Some portions of it look as frowzy as the people in the Pullman cars you pass through going to the diner. Boston was established about 290 years ago, but did not become famous until it gave the celebrated Boston tea party.

The first grand jury in America is said to have functioned here in 1635. Even at that early day there were Boston people deserving to be indicted. The first American newspaper was printed here in 1704, but didn't last long. Only a few of the Bostonians could read.

The Pilgrims of Mayflower fame landed at Plymouth Rock, about sixty miles from Boston, in 1620. They were a stern, serious people—so stern and serious they could look at one another without laughing.

### Jibes at Pilgrims.

The name of Plymouth Rock lingers in my mind by reason of advertising in magazines I used to read. The Plymouth Rock Pants Company, Boston, advertised extensively and made a specialty of \$3 pants. I determined to order a pair as soon as I could save the money. Unfortunately, my financial condition was frail for several years, and by the time my fortune had improved pants had gone up to \$5, so I did without.

The Pilgrims were succeeded by the Puritans, who ruled Boston for long. Next came the Unitarians, who lasted a while. Now the Irish have got it. The celebrated baked bean of the Unitarian era has been pushed aside by the Irish stew.

### Battle Area Next.

It would be like sentimental suicide to write about historic Boston and ignore Lexington and Concord. It is a good deal of expense and some trouble to get out to Concord and Lexington, but for my part I don't mind the trouble at all and minded the expense no more than a prudent person should. At Lexington, in a lovely green park, you see the exact spot on which the Minute Men stood when numbers of them were shot down by the 800 British soldiers under General Pitcairn.

At Concord, to which town the remnant of the Minute Men retreated,

you see the exact spot on which the first British soldiers were slain by the Americans. Those two Britons were detailed by their commander to burn the little bridge beyond which the Americans were drawn up in battle order. The present bridge is not the same, but the present creek is.

The battle which followed was a decided victory for the Americans. The British were routed and retreated in disorder back through Lexington to Cambridge, their base. The Revolution was on. It lasted seven long and weary years and extended from Massachusetts, to Georgia—but now look at us!

### Follows Severe Route.

Going from Cambridge to Lexington you follow the same road over which Paul Revere galloped to warn the Americans that the British troops were coming to disperse and punish them for seditious speech and actions. You are shown the self-same house, room and bedstead in which John Hancock and Samuel Adams were sleeping when aroused by the messenger. Paul Revere had a sidekick on that ride, by the name of William Henry Dawes, who joined him at a crossroad and galloped with him until they and Dr. Prescott, who had been courting in Lexington, encountered a British patrol. Revere was made prisoner but soon released. The others escaped. Prescott later to become a hero and Dawes to become ancestor to our present Vice President. If our Mr. Dawes ever becomes President I hope he will remember that I helped to rescue his ancestor from the oblivion into which he was pitched by Paul Revere's shadow.

### Section Beautiful.

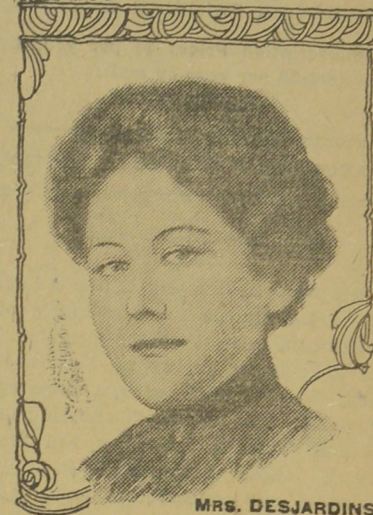
Many of the regions are not only historic, but beautiful. There are numerous monuments and other memorials, all tended with reverent care. At Concord, at a later date, lived Ralph Waldo Emerson, Nathaniel Hawthorne, Henry D. Thoreau and Louisa M. Alcott, whose homes remain in good condition. Miss Alcott wrote "Little Men" and "Little Women," volumes which I have never read, but am willing to praise, Walden Pond, where Thoreau, the naturalistic philosopher, set up a little home and lived on \$80 a year, is on the road a few miles out of Concord. Concord, by the way, has nearly doubled its population in the last 150 years. It now has about 6,000.

There is much more than I could put into this article, but if I should do so the letter would require an extra postage stamp.

Postscript—Henry D. Thoreau, the philosopher above mentioned, is credited with inventing the lead pencil, but never made any money out of it. A man who could live on \$80 a year didn't need an invention to keep him going.

## MILLIONS OF FISH FRY ARE DISTRIBUTED

Close to 680,000,000 fish fry have been distributed this season from the hatcheries operated by the Dominion Government, according to a statement issued by the fish culture division of the Department of Marine and Fisheries. Approximately 700,049,882 fry were ready for distribution at the opening of the season and of this number slightly over 21,000,000 fry still remain to be distributed. Shipments are continuing and by the end of the season all the fry will be planted.

## WILL BUILD NEW BRIDGE AT NIAGARA

Niagara Falls, Sept. 24.—Public notice is given today that an application will be made to Parliament for the incorporation of a company to be known as the "Niagara Memorial Bridge Company," whose purpose is to construct a new \$4,000,000 connecting link between the American and Canadian sides of the river. This structure will be seventy feet wide as compared with the forty-five foot dimensions of the present upper bridge, and will be located between the International Bridge and the Falls themselves, so as to join Falls Street, Niagara Falls, N. Y., with Ferry Street of this city.

### GRAPE JAM.

Pick over and wash the grapes, put on in preserving kettle; boil 30 minutes; pour in strainer and mash through so there will be nothing but the seeds left. Return to kettle and to each 4 cups of grapes add 2 cups of sugar; boil slowly 30 minutes, stirring frequently and skimming three or four times. Put into sterilized jars or glasses. This is the same as jelly, only not clear.
