LAW TO GOVERN CHIROPRACTORS IS ASKED FOR

Saint John, May 12—Legislation to govern the practice of chiropractic was recommended in the verdict returned last evening by the coroner's jury at Fairville in the case of 3-year-old Velma McGlinchey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank McGlinchey, who died recently of pneumonia.

The verdict set out that chiropractic treatment given by Dr. H. T. Baker had a detrimental effect on the child, but that the illness was so far advanced that death would in all probability have ensued in any case. The jury spent exactly two hours in deliberating on the finding.

The inquest had occasioned great interest as it was one of the first of its kind in Canada, and several of the leading medical practitioners in the city had contributed to the evidence which the jury was called upon to consider.

Jury's Verdict.

The evidence had been concluded the previous evening and addresses by counsel and interested parties were heard last evening after which the coroner delivered his charge and the jury retired. They went out at 9.15, returning at 11.15 when they announced through their foreman, Marshal Stout, that they had reached a verdict.

The jury found that Velma Roberts had died of pneumonia on April 23, 1926, and that in their opinion chiropractic treatment had had a detrimental effect, but that as the disease was far advanced before Dr. Baker was called into the case death would probably have taken place in any event. Dr. Baker, the jury believed, was absolutely sincere in his belief that the treatment would be any benefit to the patient.

Legislation Urged.

The verdict referred appreciatively to the high standard which the legislature had set for the qualification of medical practitioners and recommended that immediate steps should be taken to secure legislation to decide who should be deemed qualified to practice chiropractic, and to what extent that act should be exercised, as a protection to the public, who must suffer or benefit by the services rendered.

A TRUE BILL WAS FOUND IN MURDER CASE

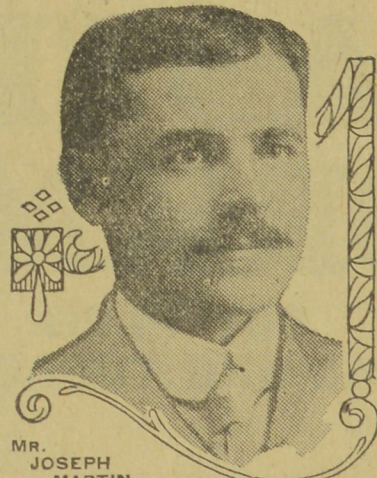
St. Andrews, May 11—In the Charlotte County Circuit Court, presided over by Mr. Justice Byrne, which opened here this afternoon, the grand jury found a true bill in the case of the King vs. Lloyd Johnson, charged with the murder of James Lord at Lord's Cove, Deer Island, in December last. The shooting took place at the residence of the accused on the morning of Dec. 6 and, according to the evidence adduced at the inquest, Lord was shot in the right side, just below the shoulder blade, by a .32 revolver in the hands of Lloyd Johnson. Lord was taken to the Calais hospital, where he died about four weeks later. The preliminary hearing in the case took place at St. Stephen on March 10.

P. Q. SHOE MEN ADOPT OPEN SHOP SYSTEM

Quebec, May 11—At a meeting of the Quebec Boot & Shoe Manufacturers' Association, held Monday, under the chairmanship of president Herbert Gale, it was unanimously decided by the fourteen manufacturers, who are members of the association that in future they will operate their factories on the open shop system. This is the outcome of the refusal of members of the Lasters' Union to accept the wage rates approved by the majority report of the arbitration board, which rendered its judgment two weeks ago.

CITY OF FREDERICTON BUILDING LAWS

The attention of property owners is directed to the following amendments to the Building Laws of the City of Fredericton, which became effective April 14th, 1926:

1. From and after the passing of this Act, it shall not be lawful to erect a wooden building of any kind within the Building Limits.

2. From and after the passing of this Act, the roof of every building erected within the Water, Fire, and Light Limits, and any roof removed within the said Limits, shall be of slate, gravel, metal, sparham roofing or other fire-resisting material.

3. From and after the passing of this Act, Public or Service Garages shall only be established in buildings constructed of brick, stone, or other fireproof material.

It is necessary to obtain a permit to build or repair a building.

Permits are issued at the office of the undersigned.

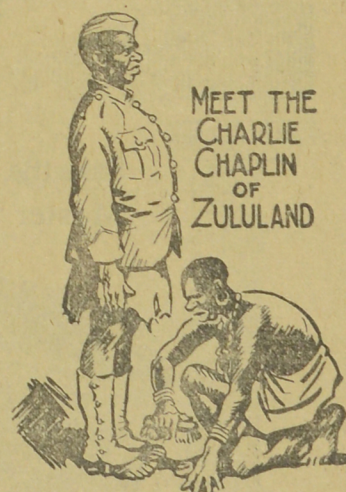
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
