The Senate of the University of New Brunswick in encaenial session here this morning decided that the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws should be conferred upon Hon. J. E. M. Baxter, Premier of New Brunswick, W. J. S. Myles, principal of Saint John High School and A. O. Dawson of Montreal vice-president of Canadian Cottons Limited who is to address the graduating class on Thursday.

A report on the Memorial Building Fund was received. A report on the library was received and arrangements made to accommodate for publications not at present provided for. It was decided that at the next meeting of the Senate a report on the condition of the museum should be presented by a special committee.

Chancellor Jones reported on the safety vault and the committee on the subject was continued with power to act.

A report from the Endowment Fund Committee was received and approved.

Changes in Faculty.

The resignation of Dr. G. H. R. O'Donnell from the chair of French and German was reported by the Chancellor who also reported that there were three applications for appointment to the vacancy. The matter of making an appointment was left in the President and Chancellor with power to act. Applications for appointment to the additional chair of physics were reported and were left to the same officers to be dealt with.

An invitation was received from the University of Sheffield to attend an anniversary celebration, June 3rd. Lord Beaverbrook will be asked to represent the University of New Brunswick at the celebration.

From the U. N. B. Club of Fredericton a report was received that \$8,000 had been pledged in this city toward the Endowment Fund.

BEQUEST TO OPERATOR AT THE CAPIOL

Chesley Cooper operator in the projecting room of the Capitol Theatre has received word of the death of an uncle which while causing regret also causes pleasure as the nephew has been substantially remembered in the will.

The uncle died in California leaving an estate valued at \$100,000. Under the terms of the will Mr. Cooper and a brother of his are bequeathed \$5,000 each and two sisters of theirs receive \$10,000 each. The residue of the estate, estimated at \$70,000 is left to their father.

Mr. Cooper belongs to Nova Scotia where his father is residing not far from Truro following the occupation of farmer and lumberman.

ASA DELONG AGED MAN FOUND DEAD IN RIVER

Louis Paul of St. Mary's Indian Reserve Found Body—Evidently Had Fallen in River.

The body of Asa DeLong a man of eighty years, was found between six and seven o'clock this morning floating in an eddy just below the Phoenix Square wharf. An Indian named Louis Paul of the St. Mary's Reserve, who was in a canoe found the body floating with the head above water.

Inquest Not Necessary.

Dr. D. W. Ross, coroner, was notified and viewed the body. He decided that death had been due to natural causes the deceased evidently having fallen into the river. Death had occurred some eight hours before. No inquest is to be held.

Died Near Home.

The deceased made his home with his son Harry DeLong, in Campbell street little more than a hundred yards from where his body was found. He had been engaged in transporting driftwood to his home and may have been on the waterfront late Tuesday night for that reason.

The deceased is survived by two sons Harry DeLong of Fredericton and George DeLong of Houlton, Me. also by two sisters Mrs. Elizabeth Wood of Fredericton and Mrs. Austin Gill of Vancouver, B. C.

The funeral will take place Thursday at 2.30 p. m. from the home of Harry DeLong, 324 Campbell street. Rev. I. A. Corbett will conduct the service. Interment will be made in the Rural Cemetery.

To Receive Honorary D. Sc.

Edward E. Brydone Jack is expected here Thursday to have conferred upon him the honorary degree of Doctor of Science which was decided upon last year by the Senate of the University of N. B. Mr. Jack has been Supervising Engineer for the Department of Public Works of Canada at Victoria, B. C. He formerly was professor of Civil Engineering at U. N. B. His father was president of the University.

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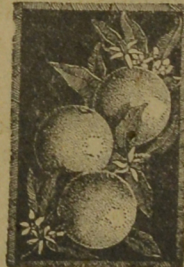
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
