# Board of Trade Grant Remains at Reduced Figure

## Council Divided Evenly and Mayor Clark Voted Against Increasing the Amount—Delegation From Board Presented Petition and Presented Argument—Grant of \$750 Alternative to Removal to City Hall.

The Board of Trade grant remains as it was \$750, by vote of the City Council Monday night after hearing a delegation from the Board and receiving a largely signed petition the prayer of which was that the grant be \$1,500 as before. The decision was reached on the casting vote of His Worship Mayor Clark who has opposed the grant for some time. The former vote was 7 to 3 against the larger amount. However Ald. Goodspeed and Ald. Hay voted for it last night but Ald. Thompson who had been away voted against it and the Council divided evenly putting the decision up to the Mayor.

The vote was taken in the committee room the Council meeting in committee in preparation for tonight's monthly meeting. The delegation from the Board of Trade was received in the Council Chamber.

**The Delegation.**  
The delegation was composed of President Alex. Murray, Hon. C. D. Richards, Stanley Douglass, J. H. Fleming, J. M. Lemont, H. A. Watson, J. D. Palmer, Dr. C. C. Jones, George W. Hodge, H. S. Campbell, W. W. Laskey.

**President Murray.**  
President Murray presented a petition with one hundred and forty signatures praying that the grant of \$1,500 to the Board of Trade be continued. He also spoke in support.

**J. M. Lemont.**  
J. M. Lemont addressing the Council pointing out that commercial conditions in Fredericton had changed to a marked extent. The sawmilling industry had almost disappeared. Something must take its place, Fredericton should emphasize her advantages as a residential city. Her educational advantages also deserved publicity as did her position as a distributing centre. Tourist business also had its possibilities. The Board of Trade was the body which would place such matters before the public. Its office was the centre of information and publicity.

**Hon. C. D. Richards.**  
Hon. C. D. Richards said he would refer particularly to tourist business. Increased attention was to be given to tourist traffic in all provinces particularly in Eastern Canada. New Brunswick was in position with the advantages she possessed, to share largely in that business.

Hon. Mr. Richards outlined the developments which had resulted in the organization of the New Brunswick Tourist and Resources Association. Since its organization a feeling had appeared throughout the Province, that the Association did not display sufficient activity. The subject was discussed frankly with the Association and the cause of objection to quite an extent was recognized. The result was that a reorganization was determined upon. It had taken place last week as probably had been noticed from the press. Representation of all parts of the Province was given.

The speaker went on to outline the system under which it was intended to have the Association function. It would be necessary to have active local organizations in operation in all

parts of the Province and the interests of none was to be neglected.

It was an anomalous condition to find that in Fredericton the existence of the Board of Trade would be threatened by a reduction in the city grant, as the Board of Trade would be the organization which would be expected to promote tourist publicity. He recognized that everyone was interested in this matter and that the City Council was also. The desire for economy was worthy of praise but he could hardly agree with the opinion that the grant should be reduced.

**Query by His Worship.**  
His Worship asked if the Tourist Committee of the Board of Trade had been active last year.

Hon. Mr. Richards said he could not give details but from personal observation he had noticed numerous persons making inquiries at the Board of Trade office. It was his opinion that tourists would prefer to go to a place where they would have every opportunity to examine maps and literature.

H. S. Campbell explained that owing to lack of funds the Tourist Committee was unable to function in 1925 but distribution of literature had been performed at the Board office by the Secretary.

Mr. Campbell opposed the reduction in the grant arguing that the city was going to place itself in a ridiculous position by reducing the grant, so killing Board of Trade activities, and hiring a stenographer at a cost almost as great as the reduction in the grant.

**Dr. C. C. Jones.**  
Dr. C. C. Jones argued in favor of the full grant of \$1,500 for the Board of Trade. He always had taken an interest in community activities. The Board of Trade room was a community centre and of great value for publicity. The amount of the grant was not so large as to be a marked burden on the taxpayer. Possibly sufficient interest had not been shown by members of the Board.

**J. D. Palmer.**  
J. D. Palmer said he believed the membership of the Board was to be increased but even with more members the full amount of the grant would be needed. He hoped the council would see the way clear to grant \$1,500.

**Aid From Central Organization.**  
Ald. Mitchell asked if any financial aid could be expected from the central tourist organization to the Fredericton Association.

Hon. Mr. Richards said he could not announce details but he believed that the intention was to work in conjunction with local associations.

**Mayor's Remarks.**  
His Worship Mayor Clark said the delegation had presented a petition which deserved the fullest consideration. He felt sure that it would receive that from the Council.

He was exceedingly disappointed that nothing new had been urged by the delegation. Mr. Lemont had mentioned that there should be a change of policy and it could not be truer than there should be such change in connection with the Board of Trade. He spoke in sympathy with the Board and wished to see it function to its highest extent. Tourist business was needed and it was admitted that tourist activities had been dormant since the withdrawal of the Provincial grant. It was actually true that for many months of the year the Secretary of the Board of Trade had nothing to do.

He could not admit that the existence of the Board of Trade was threatened. Surely there could be something done by the business community to arouse interest in the Board. If something new and concrete were proposed in connection with the tourist business, he was in sympathy with the Board but must express his disappointment that nothing new had been offered.

**New Lease of Life.**  
President Murray expressed his thanks and said it was the intention of the Board of Trade to take on a lease of life.

His Worship the Mayor said that he was pleased to hear that. Considered in Committee.

The Council withdrew to the Committee room where the matter was considered.

Knight moved that an additional grant of \$750 be given the Board of Trade.

**Ald. Mitchell.**  
Ald. Mitchell said he had not changed his mind and believed that the Board could function with a reduced grant. Some of the delegates seemed to have the idea that the grant of \$750 was to be given whether the Board continued at its office or not. That was not his impression of the resolution which was that the grant of \$750 was to be given or accommodation at the City Hall provided. After listening to the explanation of Hon. Mr. Richards he was of the opinion that tourist business in Fredericton would be aided by the central organization. With some greater activity on the part of the Board it should be able to continue at its office.

**An Alternative.**  
Ald. Ross asked whether the grant of \$750 was additional or alternative to accommodation at City Hall.

Secretary-Treasurer Chevalier said his record was that the grant was to be \$750 or the office was to be removed to the City Hall.

**Good Case Made Out.**  
Ald. Smith said the delegation had made out a good case and he favored increasing the grant as he had moved.

Ald. Currier said that there seemed to be very little interest in the Board of Trade. The recent special meeting had fewer than twenty attending.

The vote stood as follows:—  
Yea—Ross, Goodspeed, McKnight, Smith, Hay.

Nay—Richards, Davidson, Thompson, Currier, Mitchell.

The Mayor declared the motion lost.
