WHERE SALT IS KING.

Sitting at your dinner table and casually sprinkling a few grains of salt on your potatoes or celery, you hardly realize what it would mean to be without salt for a day or a week or a month.

Down in the South American country of Ecuador, right now, there is a salt famine. Something has occurred to disrupt the usual flow of this humble commodity. And you can guess the result if you have not already read it in the papers.

A band of inhabitants in the city of Cuenca raided a government warehouse in which salt was stored. So desperate were the attackers that four of them were killed in encounters with police.

Farm laborers in another instance plotted to hold up a train loaded with the precious mineral. Imagine a hold up directed not against amils or pay-rolls or silk or gems, but salt!

Here is exaltation of the humble. Here is the proof of the preciousness of things which ordinarily are taken for granted.

The supply of salt in salt mines and the ocean is sufficient so none need worry about the exhaustion of this natural resource, so essential to the health of men and cattle. But a temporary scarcity might be created, even of salt. Let us hope to be spared this discomfort, at least until coal famines have been removed from the list of periodic troubles. Who wants to stand in line waiting for salt—and perhaps being told to go and get a certificate of moral integrity from the salt administrator?

A YORK COUNTY WINNER.

A telegram from Mr. James Bremner, live stock superintendent for the provincial government, to Hon. Lewis Smith, Minister of Agriculture, announces that Mr. Elden Robinson of Harvey Station, York County, is among the prize winners in the Holstein classes at the Royal Winter Fair at Toronto. The Royal is recognized as one of the greatest live stock shows on the American continent and a man to win a prize there must have the goods. Mr. Bremner was no doubt pleased to make the announcement, and there is no doubt that his message was equally pleasing to the Minister of Agriculture, who is himself a successful live stock raiser. Some of the best live stock in the province is now produced in the Parish of Manners-Sutton and Mr. Robinson is to be congratulated on his success. New Brunswick is capable of producing as good live stock as can be found on this continent, and the industry is one which should be given every encouragement.

Statistics issued by the Department of Trade and Commerce at Ottawa show that in the matter of births this province during the month of April 1926, beat out the province of British Columbia with 200,000 more population and also the Province of Nova Scotia with 140,000 more people than we possess. In New Brunswick there were born during April 973 children, 523 males and 450 females, including nine pairs of twins, while Nova Scotia was only able to produce during the same month 935, 465 males and 470 females. In British Columbia the total was only 822, the mild climate of that province no doubt proving a deterrent. Prince Edward Island which has about one fourth of the population of New Brunswick, was only able to come across with 100 births during April. Why should there be pessimism in regard to the future of New Brunswick?

Several men were discussing the other evening the benefit of a college graduate has a better chance for success than those who are not. To get a good position with a large corporation in Canada and the United States you must have a college education. Some graduates of U. N. B. who have only been out of College two or three years are already holding splendid positions and drawing from \$3,000 to \$3,500 a year salary. 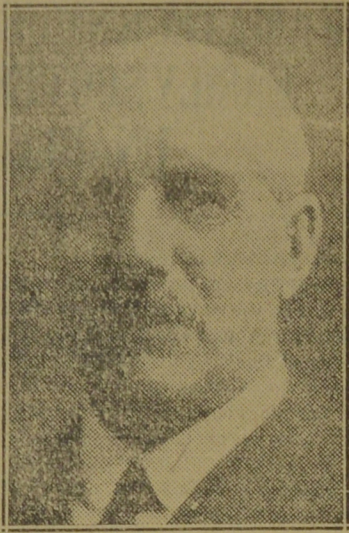

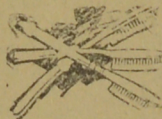

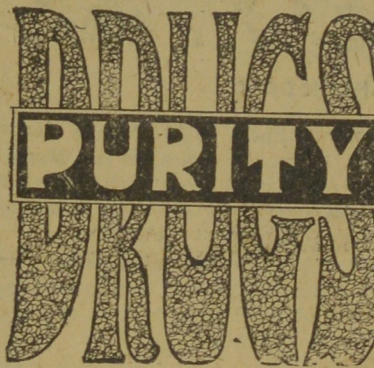
