### PROGRESS OF TRANSPORTATION.

An American, Lester D. Gardner, has just arrived in London on the last flight over the established commercial air routes of Europe, western Asia and north Africa. He has been able to cover 21,000 miles by flying machine, visiting points as far apart as countries have been visited. Sixty-five Stockholm and Bagdad. Twenty-eight different men have acted as pilots. The average speed was ninety miles an hour.

The rapid transportation of railroad steamship has been pronounced by diplomatists and politicians a confounded nuisance because it brought European nations too close to one another and made them realize how small they were.

But the progress of transportation is not going to be stayed by the pettiness of diplomatic agents and the jealousies of politicians. It is advancing in spite of them. Adjustments for the purpose of maintaining peace will have to be made by the governments and not by science and mechanical invention. The governments would like to have it the other way round. But they are just as helpless in the matter as was that British statesman who tried to make the locomotive unlawful upon the ground that its high speed would tear the venturesome passenger limb from limb.

### RECIPE FOR SUCCESS.

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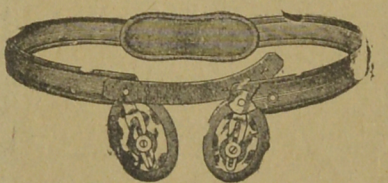
