

INSPECTORS
SEIZED LIQUOR ON
BRICK KILN ROAD

Lay in Wait for Owner
But He Did Not Touch
the Booze — Was in
Bags.

Sub-Inspectors J. Duff King and Edward Duffy made a seizure of about eight cases of White Horse Cellar Scotch Whisky in the "bog" on the Brick Kiln Road Tuesday night. The liquor was smuggled and was in bags twelve to a bag. The lot was hidden some yards off the road in low bushes with a couple of small cedar trees thrown over it. The tracks of a car led quite close to the spot which was some two and a half miles out.

Officers Laid in Wait.

The booze had been spotted by Sub-Inspector Duffy previously and the desire was that the owner be caught transferring a portion. With that in view the two inspectors concealed themselves in the vicinity from early afternoon until late at night. No person touched the liquor however and it is probable that the owners had been tipped off by some one who had seen the officers go out the road. The rain and the mosquitoes did not make the wait of the inspectors any too pleasant.

For Local Consumption.

The inspectors are of the opinion that the Scotch was for a local consumption the owner bringing in supplies to this city as he needed them. The loss will check sales for a time at least.

It is reported that an advance of five dollars a case in bootleg liquor has gone into effect recently because of increased difficulty in smuggling and activity of the prohibition officials.

LOON CAUGHT
IN SALMON NET.

A salmon fisherman with net set in the River Saint John a short distance west of Fredericton made a most unusual catch Tuesday night when a male loon became entangled in his net and was taken out alive and in good condition this morning. The strange catch will be reported to the Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon. Loons are now given protection under the game regulations. If permitted Talmage Currie, the fisherman who caught the waterfowl, will donate it to a public park should one want it. The Migratory Birds Act specifies that the loon is a migratory non-game bird and it is doubtful if it can be kept in captivity legally.

RAW MILK
AND CREAM WILL
BE SOLD LEGALLY

Sub-District Health
Regulations Notwith-
standing — Depart-
ment of Health Gives
Notice.

The question of pasturized and raw milk which has been a vexed one in some sections of the Province is dealt with in the Royal Gazette today in the publication of a lengthy notice on the recommendation of the Minister of Health which permits the sale of Raw Milk or Raw Cream. The wording of the opening is as follows:—

"Notwithstanding any regulations of any sub-district Board of Health it shall be lawful to sell hold for sale and offer for sale for human consumption in the Province of New Brunswick milk and cream to be known as Raw Milk or Raw Cream—Grade A."

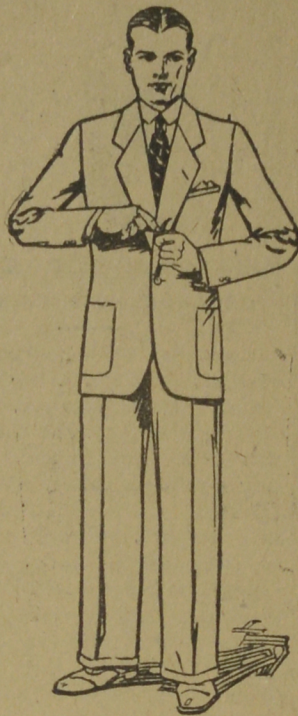
