

Of Interest to the Women

WAY OF THE MODE IS EVEN VERSATILE.

Voile undergarments in soft pastel shades will be worn by the majority of women this summer. Although voile has not been especially popular with better dressed women, this year we find undergarments of fine imported voile trimmed with lace or with contrasting piping which is far cooler than silk and quite as beautiful. Lace and pleating are the usual trims, the lace being dyed to match the color of the voile. All light shades are being used as well as black trimmed in black lace. Even flowered voiles are pressed into service for undergarments.

Taffeta frocks often have large scallops about the hemline which are bordered with chiffon to give the transparent hem effect. Even black satin coats are shown with chiffon hemlines and chiffon sleeve ends.

It is an accepted fact that the large hat is the mode of the hour. This, it is said, started at Palm Beach and has extended on through the season. It promises to become the prevailing mode at all of the resorts during the coming season. Those of Milan straw are generally conceded to be the smartest ones. They are simply trimmed with a band of grosgrain ribbon that is drawn into a cocarde at the side.

CHEESE CRUMPETS.

Crumpets that we use here are the English muffins that appear in the bakery shops as though they were uncooked on one side. This is not the fact, however. They are left thus unbrowned with the expectation that the purchaser will fry this uncooked looking side in hot butter.

No such procedure is ours when serving cheese crumpets.

The crumpet is laid in a biscuit pan brown side down and upon this unbrowned side we place as many chunks of American cheese as it will hold. Over the top is laid a strip of thinly sliced bacon. Into the oven with the top burner to broil the bacon and toast the cheese and crumpet. Usually requires about eight or ten minutes to cook.

PINEAPPLE SALAD.

One quarter pound endive, six slices pineapple, Mexican salad dressing.

On individual salad plates place the endive which has first been allowed to stand in cold water for ten minutes. On each bed of endive put a slice of the pineapple and over all a tablespoonful of the salad dressing.

CARAMEL FROSTING.

Pour one half cup of water over one half cup of caramelized sugar and stir over low heat until the caramel is melted; add one and one half cups of granulated sugar, stir until melted, cover and let boil to 240 degree Fahr., on the sugar thermometer, or to 238 degrees Fahr. It will then spin a thread four inches long when poured from the tip of a spoon. Then pour this in a fine stream on the whites of four

eggs beaten until stiff and dry, beating constantly; continue beating until cool enough to spread.

To caramelize the sugar, put it in an agateware frying pan and stir constantly until the sugar becomes a golden brown. Then use as directed.

BOYS TREED BY A MOOSE

Augusta, Me., May 3.—Two boys were treed by a bull moose four miles out and almost in sight of the dome of the State Capital yesterday afternoon. They say the moose came along the road and threatened to charge them and they climbed a tree. After watching him for a time he ambled off to the game preserve territory where it is said that a number of moose have wintered.

HON. MR. FARRIS IN FAVOR OF PROTECTION

Victoria: Editorially the Colonist says:

Hon. J. W. deB. Farris, a former Attorney-General, one who is a power in the provincial Liberal party, makes no secret of his belief that the policy of protection is essential to the building up of British Columbia's industries. He has been speaking before the B. C. products Bureau at Vancouver, and what he had to say must have delighted the hearts of its members as it indicates that provincial Liberalism, at all events as represented by one of its chief figures, does not believe in the effort of the Progressives and Liberals at Ottawa to effect continuous reductions in the tariff. Mr. Farris says that the campaign to buy B. C. products involves two fundamental economic principles—Protection and Reciprocity. His opinion is that Canada has been and will continue to be a high protection country, and, in addition to the tariff barriers against the manufactured products of other lands, he advocates voluntary protection by co-operative buying in the home markets.

The buying in home markets, Mr. Farris believes, might be made to increase the industrial payroll in British Columbia by 20 per cent. His remarks are particularly appropriate at a time when a Home Products Fair is in progress in this community, and that is why we draw attention to them. The great majority of public opinion in this Province is aware of and acquiesces in the doctrine that British Columbia's industries require greater protection. Mr. Farris has shown what is the trend of thought and his dicta are all the more important coming from one of his political faith. He has emphasized, too, the value of buying in the home market, the appreciation of which policy cannot be enlarged upon too often. Just at present Victorians have an opportunity of seeing what the home market produces. The Drill Hill provides an educational display of unusual interest. It should have the effect of lending additional emphasis to the advice which Mr. Farris has tendered to the B. C. Products Bureau.

JUDGE APPOINTED.

Ottawa, May 3.—It is officially announced today that Frank Ford, K. C., of Edmonton, has been appointed a judge of the trial division of the Supreme Court of Alberta. He succeeds Mr. Justice McCarthy, resigned.
