DATE LOAF CAKE.

1 pound dates, after stoned
 1 pound English walnut meats
 1 cup flour
 2 teaspoons baking powder
 1-2 teaspoon salt
 1 cup sugar
 4 eggs
 1 teaspoon vanilla.
 Have dates and nut meats as whole as possible. Sift flour, baking powder and salt twice. Then add sugar. Sift again and add to dates and nuts. Beat in yolks, fold in whites. Bake one hour in moderate oven.

JELLY JUMBLES.

1-2 cup butter
 1-2 cup sour milk
 1-2 teaspoon salt
 1 cup sugar
 1-2 teaspoon soda
 1 egg
 Flour enough to roll out—about
 2 1-2 or 3 cups. Spread with cur-
 rant jelly.

COFFEE CAKE.

2 cups sugar
 1 cup shortening
 1-2 cup butter
 1 cup molasses
 1 cup raisins and citron
 1 teaspoon soda
 1 cup coffee
 2 eggs
 5 cups flour
 Lemon or vanilla flavoring.

NUT CAKE.

2 cups sugar
 1-2 pound raisins
 1-2 pound currants
 1-4 pound citron
 1 teaspoon soda
 1 nutmeg
 1-2 teaspoon vanilla
 1-4 teaspoon almond extract
 1 cup butter
 1 cup sweet milk
 4 eggs
 1 pint nuts

"is good COFFEE"Report of Committee on
Administration of Justice
Adopted by CouncilSpecial Committee Named to Consider the Claim
of City of Fredericton for Overcharging in
Justice Accounts 1921-24—Municipal Home
Commissioners Named for the Various Par-
ishes.

The Municipal Council of York on Wednesday afternoon held a brief session on account of the time occupied by the joint Administration of Justice committee of City and County which was in session on the adjustment of accounts. The report of that committee was presented to the Council and adopted. The Council also appointed the commissioners for the Municipal Home from the various parishes. The towns of Devon and Marysville will name their own commissioners. A request of H. M. Edwards one of the Board of Valuers that the recompense of the valuers be increased because five dollars a day was not enough for services and hotel bills, was laid over for further consideration.

A special committee was appointed to consider the claim of the City of Fredericton that the city had been overcharged to a total of \$5,101.60 for Administration of Justice for years 1921-24.

Valuator Wants More Pay

Warden Cowperthwaite presented a communication from H. M. Edwards

of Meductic one of the valuers of-
 fering objection to the rate of recom-
 pense of five dollars per day, includ-
 ing hotel expenses. Mr. Edwards
 wrote that he had hesitated to take
 the oath but did so as he did not
 wish to put the County to expense
 for the selection of a new valuator to
 succeed him. When in Fredericton
 making up the valuation G. L. Pugh
 had been able to live at his home
 in Nashwaaksis but the writer and
 his colleague had to live at a hotel
 for five weeks. On the motion by
 Coun. C. W. Pond the communication
 was laid on the table until Friday
 morning.
