The Grand Falls Legislation May be Introduced Today; More Supply Items Passed

The Legislature yesterday afternoon disposed of the remaining items of Supply in the Departments of Health and Agriculture, with very little discussion. Supply was made the order of the day for Tuesday of next week, which probably means that if there are any supplementary estimates they will be brought down at that time.

As the enquiry into charges preferred by Mr. Atkinson of Sunbury against the River Valley Lumber Company occupied the centre of the stage the House took recess early in the afternoon to allow the Public Accounts Committee to meet.

At the evening session of the House, Hon. Mr. Baxter presented a petition praying for the passage of an act to incorporate the New Brunswick Power Company and another to incorporate the International Paper Company of New Brunswick. These bills, as well as another relating to the Fraser Companies, Limited, have to do with the development of Grand Falls Water Power Company. The bills are expected to be laid before the House this afternoon.

Assembly Chamber.

The House met at 3.20 p. m. The Saint John City Assessment Act was read a third time.

Mr. Peck reported from the Municipalities Committee.

HON. MR. BAXTER moved that the Public Accounts Committee have leave to sit during this session of the House.

HON. MR. BAXTER presented a petition for an Act relating to Fraser Companies, Limited.

The House went into Committee to consider bills relating to highways and sidewalks in the parish of Lancaster and to Fredericton Assessment.

HON. MR. BAXTER, explaining the first-mentioned Bill, said it was to legalize certain procedure of the assessors of the parish of Lancaster during the past few years.

The bill was agreed to.

Fredericton Bill Passed.

HON. MR. RICHARDS said the Fredericton Assessment Bill had been twice before the Municipalities Committee and very carefully gone over.

He therefore would suggest that the amended sections only be fully read.

This bill was also agreed to as amended.

The Committee rose and reported both bills, which were ordered read a third time tomorrow.

MR. DICKSON submitted the report of the Agricultural Committee.

The House took recess until eight o'clock.

Health Items Voted.

The House resumed at eight p. m., and went into Committee of Supply to consider the Estimates of the Department of Health, which were all voted without discussion.

The Estimates of the Department of Agriculture, which were allowed to stand, namely: Contingencies \$3250, Agricultural Societies \$24,823, and Butter and Cheese Factories, \$9,412, were then passed.

The Committee rose and reported and the resolutions were concurred in by the House.

HON. MR. LEGER moved that the House again go into Committee of Supply on Tuesday next.

The House went into Committee to consider bills relating to estates of intestates and respecting theatres, cinematographs and other amusements.

After consideration and amendments these bills were reported, ordered engrossed and read a third time tomorrow.

The following bills were read a second time: Respecting Memorials and Executions, to amend the Workmen's Compensation Act; to amend the Prohibitory Act, to repeal the Widow's Relief Act.

HON. MR. BAXTER introduced a bill to amend The New Brunswick Electric Power Act of 1920, and a bill respecting the Court of Divorce. He said the purpose of this bill was to provide two terms for the divorce Court instead of three terms annually as at present, and the dates proposed were the first Tuesday in April and the first Tuesday in November.

HON. MR. BAXTER presented a petition for a bill to incorporate the St. John River Power Company, also one to incorporate the New Brunswick International Paper Company.

A BIG SNOW STORM HITS NOVA SCOTIA

Halifax, April 20—Coming just when sturdy fore-runners of spring were forcing their way through fast melting banks of winter snow and chasing the mercury to more seasonable heights, a blizzard of mid-winter dimensions swept down over Nova Scotia today.

Nova Scotia tonight was buried under drifts of snow six and seven feet deep in some places, traffic by land and sea was badly crippled and stopped altogether in some instances while along the shores a great loss was suffered by fishermen who have already had to cope with disastrous losses from storms.

Yesterday started with glorious sunlight and a high thermometer. At midnight there was a thick blanket of snow on the ground and promise of more.


