SUMATRA THE
FEATURE HORSE
AT CLEVELAND

Had Easy Win in the 2.08 Trot—Murphy's Rose Scott No Better Than Third.

Cleveland, July 7—Sumatra, owned by J. J. Schlesinger, Milwaukee, and driven by Ben F. White, Leamington, scored an easy victory in the Ohio, \$5,000 stake, for 2.08 trotters today in the Grand Circuit feature at North Randall.

The 4-year-old Belwin mare took the first two heats, defeating among others, Tommy Murphy's Rose Scott, which ruled heavy favorite. In stepping the first mile in 2.03 1-5, Sumatra equalled the record for the stake.

"Bunny" Williams was as wild as a hawk in the first inning, walking three men. He was replaced by McGinnis in the third but he could not stop the Marysville attack.

"Bob" Estey started the pitching for the home team and lasted one inning. Fredericton took a two run lead but could not hold it after Jack McInnis relieved Estey and took up pitching in the second inning.

The Scoring.

Fredericton took a two-run lead in the opening inning, a base on balls, a stolen base, a sacrifice, a single and two errors produced the runs.

Marysville was behind only until their half of the inning, when they netted three. Williams was generous in issuing free tickets, three in all in this inning, combined with a passed ball and a double, and a single, was all that was needed to give the home team a lead.

Fredericton scored one run in the third. A base on balls, a sacrifice hit and a single gave them the tally. The last Fredericton run came in the fourth frame. A couple of errors, a sacrifice hit, and a single produced the score.

Marysville's big inning, which is sure to come, came in the third. Sin-

gles by Minue, Hodgson and E. MacPherson, combined with two sacrifice hits, a base on balls, a stolen base, and a passed ball by Babbitt gave them four runs and enough to win almost any ball game.

Solid slugging in the fifth produced the eighth Marysville run. L. White hit for three bases and scored on McInnis long fly to Coyle at centrefield. Earle MacPherson went out trying to steal third base after he had hit for two bases.

Hersey's error let H. White reach first in the last inning. He went to third when Clark threw out Bailey at first. Marysville was working the hit and run play to advantage, all through the game. White scored when McLenahan threw out Minue at first. That was the last Marysville run and it was not needed.

Jack Babbitt is back with the team again and worked good behind the bat.

The celebration for Christy Mathewson took the form of a 3-inning game, wherein Fred Clark, friendly enemy of the famous "Big Six" in the old days, lost two flies; Rube Marquard stole second, and Roger Bresnahan snared them behind the plate with his bare hand. The seven thousand fans who contributed through the gate about \$20,000 toward a memorial for Christy were pleased to see "Matty's" team win the contest, 4-3.

The Giants defeated Washington only after Walter Johnson had left the mound. Walter worked two innings and fanned four before he went to the showers. A home run by Goose Goslin with two on gave Washington a lead in the seventh, but in the Giant's half of the same, Muesel and Lindstrom smashed for the circuit and enough runs to win.
