

STREET WORK WILL OBLITERATE KETCHUM BRIDGE

**City Engineer will Make
Fill There — Twenty-
foot Tarvia Pavement
on Waterloo Row.**

The Ketchum Bridge so called which spans the First Creek on Waterloo Row is to become a thing of the past as the result of the street improvement plans which are to be put into effect in the course of the next few weeks. City Engineer J. D. MacKay is to convert the bridge into a fill. This can be done very easily the chief task being to widen the fill to the width of the right-of-way at the bottom. A pipe will be laid in the bottom of the fill to take care of possible accumulation of surface water in the bed of the old creek inside the fill. This pipe will be plugged at each end but may be opened to permit drainage when the level of the river permits.

Property Owners Agreeable.

Some time ago it was proposed that a valve similar to those installed in dykes on marshland be installed which would exclude the river-water but which would permit the outflow of the surface water as the river-level fell. The First Creek has ceased to exist above Grey street and the drainage of surface water will be slight. Owners of property in the vicinity are desirous that the bridge be done away with.

Tarvia Pavement.

Tarvia pavement to the width of twenty feet is to be laid from the C. N. R. station to Lansdowne street and Waterloo Row beyond that point is to receive a dressing of gravel. The road to the Experimental Station also is to be reconstructed in gravel for some distance. City Engineer McKay expects to have a crew at work tomorrow making the fill at the Ketchum Bridge. Concrete curb and gutter will not be laid as part of the tarvia street construction.
