ADDRESS BY HON.
C. D. RICHARDS

Added Portion of U. N. B. Encaenial Exercises — Memorial Windows and Chair—The Week's Activities.

The present week is one of importance in University of New Brunswick circles. The baccalaureate sermon was preached at St. Paul's Church, Sunday, the faculty meeting will be Tuesday night, the announcement of graduation and prize lists will be made Wednesday by Chancellor Jones, the Senate will meet Wednesday morning, the Associated Alumni and the Alumnae Society will hold their annual meetings Wednesday night and on Thursday afternoon the encaenial exercises will take place in the Memorial Hall.

The Senate will decide upon honorary degrees. The expectation is that two of those to be conferred will be upon Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, Premier of New Brunswick, and upon A. O. Dawson of Montreal, Vice-president of Canadian Cottons Limited, who is to deliver the address to the Class of 1926 at the encaenial exercises.

Dedicatory Address.

An added portion of the encaenial exercises will be the dedication of the memorials which have been installed within the Memorial Hall since the encaenia of 1925. The dedicatory address will be delivered by Hon. C. D. Richards, Minister of Lands and Mines, himself a graduate of the university. The memorials are the window erected by the Countess of Ashburnham to the late Earl of Ashburnham the window erected by Mrs. G. C. VanWart and her sister to their brother the late Lieut. George P. O. Fenwick and the chair presented by Mrs. James Bird as a memorial to her son the late Lieut. J. T. Hanning. Hon. Mr. Richards was an undergraduate at the university when both the deceased officers, who lost their lives in France, were attending the university.

Social Events.

Social events of Encaenial Week included a tea to be given by Mrs. C. C. Jones, wife of the Chancellor, Wednesday afternoon to members of the graduating class and their friends. Thursday afternoon following the encaenial exercises there will be tea in the Arts building by members of the Alumnae Society.

The annual university track and field meet will be held Tuesday afternoon.

FIRST RAFT
OF BANK-LOGS
ON SATURDAY

Heavy Arrivals Expected This Week—Oromocto Mill to Start Sawing Thursday — Driving Excellent.

The first raft of bank-logs to be run this season arrived at Springhill Saturday. Others arrived this morning. During the present week there will be a steady run of them as conditions now are good. Practically all the logs are on contract for Fraser Companies Limited at the Victoria Mill here or for Stanley Douglass Company Limited in Devon. The cut of bank logs is lighter than usual.

The Saint John River remains at a steady height the cool weather preventing any further rise. The same weather maintains a good pitch of water in the streams for driving operations.

Many Drives In.

Fraser Companies Limited are rafting at Greer Creek that drive being brought in a few days ago. On the Pokiook the drive will be in today or Tuesday.

Stanley Douglass Company Limited got the Macnacquac drive in Saturday and on the Dunbar the drive will be in today. The Cross Creek drive also is in good position.

On the Nashwaak.

On the main Nashwaak the drives of the Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Company have been on for some time. Ice in the ponds is interfering to some extent although the water is at a fine pitch.

On the Oromocto.

The River Valley Lumber Company of Oromocto has all its drives in except that on the South Branch of the Oromocto which starts Tuesday. The driving dam at the outlet of South Oromocto Lake was seriously damaged by ice and water but the height of the freshet is so great that it is believed that the logs can be brought out all right. The Rockwell, Newcastle, North Branch, Lyon and Little River drives of that company are in. The expectation is that the River Valley mill will start sawing Thursday. High water has delayed sawing somewhat.

SEIZURE OF
LIQUOR MADE AT
ST. STEPHEN

Seven Barrels of Liquor and Drum of Alcohol, Valued at \$1,500 — Beer Samples Taken Here.

Prohibition officers were active over the week-end. Chief Inspector W. L. McFarlane has received reports of the seizure of liquor and alcohol valued at \$1,500 at St. Stephen and another seizure of liquor at Port Elgin.

At St. Stephen a search of premises of a former vendor resulted in seizure of seven barrels of liquor and a drum of alcohol. This raid followed closely upon the prosecution of another former vendor which had resulted in conviction and the imposition of a fine of \$200.

The seizure at Port Elgin was of four cases of liquor the report being received this morning.

Local Beer Raid.

As the result of information received Inspector Fraser Saunders visited a local restaurant during the week-end and interrupted a beer party. The inspector took samples of the beer in the possession of members of the party and will have them analyzed.

Weather Very Unseasonable.

The weather over the week-end was most unseasonable. Although Saturday was May 8th snow fell in sufficient quantities to remain white on the ground and on Sunday May 9th there also were squalls of snow alternating with rain. The temperature was low. This kind of weather is preventing the snow in the woods from melting rapidly and the level of streams and rivers is being kept steady.

Indian Was Drunk.

Peter Brooks of the St. Mary's Indian Reserve, Devon, was arrested during the week-end on a charge of drunkenness. He appeared in the police court this morning and was convicted. A penalty of eight dollars' fine or thirty days in gaol was imposed. As usual the accused was hazy about the identity of the man who gave him the liquor.
