## MANY WOMEN EXCEL MEN IN EMPLOY OF BANKING HOUSES

New York, Feb. 6—A woman is the top-notch "salesman" of one of New York's largest bond houses, leading the list for 1925 sales. Another woman while connected with a firm not in the bond selling business, has had the experience of selling bonds "on her own."

Still another has made of herself an author and expert on the difficult subject of municipal bonds. And a woman has for several years consistently held her place with the leaders in the sale of the widest range of securities in a house where she has been a pioneer in establishing the right of women to be "people" in Wall Street as well as in suffrage campaigns. "Women of bond age," an archaeologist wit of the future might call them, looking back over the recorded membership of the Women's Bond Club of New York.

All four of these women are members of this exclusive organization. To attach their names to their records would be regarded by some as individual advertisements antagonistic to the high professional standards up held by the club.

When such speakers at Otto Kahn, Frank Vanderlip, George Roberts, George Vincent and Floyd Mundy have addressed the Wednesday luncheons of the Women's Bond Club, held at the Bankers' Club, they have known they were speaking to thirty "bondswomen" of standing in the Street. Membership requirements are high.

### Scholars and Mothers.

There are scholars and one time switchboard operators, mothers of families and recent college graduates, literary minds, mathematical wizards, wits and practical workers around the table at these luncheons. There are soft Virginia accents lively midwestern tones and precise Bostonian parlance, and there is a well groomed circle of smart French hats, severe tailcoats or softer satins, as personalities are best suited.

The start of the club, in October, 1921, was just four years after the first women had seeped tentatively into Wall Street via Liberty loan selling campaigns, says the Associated Press.

"We chartered our own organization when we reached the point of wanting the co-operation and exchange of ideas furnished by a professional fraternity, and found that because of overcrowding, and for other reasons, membership in the Men's Bond Club was not available," said Mrs. Jacob Riis. Mrs. Riis, today the head of the large bond saleswomen department of Bonbright & Co., has the task of selecting her

personnel from hundreds of candidates.

"Intelligence," she says, "patience and willingness to work untiringly are the main prerequisites of the bond saleswoman."

"And I take only women who are thrown on their own resources."

For beginners in bond selling a six months' course is required. The first year is one terrible effort. "Cold leads" must be followed and a clientele gradually built up.

"There is nothing sensational in the success that follows," said Mrs. Riis. "We can be very proud of such women as Miss Louise Watson of the Guaranty company, Miss Elizabeth Cook of Hemphill Noyes, Miss Merchant, here, and others like them, because they have slowly and painfully built up for themselves a real business."

Miss Watson, a Virginian, was in the business office of Bryn Wawr College, when she used the Liberty loan campaign of 1917 as a bridge from the academic to the financial world. Today she is one of the Guaranty company's topnotch salesmen.

Miss Elizabeth Cook of Hemphill Noyes, was another pioneer in bond selling. She was also the first president of the Women's Bond Club, the job today held down by Miss Suzanne Schulman of Bigelow & Co. At the present time Miss Cook's bright and pointed letters to bond salesmen are among the happiest daily offerings in the Street.

Miss Louise Davenport, now with Clark Williams & Co., while connected with a firm not in the business of bond selling, sold bonds on her own responsibility, participating in such offerings as those of Hambleton & Byllesby.

Teach at New York University.

Miss Eleanor Kerr, of Potter & Co., has made herself an authority on municipal bonds. She and Mrs. Riis, Miss Marguerite Knox and Miss Helen Merchant of Bonbright & Co. have made their expert information available to others by teaching extension courses at New York University or Columbia.

Probably the youngest women admitted to a bond house when she started four years ago was Miss Florence Bliss of Bonbright & Co. She started to success when inflamed by a bank president, who told her she could never sell bonds.

In the office of this pioneer employer of bond saleswomen, Bonbright & Co., hangs a chart measuring, from week to week, sales results. Today a woman's name is first, a woman's fourth, and three more in the first ten.

## CAROL'S REVOLT IS NO NOVELTY; MANY PRECEDENTS CAN BE CITED

Budapest, Feb. 6—Prince Carol's row with Queen Marie and renunciation of the succession to the Rumanian throne is no novelty in European royal families to most of whom Carol is related either by blood or marriage.

The king business has palled on a good many heirs to important European thrones. Even Frederick the Great made an effort in his youth to escape from Prussia and the harsh treatment of his father, King Frederick William I. His effort to get away to England was frustrated by his father who had two of his son's accomplices executed.

But Frederick the Great's affair with Barberina, the Italian dancer, after he had ascended the throne of Prussia, was kept under far better control than the love affairs of Prince Carol. When Frederick suspected the dancer mixing in politics he dismissed her from the court.

### Dancer Before Throne.

Ludwig I. of Bavaria told his cabinet he would rather give up his throne than break off his relations with Lola Montez, the dancer. One of Ludwig's ministries was called the "Lolaministerium," because Lola Montez had named it and directed affairs of state at will. She finally lost her political hold and had to flee. A little later, Ludwig had to surrender his throne to his son because of the scandal.

Lola Montez became a wanderer, appearing on the stage in most world capitals. Her notoriety, however, soon lost drawing power and she died in obscurity and was buried in Brooklyn.

Princess Louise of Saxony, tired of life at the Dresden court, eloped

with the French tutor of her sons M. Giron in December, 1902. Two years later her husband succeeded to the throne of Saxony as King Frederick Augustus III. Like Prince Carol of Rumania, she apparently was not constant in her love. She divorced the Frenchman and married an Italian musician whom she divorced. She now is living in straightened circumstances in Belgium.

### A True Love Affair.

Princess Louise of Belgium who died at Wiesbaden in 1924, married Prince Philip of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, but deserted him in favor of an Austrian cavalry officer. This apparently was a true love affair, as Princess Louise endured poverty with Capt. Mattiasick and nursed him during his final illness in Paris, a short time before her own death. She tried without success to break the will of her father, Leopold II., who left much of his property to his mistress the Baroness Vaughan.

Grand Duke Cyril, the Romanoff who holds court at Coburg and has solemnly been proclaimed Czar of All the Russias by his faithful White Russian followers, figured in a divorce case which his opponents insist would disqualify him for the Russian throne should the Soviet Government be replaced by a monarchy. The Grand Duchess Cyril born a princess of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, was first married to the Grand Duke of Hesse whom she divorced to marry the Russian nobleman.

The Austrian archduke, John Nepomuck Salvador, renounced all his titles and took command of a


