## PREMIER MUSSOLINI ISSUES WARNING TO GERMANY; SAYS CAMPAIGN BASED ON IGNORANCE

Rome, Feb. 7.—Premier Mussolini's speech in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday in which he warned Germany against the anti-Italian campaign carried on in the Reich was characterized frequently in political circles today as almost equivalent to the declaration of war against Germany.

All day long Mussolini's words of warning were discussed and his speech was declared to be one of the best, certainly the most significant, of his international statements since the Corfu incident.

In his speech Mussolini said: "Italy desires to be a sincere friend of the German people, but a friend looking Germany in the eye with her hands up."

#### Assails German Attack.

After characterizing the German attack at "nefarious, ridiculous and lying," the Premier went on, "We will be sufficiently explicit, and I believe that plain-speaking will serve through civilization and even peace—to alter slightly the old formula and declare that sometimes it is necessary to pay with two eyes for the loss of one, and with a whole set of teeth for the loss of one tooth."

Mussolini asserted that the recent address of the Bavarian Premier held in connection with the upper Adige was, "simply unheard of." The ridi-

culed Bavarian Prime Minister's invoking the Locarno spirit which he declared as having "become soft, evanescent, unsupportable and even hypocritical, like habitual things."

Mussolini expressed the belief that the German campaign was based on ignorance of virile Italian nation which had succeeded the Italy of a generation ago, and added:

"The Germans must learn the truth, since the Italian policy in the Upper Adige will not flinch one little bit."

He refused to admit that the Germans in the Upper Adige constituted a racial minority, instead of being the residuum of barbaric invasions, of the Brenner frontier.

#### Hopes Understanding.

"I hope my speech will be understood by those who should understand it," Mussolini continued "so that the Italian Government need not pass to concrete answers, as it would, if tomorrow the German government assumed direct responsibility for what is happening and what may happen in Germany."

He concluded his remarks by asking a newspaper editor to change the headline, "Fascist Italy will never lower the flag on Brenner," to "Fascist Italy can, if necessary, carry further beyond its tri-color but never lower it."

## ANDY LEARMONT PASSES AWAY AT TRURO, N. S.

After an illness of some months borne with great patience and uncomplainingly, there passed to his Heavenly Rest on the afternoon of Tuesday the 2nd, inst., at the home residence, Esplanade, Andrew H. Learmont, in the 64th year of his age.

He was born at Port Covington, N. Y., and came to Truro in 1887. His step-father, the late Walter Casson was at that time manager of the Truro branch of Frost and Wood, Ltd., and it was through him that Mr. Learmont came to this town. He acquired the Victoria Hotel, which still stand on the Esplanade, and after conducting it for several years he bought the old Parker House, then vacant, at the corner of the Esplanade and Outram street, opposite the railway station. On this site he erected the present Learmont Hotel, the opening of which took place in March, 1896. The old Parker House is the ell of the present fine building.

He was in the Hotel business until ill-health caused his retirement a few years ago.

He was passionately fond of horses and "Andy" Learmont's string of trotters were well known on almost every Speedway in the Maritime Provinces

## OPEN AIR ART SOLONS NOW VOGUE IN PARIS

Paris, Feb. 6.—Open air art salons have caught on in Paris. Born in Montmartre, the idea has spread to other parts of the city where the streets are not so busy that an outdoor picture show is a nuisance. The latest to be held, by permission of the prefect of police, was along the aristocratic boulevard of Saint Germain, under the auspices of a group of painters known as "The Arts Market."

Pictures are placed against the walls, hung on the iron protectors around trees and on racks placed along the sidewalks. Many an artist writes his name in chalk on the asphalt opposite his exhibition.

"Prices run from 50 to 1000 francs (\$2 to \$40)," the president of "The Arts Market" said, "and besides selling their work many of our exhibitors pick up orders for portraits, for illustrations and other work which helps to make them known and keeps the pot boiling."

## MANY GAMBLERS THRIVE IN THE SUNNY SOUTH

Palm Beach, Fla., Feb. 8.—With the winter season at its height thousands of dollars are crossing the "board" at luxuriously appointed "night clubs" in the larger resort centers of Florida.

Social luminaries, including pretty debutantes, society matrons and millionaires, gather nightly at the most exclusive places to court the goddess of luck.

Palm Beach just now is talking about a lucky woman—a New Englander of the "400"—who is reported to have won more than \$10,000 during a few moments of play at one of the local clubs. Miami still recalls the late prominent millionaire of Cincinnati who is said to have lost \$60,000 across the green tables during a single night's play last year.

Bankers are noticing the appearance of gold shiners, eagles and double eagles, which are put in circulation via the roulette wheel, the dice, faro, house backed stud poker, English hazards and Spanish bolita.

Palm Beach boasts of the most exclusive gambling rooms in the State. The public is admitted without pass cards or other identification in some of the Miami clubs, but in Palm Beach one must be known and always appear in evening clothes.

## CAMPAIGN IN PRINCE ALBERT WARMING UP

Prince Albert, Sask., Feb. 7.—Charles MacDonald, former member of parliament for Prince Albert who resigned his seat to enable Premier Mackenzie King to contest the constituency, was accused of "deserting his post and throwing down the people of Prince Albert," by J. Slater, speaking on behalf of L. L. Burgess, Independent candidate in the coming by-election at a campaign meeting here last night. Mr. Burgess protested against the candidacy of Premier King.

"I am no politician," said Mr. Burgess in his opening remarks. "I stand as a protest against the way the seat was handed by C. MacDonald of Vancouver, to Premier King. Since when does the seat belong to an elected representative in such a manner that he can pass it around? Statements of the Liberal executive at the time the step was taken would lead one to believe it knew nothing of the matter."

#### Electors Ignored.

"Decisions made by the Liberal executive to support King and the Progressives and by the Conservatives not to oppose him were made by 20 men and the electors of the constituency ignored. During the election Mr. MacDonald made several pledges to the people of the constituency. He went to Ottawa but before he raised his voice on your behalf, he resigned and he now asks you to elect the Premier."

Mr. Burgess continued by stating that Prince Albert electors had been called upon six times to elect a non-resident member and that "the Government may not know where Prince Albert is as its representative is so often non-resident." He said that he appealed for support solely on principles and repeated his declaration that, if elected, he would not be "at the beck and call of any party."

About 200 persons attended the meeting.
