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OTTAWA LOST ANOTHER GAME IN TORONTO

St. Patricks and Pittsburgh Saturday N. H. L. Winners — Canadians Almost Beat the Boston Team.

Toronto, Feb. 7—In a thrilling, strenuously contested National Hockey League fixture, Ottawa's famous "Shut-out Six" went down to their third straight league defeat when they finished on the short end of a 4 to 1 score against St. Patrick's here Saturday evening.

The first few minutes of play was decidedly all in the Senator's favor, but Roach, guarding the Irish citadel, was invincible, while Lady Luck badly jilted the determined Senators when Hooley Smith struck the goal posts twice in the opening minutes of play.

After this first furious attack had subsided without a tally in their favor Ottawa appeared to fade and thereafter the Irish had a slight margin in the play, except in the final period, when considerable "rough stuff" crept into the game. At one time the Senators had the advantage of playing six men to four and it was at this stage that Ottawa secured their only goal.

Pittsburgh Wins.

New York, Feb. 7—The New York Americans received a severe handling from the youthful Pirates of Pittsburgh here Saturday night when the Buccaneers completely outrushed and outskated the Madisons, afflicted them with a 6 to 1 defeat and sent them well down into the league cellar. The Americans fought a game losing battle throughout and despite the lopsided score, Madison Square Garden reverberated for 60 minutes to the shouts of 12,000 fans feverish from the dizzy clip of the game.

Tie at Montreal.

Montreal, Feb. 7—Sprague Cleghorn provided the hockey thrill of the season when he saved his Boston team from defeat at the hands of the Canadiens at the Mount Royal Arena Saturday night and led them through 20 minutes of overtime play to a 3-3 draw. With but a few minutes remaining in the final period, the 5,500 spectators settled down anticipating overtime.

With but one minutes to go, Joliat whipped a pass to Pete Lepine, and the Canadian substitute centre, who took Morenz's place for the evening, swept in on the Boston Goalie and put the Canadiens ahead 3 to 2. From the face-off Canadiens carried the attack to Boston. Captain Cleghorn cleared, tore down the ice towards the Canadian goal and rifled a shot at Rheame. The Canadian goalie got in front of the puck and it bounded out. But Cleghorn fought for the disc and knocked it in, thus tying the score.

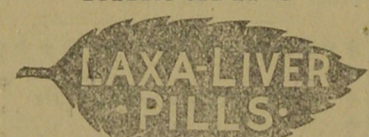

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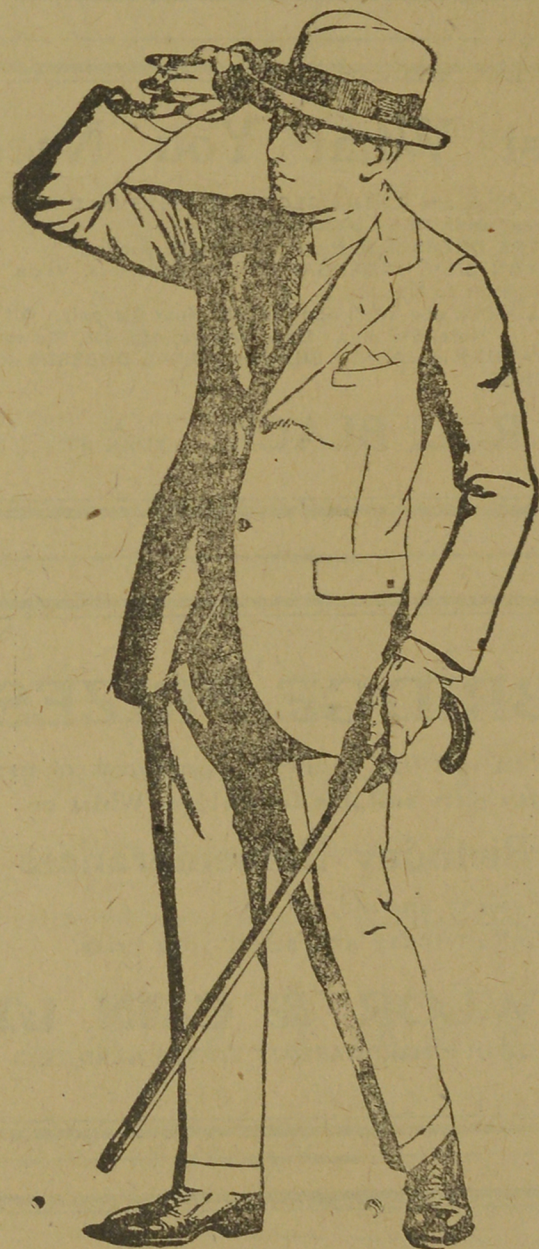
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
