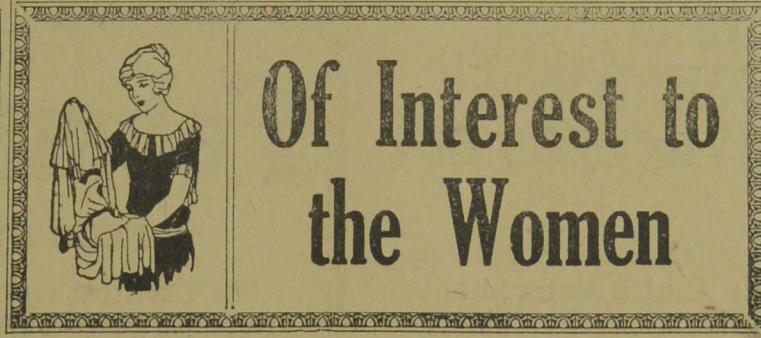

"GIGOLO" THE LATEST THING IN HEADGEAR.

The belle of 1890 donned a flat sailor hat with three large plumes spurring from the side of its flat crown when she wanted to be particularly devastating; the first tennis girl wore a heavy white tam with her cumbersome, wide-skirted full-sleeved "sport" dress, and the girl of 1904 thought she was a knockout in her straw cartwheel of Merry Widow influence. Today's miss, seeking to be the last word in feminine allurements, pulls a small felt "gigolo" model down over her boyish bob.

The hat with the high crown, pushed up at the back, the "gigolo" is the newest thing in headgear, according to the national style show of the Allied Millinery Industries of Chicago, which opens a ten-day millinery exposition at the Bal Tabarin at the Hotel Sherman tonight. The "gigolo" which is the term applied in Paris to a "dancing man," has been seen only in felt heretofore, but next spring and summer will be worn fashioned of crepes and hair braids, according to Roy Weil, president of the Allied Millinery association.

Portray Evolution of Headgear.

The hats of six centuries will be exhibited in one of tonight's tableaux. First, the hairdress of Eve, with a flower from the garden of Eden as its only decoration; second the hairdress of the Roman matron, held secure by a band wound about it; then the foolscap of the medieval ages—the tall, conical hat worn with a veil attached to the side; later the mutton-leg street costume of 1890 with a ridiculous small, flat sailor, and, finally, the small close fitting hat that has been popular for the last year or two.

While the felt hat continues to be the popular item of the moment as the season advances the tendency will be toward hats of silks and belting ribbons and body straws. The tendency for the coming season is for more trimming on hats, manufacturers say.

The crayon colorings are most prominent, such as Marie Antoinette, a soft rose; Maintenon, a salmon rose; Chevreuse, ashes of rose; golden wheat, oakbuff, Italian blue, Chantilly green, phantom red, watermelon.

Correct Thing in Trims.

Rhinestone or mother-of-pearl ornaments, or better yet, a pair of long crystal pins are the correct trims.

Among spring straws, body hats have almost completely superseded those sewed of narrow braids. Bangkoks, soft perla, fancy hems and pastel colored leghorns will be much in vogue.

Faces pictured on the front of the hat, with a feather forming the hair, are an innovation with which a Chicago milliner is experimenting.

The designers have a word of cheer to those who are fearful of the bobbed head may become passe.

"Milliners are figuring on a continuance of the bobbed mode, for the present at least," says Harlan Ware, director of the show.

In south or west rooms you should use soft tones; for north or east the colors should be warm and bright.

Do you want your windows to look smaller or larger than they really are? Side draperies hanging in straight folds to the floor give the illusion of greater height. Draperies that extend only to the sill, on the other hand, tend to shorten the window. Draperies tied back also seem to shorten the appearance of the window.

If you want your window to seem taller than it is, use draperies that will hang in soft straight folds such as linen, heavy cretonne silk, cotton rep, &c.

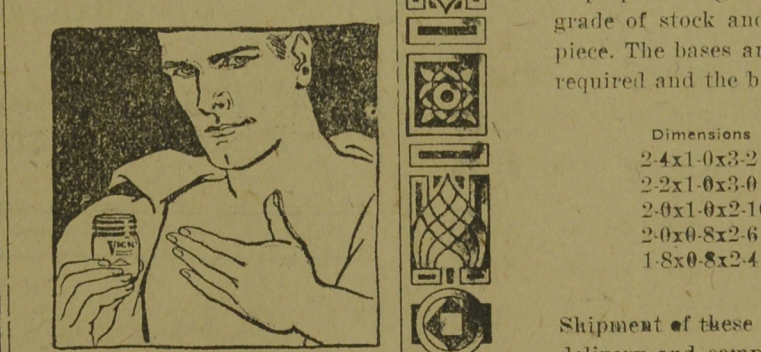
If you are using figured cretonne choose a design which will help to create the illusion you want. A broad design will make the window seem wider; a vertical design will give the illusion of greater height.

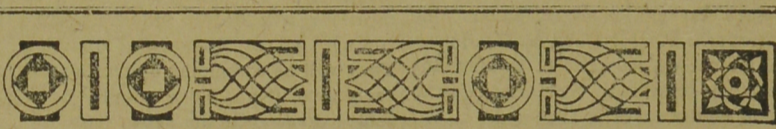
PAWNBROKERS? ALL WRONG! THEY'RE BANKERS TODAY

New York, Feb. 6.—The New York pawnbroker of today doesn't fit in with fiction. There are pawnshops in the slums of course, but the big profits of the business do not come from the poor. And pawnbrokers are looking to their profits. During 1925 the estimated business of New York pawnshops was \$85,000,000. This year they expect to pass the hundred-million mark.

Yes, the pawnshops of today, though loans are made on almost any article of value offered, are not the pawnshops of yesterday. Most of them are no longer dingy and diffident. They resemble a cross between a high-grade jewelry shop and a bank. Most of them have discarded the old three balls and have substituted signs proclaiming them to be loan associations. Indignantly do the pawnbrokers reject the age-old allegation that they fatten on the misery of the poor. The poor haven't enough to make them fat, they aver. So the traffic mostly in jewelry and have reached such a dignity that they favor being placed under the supervision of the state banking department.

The assertion that a pawnshop is really a bank, made by the head of a pawnshop chain recently, was premised on the distrust of thousands for stocks and bonds. Instead of buying pieces of paper, they invest in jewelry and precious stones. When money is needed for business expansion or in some emergency, they visit the pawnbroker and borrow on their collateral. The pawnbroking king holds that that is equivalent to a loan from a bank on stocks and bonds. He did not mention the possible difference in the interest rate, nor did he see fit to recall that stocks and bonds, being interest-bearing themselves, naturally cut down the bank rate.

An interesting angle of the business was revealed in the fact that it is in Manhattan that many customers use pawnshops instead of safety deposit vaults. A prosperous contractor, who owns a valuable diamond ring, keeps it in "hock" for years at a time for fear of losing it. Another customer of one of the large shops has a Sunday suit of which he is very proud. Every Monday morning he pawns it for a small sum and every Saturday night he redeems it, all clean, pressed and ready for Sunday.



BAKED INDIAN PUDDING.

1-2 cup cornmeal
1-2 cup honey
2 cups milk
1-2 teaspoon salt
1-4 teaspoon cinnamon, ginger or mace

1-2 teaspoon butter

Put the cornmeal in top of double boiler; add the milk which has been brought to a boil, slowly; stir until smooth; add the honey, salt and spices of choice. Boil thirty minutes. Brush bakedish with mixture. Bake in slow oven for two hours. Serve warm with honey or milk and sugar.
