BREEDING THE BEST.

At the recent meeting of the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association of New Brunswick, Hon. Lewis Smith, Minister of Agriculture in the Provincial Government announced that he had adopted as his slogan, "More and Better Live Stock". The Minister is a practical farmer as well as a successful breeder of live stock and he is a man who appreciates the importance of the problems which confront the agriculturists of this province.

Pedigreed livestock of quality can pave the way to prosperity and help carry a country through periods of crop depression. What the breeding of the best horses, cattle, sheep and hogs means to a nation may be gleaned from the results of the livestock auctions held in Scotland during 1925, when a total of £532,000 was realized. Most of the money came from other countries and went into the pockets of the hardy Scotch experts who long ago gained a world-wide reputation for the excellence of their pure-bred stock.

Scotland has long been the home of the Clydesdale horse, one of the largest and most useful of the draft types, whose bulk does not prevent his moving at a brisk walk in front of the heaviest loads. Every visitor to Scotland admires these great animals, which are to the Scotch what the Percheron is to the French and the Shire to the English. A stallion of the Clydesdale breed headed the list in point of value at the Scotch auctions of 1925, bringing £4,620, or about \$22,500, at the present rate of exchange. He came from the famous Kirkcudbrightshire district, where Baron's Pride, Prince of Wales and other famous sires were bred.

The top figure for a Shorthorn bull in 1925 at these sales was £2,940, while a blackface ram changed hands at £480. The Prince of Wales gave £1,470 and £577, respectively, for bulls of the short-horn and Aberdeen-Angus types. They will probably go to his ranch in the foothills of the Rockies, not far from the City of Calgary in Alberta.

Some idea of the extent of the livestock breeding industry in Scotland is conveyed in the total figures, which show that 6,476 cattle were sold for £286,935, 19,250 rams and ram lambs for £221,675, 600 hogs £6,820, and 65 Clydesdale stallions for £16,930. There were naturally many other transfers at private sales.

Scotland is a small country. For its area the above showing is remarkable. It is the strongest sort of argument for specialization in animal types.

Let the farmers of New Brunswick breed and raise the very best stock and they will have the wide world for a market.
