a cramp. They were being carried
out in a strong undertow when Guiran
made his perfect cast and hauled them
ashore.

London, July 13—George Chester
president of the British Association

"Sixty per cent of the dancers do
not dance at all and it is getting
worse and worse with the popularity
of novelty dancing and untimed
music."

have done much to demoralize the
art of ballroom dancing.

MAY DOUBLE
SALARIES

Rome, July 13—The salaries of
the entire personnel of the Vatican,
from the lowliest employees to the
members of the Sacred College are
to be considerably increased the
newspapers say in order to meet
the higher cost of living.

A special committee which has
been studying the question is under-
stood to be considering doubling the
Cardinals' yearly salaries which are
now 24,000 lire (\$328 at present
exchange rates.)

SECRET OF RESPUTIN
THE MONK HAS AT
LAST BEEN REVEALED

French Professor Has Discovered How He Was
Able to Control the Mind and Destiny of the
Late Czar of Russia—A Dose of Glucose Ren-
dered Him Immune From Deadly Cyanide of
Potassium.

PARIS, July 13—One of the secrets of the
mysterious monk, Rasputin, which seemed to raise
him above other men and which enabled him to
control the mind and destiny of the late Czar of
Russia, was believed to have been revealed today
when Professor Violle communicated to the Acad-
emy of Science the results of his latest experi-
ments on animals.

Violle said he had demonstrated that doses of
glucose prove immunity from cyanide of potas-
sium, a quick and deadly poison. Rasputin who
finally was shot to death by a younger member of the
house of Romonoff, frequently was the object of
plots and his ability to survive the administration
of Cyanide had confounded the monk's enemies.

PERSONNEL

NOT YET KNOWN

be between September 15th and 21st.

ingly busy man.

home in Winnipeg and it is rumored
that he will not have a place in the
new cabinet.

George B. Jones, late member for
Royal, will likely be the new minister
and it is reported that Mr. Robertson
late member for Kings, P. E. I., will be
a minister without portfolio.
