CABINET MAKING WORK IS NEARING COMPLETION; THE PREMIER HAVING BUSY TIME

Ottawa, July 12—So far as can be learned tonight the appointments to the cabinet of the Conservative government have been decided upon with the exception of the representation from the province of Quebec. From appearances the Quebec cabinet ministers have not yet been selected and it is even rumored that they may not be taken in until after the general election in September.

After a meeting with his cabinet of acting ministers late today, Premier Meighen intimated to newspapermen that the work of cabinet making was all but concluded.

Tonight Premier Meighen is meeting with advisors from Quebec province. The presence in the capital of Hon. E. L. Patenaude who led the Conservative forces in Quebec in the general election of 1925 is regarded as highly significant. With Mr. Patenaude are Senator D. O. Lesperance, one of the leaders of the party in that province, and J. H. Fortier, a prominent citizen of Quebec city. Political speculation tonight centres about these men. Who will enter the cabinet from Quebec is the question debated on the street corners and in the hotel lobbies.

Soon to be Announced.

In any event, the cabinet with which Mr. Meighen will appeal to the electorate nine weeks hence, will be announced before many hours have passed and with the slate definitely named, the election campaign can be said to be actually under way.

The Liberal party forces, like the

public at large await the announcement of the cabinet. The Liberal party is known to be organizing for the approaching conflict. Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Liberal leader, has returned to the capital after a few days in the country and will announce the itinerary of his coast-to-coast speaking tour within a few days.

When the cabinet slate is fixed and made public interest will be directed toward Friday when Premier Meighen will open his campaign at a mass meeting in Ottawa.

Activity in Ontario.

Toronto, July 12—The federal election campaign in rapidly getting under way in Ontario despite the fact that the exact date of the election has not been announced.

Definite dates for four Conservative conventions and eleven Liberal conventions have been set to date but the Progressive, United Farmers of Ontario and the Labor party have yet to make an announcement in this respect.

No Conservative candidates have been named while the Liberals have chosen their candidates in Wellington North and Middlesex East and the Progressives their nominees in Lambton East and Grey Southeast.

High lights in the campaign during the next few weeks will be the address of Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen at the Conservative convention at Ottawa on July 16 the presence of Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King at the Liberal picnic here on July 21 and the attendance of Premier Meighen at the Conservative picnic here on August 7.

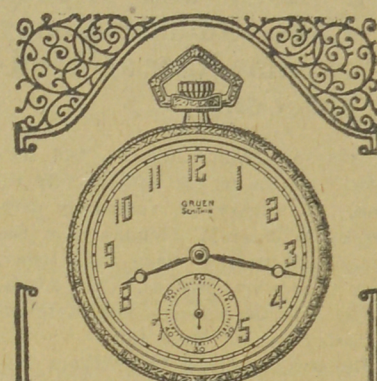
Smoke Rising on Sevgole.
