GUESSWORK GAVE KATE HAL FIRST DEFEAT

Sir Roch and Ribbon Cane Outside Money in Same Race at Windsor, Conn.

Windsor, Conn., July 9—"Old reliable," known in the official turf records as Guesswork, splendidly driven by William R. Fleming won the free-for-all pace at Sage Park today, not noticeably pressed, in 2.07 1/4, 2.06 1/4 over the season's heretofore undefeated battler, Kate Hal.

Guesswork owned by William Mahoney of Hyde Park, Mass., drew the rail and with none of the other drivers anxious to go out and set the pace Fleming did not hurry the paces, racing ace of the Great Peter family to romp along as she pleased. When Kate Hal moved at the three-quarter pole Guesswork was ready and home she flew in 29 1/4 seconds with not a care in the world.

Leese took Kate away fairly fast in the second heat and Mason, behind Ribbon Cane, raced her until Fleming was ready to move with Guesswork and the Boston mare had no trouble in getting home safely. Billy D, a 2.08 class eligible, finishing second.

The mile was paced in 2.09 1/4, a new record for the track. Silver Weather, having won in 2.06 1/2 on Thursday, setting a new mark for the Wilson-Thrall course, making the fourth consecutive week of the Bay State circuit that the winner of the open pace has established a track record.

The talent was given a surprise when Thompson Dillon, driven by Will Leese, won the 2.09 trot off by himself in slow time. The Brusie stable entries, Marmaduke and Fayette National, were top-heavy favorites, "The Duke" being the horse picked to win because of his sparkling race at Sturbridge.

Devon took another game in the York County Amateur League last evening when they triumphed over the Fredericton Imperials at Devon by the score of seven to five. Fredericton used two pitchers, "Snap" Thompson who started, was taken out because of wildness in the first inning and Williams replaced him. "Knucker" Irvine went the entire route for Devon and pitched good ball.

It was a big Devon night and almost ended in a riot, Umpire "Larry" McLean and Greg McGinnis having a clash after the game.

Other Incidents.
Alfred Brewer was umpiring on the bases and Fred McLean was umpire-in-chief. The Fredericton team kicked hard against some of the decisions handed down by each of the officials. There was a particularly big kick put up in the fifth inning when Brewer called Myshraill out at second for not touching the bag. The Imperials contended that not only did Myshraill touch the bag but even did it with his hand at one time.

Umpire McLean took so unkindly to some of the Fredericton team's remarks that he presented them with a rule book on their bench and requested them to read it.

These incidents will not do the league any good and should not occur. It is possible that the league may be asked to act in regard to them.

The Scoring.
Devon scored in the first inning after Thompson passed the first two batters and Keene came through with a single. Williams went in to pitch and stopped the Devon attack. Devon hit Williams hard in the second frame. Four hits, an error by Williams when he threw the ball to third with no baseman on the bag, a stolen base and a sacrifice hit netted them five runs. They added another in the fifth, a present by Williams. K. Watson opened with a single and stole second. Hersey's error let Miles reach first. Dunphy struck out. Irvine was hit by Williams filling the bases. Rutter drew his third base on balls of the game and Watson scored. Staples hit into a double play and ended the inning.

UTTON WON TWICE AT WOODSTOCK ON TWELFTH, RED HANAFIN WON 2.14

Woodstock, July 12—Under excellent weather and track conditions the Woodstock mid-summer race meet opened here today. A record first day attendance augmented by the presence at Island Park of visiting delegates of the L. O. A., who celebrated the "Glorious Twelfth" here today, witnessed a good card of racing.

Driver Utton, driving for the Roaring Brook stables, of Barton, Vt., was a double winner in the afternoon's racing, piloting Peter Silk ahead in the second and third heats of the 2.16 trot and pace, after getting third place from seventh position in the first heat and, with Lambert Todd, a pacer, taking the 2.11 trot and pace in three straight heats in a race in which Caruso, of the Edwards stables, Auburn, Me., also a pacer, offered the stiffest opposition in a class of five starters.

In the 2.24 trot, Major Mozart, the year old gelding of the Edwards stables, Auburn, Me., repeated his win of the week previous at Houlton, when driven by "Red" Hanafin. He took the first two heats, trotting the first quarter of the second heat in 33 seconds and the half in 1.06 1/4. W. R. C., a green trotter, owned by Fred Simonson, Limestone, Me., and driven by Leon Toole, the local reinsman, surprised the talent by taking the third and final heat and second money in 2.19 1/4.
