

### ISOLATION HOSPITAL IS COMPLETED

Cost \$9,000 But the Interior Furnishings are Lacking — Hospital Board in Session on Monday.

The Isolation Hospital erected on the Victoria Hospital grounds and operated by that institution, has been completed. Interior furnishings alone are needed to place the building in readiness for use. A donation of \$500 has been received for this building which cost \$9,000. The Board was in session Monday night.

President Ross made a report respecting the supply of coal for the hospital for this year on terms the same as last year.

The president also reported respecting his visit to York County Council last week.

#### Isolation Hospital.

Col. T. G. Loggie as chairman of the building committee presented a complete and satisfactory report respecting the erection of the somewhat capacious Isolation hospital. The building is located some distance in rear of the Fraser Memorial building and is up-to-date in all respects. Not one dollar of extras was incurred, save the sum of \$20 for changing the location of a sewer pipe. All bills have been paid by the gift of \$4,000 and sale of a fifteen year serial bond of \$5,000. The furnishing of the building has yet to be undertaken, and it is believed if some friend would present the \$1,400 its doors would be forced open without a cent of debt. It was stated last night that a well known generous lady of this city has handed the committee a gift of \$500.

On motion of His Worship the Mayor the report was accepted and the committee continued until building is furnished.

##### Egg Laying Contest.

The Barred Rock pen owned by W. E. B. Tait of Dorchester led in the New Brunswick egg laying contest last week with a total of 59 eggs. The pens of Fred H. Ferguson of this city and A. T. Reid of Rollingdam tied for second place with 54 each. Bird No. 2 of Mr. Ferguson's pen continues to do splendid work, having a total for the week of 7 eggs. This bird has not missed laying an egg a day in eight weeks and has missed but one day in ten weeks. The total production last week was 882 eggs, and the grand total to date is 26,258 eggs.

##### Expert Lady Canoeists.

A party of young ladies composed of Misses Cooper, Young and Henry recently made an enjoyable canoe trip from The Barony to Fredericton. They went up river by train, taking two canoes along and launching them the following day made the run to the city without incident. ### CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION TO BE HELD ON 24TH.

Arrangements Made for Court House for Federal Convention — Rumors of Candidatures are Current.

The Conservatives of York-Sunbury are to meet in convention at the County Court House here on the afternoon of Saturday, July 24th, for the purpose of selecting a candidate to contest the constituency in the Federal general election which is expected in the autumn. Arrangements for the court room were made today by the executive.

The name of R. B. Hanson, K. C., who has represented the constituency at Ottawa for several years, will again be before the convention.

This convention will be one of the earliest called in New Brunswick if not in the Dominion.

Rumors with regard to candidature are beginning already. In connection with a possible Liberal nomination to contest the constituency the name of W. G. Clark, Mayor of Fredericton has been mentioned. His Worship Mayor Clark has made no announcement concerning the matter which so far is a mere matter of rumor.
