### English Explorer brings Back Photographs of This Being Done in Central African State

London, Jan. 10—The American and Olympic records are at the mercy of the athletes of a tribe of gigantic negroes in Central Africa, ruled by a seven-foot King, according to William J. W. Room, F. R. S., secretary of the British Foreign Bible Society, who has just returned from a trip through Africa, during which he covered 75,000 miles in 10 years of journeying.

Room says he twice saw King Muzinga himself, who rules between 1,500,000 and 2,000,000 persons and whose ruling caste, called Watusi, are between six and seven feet tall. The record high jump, Room says, was ordered by the King while the Englishman took a photograph of the performance.

## New York Surprised Hockey Fans by Giving Canadiens a Beating

### Score at Montreal Was 2 to 1 — McKinnon Scored Winning Goal — St. Patricks Beat Boston at Toronto.

Montreal, Jan. 10—New York stopped the Canadiens from the third position of the National Hockey League race and took the first division berth themselves by defeating the local team 2 to 1 in an overtime game at the Arena, Saturday night before an astounded crowd of 6,000.

Frank McKinnon, who subbed on right wing for Shorty Green, was the hero of the New York team. It was this player who batted in the puck from a scramble in front of the Canadian net three minutes after the start of the extra session, culminating a rush which was started by Captain Billy Burch.

Forbes Stars in Goal. While McKinnon received the immediate credit for the victory, New York can thank Vernon Forbes, stellar goal-keeper for the win. It was he who turned aside the Canadian attack after attack in brilliant fashion in the latter stages of the game and held the tottering New York team intact long enough for his teammates in front to work out an advantage and press home the winning goal.

#### Play Ragged.

It was far from the smart battle which the packed Arena expected to witness between these two teams who were battling for third place in the race for the edge to start their heavy week's program just ahead. Play was decidedly ragged and all the thrills were jammed into the last minutes of the game when Canadiens made their greatest bid for victory—a rally launched by the flash Morenz.

Just when the crowd was ready to concede New York a victory Morenz came back from a short rest. He flashed down the ice and let drive a terrific shot while travelling at full speed. It was blocked and was lying a few feet in front of the New York net. The American defense faltered in clearing and Morenz swooped down on the rubber and batted it in for the tying count.

McKinnon Ends Scoring. The extra session started off with Canadiens still pressing, but New York were forced to let up in their defensive game and sally forth for a chance to win. As a result both goals were tested with hard drives. But the crowd had hardly settled down to watch the overtime when Burch flashed his attack and McKinnon brought it to a successful culmination.

St. Pats Beat Boston. Toronto, Jan. 10—St. Patrick's stopped the winning streak of the Boston Bruins, defeating them by three to two at the Arena, Saturday night in one of the closest and most keenly fought National Hockey League fixtures witness here this season. The Irishmen were without the services of their captain and sharp shooter, "Babe" Dye, who is in the hospital with an attack of flu.

Bellefeuille, who replaced him, played fine hockey, scoring the initial tally of the game and breaking up many of the Bruins' attack by his persistent back checking.

Bruins in Pretty Style. The Bruins played a combination style of game that was very pretty and also effective, and Roach had to be at his best to hold the determined Bostonians to two goals. The aggressive "Sailor" Herberts proved to be the bad man of the contest, receiving four minors and one major penalty during the game. Otherwise the game was cleanly and stubbornly fought out.

Plenty of Body Checks. There was plenty of clean body checks handed out, but the penalties were few. Herberts received his major penalty in the third period. He slashed at Corbeau missing his objective to crash into the boards.

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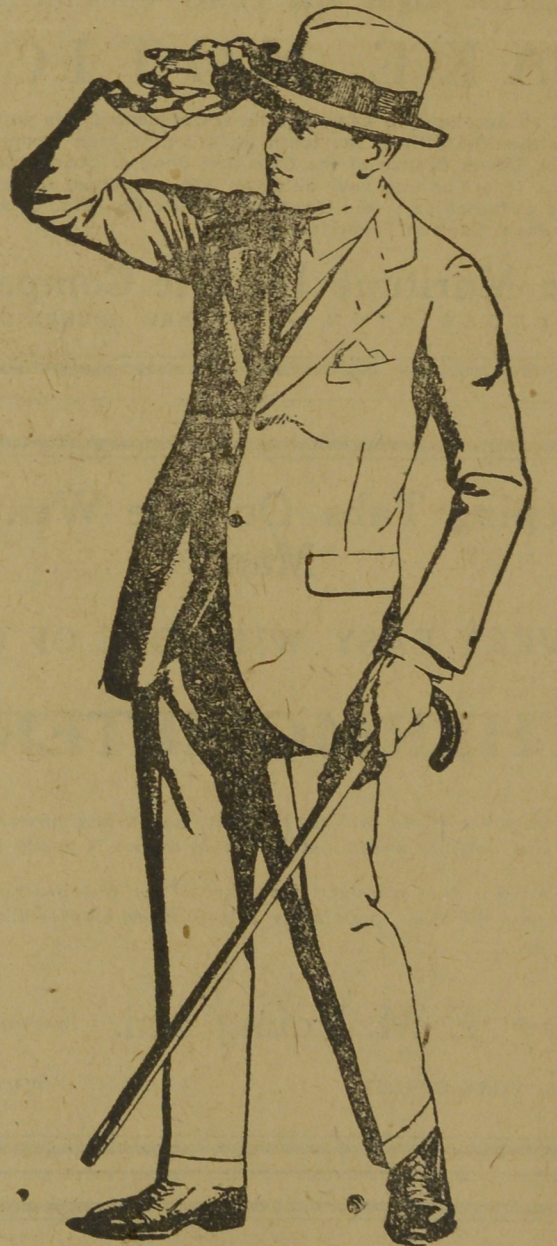
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
