WHAT'S NEW IN FADS.

New York—The newest method of
trimming the gorgeous gold and sil-
ver evening coats is to line the
sleeves which bell from the elbow
down with fur. Collars are garnish-
ed with fur on the inside, while
the outside remains of the lace
material.

ing the cold this winter. The snap-
piest sport costumes consist of knitted
skirts lined with leather, a
leather windbreaker and heavy
woolen stockings of Scotch weave
rolled down well below the knees,
which are left bare.

Mole felts, reversible felts, satin
wrought felts and matted felts
imitating doeskin are the materials
employed. The crowns are often
plaited. The hats are amazing-

NOTES THAT SAVE TIME AND LABOR.

The crusty ends of a loaf of bread
are frequently wasted. While they
are soft and fresh, cut them into
narrow strips about as large as a
lead pencil and lay a few on each
bread and butter plate at the table.
They will all disappear. Children
can be tempted to eat these little
bread strips when they would other-
wise refuse crusts.

An iron pot of the low shallow
variety is a good gas saver. When
a few potatoes are to be baked, boil
them for 15 minutes in their jackets.
Then set on the iron pot over a low
flame, put in the potatoes, without
water, cover tightly with iron lid
and leave them to bake. Turn once
in order to bake evenly. They will
be as mealy as when baked in the
oven and much less gas is consumed.

HOT CHEESE SANDWICHES.

Butter thin slices of bread very
lightly, spread generously with grated
cheese, dust with a suspicion of
French mustard, press two slices
firmly together, cut in half and toast
quickly. Or toast circular pieces of
bread sprinkle with a thick layer
of grated cheese, seasoned with salt
and cayenne. Place in a shallow pan
and set in oven to take until cheese
is melted. Serve at once.

IMPORTANT LEGISLATION AND REDUCTION IN TAXATION IS PROMISED IN SPEECH FROM THRONE

Ottawa, Jan. 8.—Following is the full
text of the Speech from the Throne
read by His Excellency the Governor
General in opening the first session of
the fifteenth Parliament:

"Honorable Members of the Sen-
ate:

"Members of the House of Com-
mons:

"It gives me pleasure to welcome
you to your important duties in this
first session of the Fifteenth Parlia-
ment of Canada.

"Since our last meeting the Em-
pire has been called on to lament the
demise of Queen Alexandria. In our
Dominion, the memory of the late
Queen will ever be held in affection-
ate remembrance. At the earliest op-
portunity a resolution will be sub-
mitted to you expressing the deep
sympathy of the parliament and peo-
ple of Canada, with His Majesty the
King, and other members of the Royal
Family in their bereavement.

"Canada has been signally honored
by the selection of a member of its
government as president of the sixth
assembly of the League of Nations.

"I congratulate you on the growing
prosperity of this favored land. The
products of our agricultural and other
basic industries have greatly increas-
ed. Our export trade shows remark-
able expansion. Our manufacturing
and related industries throughout the
Dominion, have experienced a develop-
ment not enjoyed in many years. Fur-
ther evidence of industrial progress
is reflected in the greatly improved
earnings of the railways.

"This increased prosperity and ad-
vancement have been aided by the
policies of the Government, and the
reductions in expenditures and taxa-
tion made from time to time. In the
opinion of my ministers, the improved
conditions warrant further substantial
reductions in taxation.

"Every effort will be made further
to reduce expenditures. To aid in the
reduction of expenditures in adminis-
tration, certain of the departments of
the public service will be consolidated
with others and Government services
more effectively co-ordinated.

"Our revenue is derived partly from
taxes made necessary by the war and
partly from other sources. In order
that the people of the Dominion
may have an exact knowledge of the
sources of their revenue, and the ob-
jects of its expenditure simplified
forms of account will be issued peri-
odically.

Immigration Plan.

"With the improvement of condi-
tions throughout the country, the gov-
ernment have formulated and put into
operation a comprehensive immigra-
tion plan. My ministers desire it to
be known that the Dominion welcomes
settlers of the classes which can be
absorbed into our population. Regula-
tions have been simplified, transpor-
tation rates greatly reduced and the
care of settlers to destination and dur-
ing early settlement given every at-
tention. Measures will be taken to
further the retention on the land of
our existing agricultural population,
to encourage the return to rural parts
of urban dwellers possessed of agri-
cultural experience and the repatria-
tion of Canadians now living in other
countries. Special arrangements will
be proposed for settlement on Crown
Lands.

"An agreement has been made be-
tween the government and the rail-
road companies providing a larger
measure of co-operation in immigra-
tion activities in the British Isles and
on the continent of Europe. An agree-
ment entered into with the British
government has already been instru-
mental in stimulating immigration
from Great Britain.

"While it is of importance to at-
tract new settlers, it is equally, if not
more important to assist those who
are already established on the land by
reducing the cost of agricultural pro-
duction. To this end a measure will
be introduced offering wide facilities
for rural credits.

The Customs Tariff.

"My ministers are of the opinion
that a general increase in the cus-

toms tariff would prove detrimental to
the country's continued prosperity and
prejudicial to national unity. In their
view the incidence of this form of
taxation should bear as lightly as pos-
sible upon the necessities of life, and
on agriculture and other primary in-
dustries. They believe that in the in-
terest of industrial development every
effort should be made to eliminate
the element of uncertainty with re-
gard to tariff changes; that changes
in the tariff should be made only after
the fullest examination of their bear-
ing on primary and manufacturing in-
dustries and that representations re-
questing increase or decrease of duties
should be made the subject of the
most careful investigation and report
by a body possessing the necessary
qualifications to advise the ministry
with respect thereto.

"A tariff advisory board will accord-
ingly be appointed forthwith. This
board will be expected to make a care-
ful study of the customs tariff, the
revenue to be derived therefrom and
the effect of the tariff and allied fac-
tors on industry and agriculture.

"While recognizing the importance
of Canadian home market the great
value of markets in other countries,
for our natural and manufactured
products, must also be considered. In
particular our trade within the Empire
should be encouraged by all means
consistent with our national welfare.
In this connection a trade agreement
entered into with the British West
Indies, Bermuda, British Guiana and
British Honduras, will be submitted
for your approval.

Grain Movement.

"In pursuance of the fixed policy of
the Government to encourage the
movement of grain and other Cana-
dian products through Canadian ports,
the Board of Railway Commissioners
has been instructed to include in the
general rate investigation now in pro-
gress, a special inquiry into the causes
of diversion of Canadian grain and
other products through other than
Canadian ports, and to take such ac-
tion under the Railway Act, as it may
deem efficient to ensure as far as pos-
sible the utilization of Canadian ports
for Canadian traffic.

"My Government propose to submit
provisions for the completion forth-
with of the Hudson Bay Railway.

Maritime Rights.

"With a view to affording such
remedies as may appear to be prac-
tical and appropriate, the Government
also proposes to appoint a Royal Com-
mission to inquire fully into the claims
that the rights of the Maritime Pro-
vinces in regard to the operation of the
Intercolonial Railway have not been
observed and that in regard to trans-
portation, immigration and other eco-
nomic factors, these provinces have
suffered prejudicially in their position
under Confederation.

"Your attention will be invited,
among other measures to a bill to pro-
vide for the transfer to the Province
of Alberta, of its natural resources,
and to a bill amending the Dominions
Elections Act.

"Members of the House of Commons:
"The accounts of the last fiscal
year and the estimates for the coming
year, will be submitted for your con-
sideration.

"Honorable Members of the Senate:

"Members of the House of Commons:

"In the policies and measure I have
outlined, a sincere effort has been
made to take into account the diversi-
fied conditions and interests of our
Dominion in a manner which will pro-
mote mutual understanding and closer
co-operation between all parts. It is
believed that these measures which,
taken together, form a co-ordinated
plan of national progress, will ensure
our common aim of a prosperous and
united Canada.

"In their consideration and in other
of your public duties, may Divine Pro-
vidence guide and bless your delibera-
tions."
