## TEACHING POLITICS.

A course in politics for college boys and girls is urged by Mrs. Helen Taft Manning, dean of Bryn Mawr College. There is something on the subject in the curriculum at Bryn Mawr, she admits, and perhaps at other institutions, but she complains that all such helps are deficient in preparing young people of both sexes for taking an active part in political life. "What I especially regret," says Dean Manning, "is the lack of day by day following of political events. Too much is put on the college in expecting it to get students ready for 'after life.' Parents and communities should do something." This sounds reasonable, and it seems also to answer her own complaint. Why should the college bother itself much about fitting its graduates for immediate entrance into political life? Let the knowledge of politics come to the students from outside the classic college environment, during or after the student's pursuit of the more important fundamentals the college years aim to supply.

## FIGURING THE COST.

# CATHEDRAL IS CRACKING

Leningrad, Russia, May 21—Serious fissures have developed in the great granite monolithic columns of the Cathedral of St. Isaac, the largest and finest church in Russia. Built upon submerged wooden piles as are most of the buildings of Leningrad, the magnificent edifice, which cost \$15,000,000 to build has been steadily subsiding. Great perpendicular cracks have appeared in one column facing Alexandra Park and the portico which is supports is threatened with collapse.

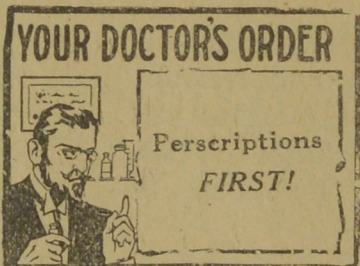
