THE HOUSE IN COMMITTEE OF WAYS AND MEANS; MOTION TO BOOST THE DUTY ON MEAT RULED OUT

Ottawa, May 20—After spending several hours on one item, the House in committee of ways and means, made considerable progress today on budget resolutions making changes in the customs tariff. It was an item on fresh meats, which caused chief criticism. The item increases the general tariff which is applicable to imports from the United States from 3 to 3½ cents per pound.

Conservatives criticized that the purpose behind the increase was not so much to keep out the American product as to give better opportunity to the Australian. An amendment was moved to increase the general tariff to five cents but it was ruled out of order and the item carried.

Bananas Discussed

Discussion came also in imported bananas. The budget resolutions empower the government, by order-in-council to impose a duty of 50 cents a bunch on imported bananas. Bananas imported by direct shipment to a Canadian port under the British preference would enter free.

J. A. Fraser, Conservative, Cariboo, held that the duty would add to the cost of bananas to the western consumer as freight rates made it practically impossible to bring bananas via eastern Canadian ports. Hon. J. A. Robb, Minister of Finance, replied that his information was that Fiji would supply the western Canadian demand.

A number of the tariff items discussed today arise from the West Indies trade treaty. These were carried.

The contentious changes in the tariff on automobiles were held over till another day.

Railway Rates

Ottawa, May 20—"I shall be very careful before I promise to use any personal influence in regard to railway rates," said Hon. C. A. Dunning, Minister of Railways, in the House of Commons this afternoon. He was answering a request from Dr. O. B. Price (Conservative, Westmorland) that people in the Middle West should be given excursion fares to the Maritime Provinces on as low a basis as they are carried to the Pacific Coast.

The minister explained that railway rates were governed by a method and a rule which could not be influenced, and he, for one, would hesitate to try and interfere with the system.

The Coal Issue

Ottawa, May 20—"Will the minister be good enough to use his best efforts to induce these people to use some common sense when they are ordering coal?" asked Col. Thomas Cantley (Conservative, Pictou) in the House of Commons today.

He was referring to an advertisement in which a private company invited tenders for some 2,000 tons of run-of-mine coal, but specified that it must be "American smokeless." Col. Cantley thought that the preference should be given to Nova Scotia coal. The minister replied that he would certainly use his influence in favor of Canadian coal, but this was hardly a case where any promises could be made.

PICTURES OF N. B. WILD LIFE AT THE GAIETY

Mr. B. S. Moore Delights Large Audience with Nature Films Which Were Taken on the Tobique.

The moving pictures of New Brunswick wild life shown at the Gaiety Theatre last night by Mr. Burton S. Moore, Tobique guide and naturalist, were undoubtedly the finest of the kind ever exhibited in this city. The films were shown under the auspices of the York-Sunbury branch of the N. B. Fish and Game Protective Association, and notwithstanding the lateness of the hour there was a large and highly appreciative audience. Those present included members of the G. W. V. A., members of the Science Club, teachers of city schools, and officials of Department of Lands and Mines. Among the most interested spectators was a delegation of twenty from Mr. Moore's old home at Scotch Lake, who journeyed to the city by motor to see the pictures.

A Real Naturalist.

Prior to the beginning of the entertainment Mr. Moore gave a brief talk before the footlights in which he explained how he had secured the different pictures. He stated that he was an amateur photographer and had taken the pictures with an amateur outfit of his own construction. He emphasized the point that there had been no attempt at faking and that every picture was absolutely true to nature. The pictures as afterwards thrown on the screen amply bore out his statement.

Six Reels Shown.

In all six reels were shown and it is needless to say that they held the closest attention of the large audience. The different scenes not being titled it was necessary for Mr. Moore to briefly explain each one in turn and he did it in a way that left nothing to be desired.

The pictures of moose and deer in their native wilds, were particularly striking and it was made quite evident that these fine game animals are very plentiful in the Tobique woods. The trout and salmon angling scenes which were depicted, made disciples of Isaac Walton fairly gasp for breath. The famous Paradise trout pool on the Nepisiguit was shown and it was explained that all fish taken there of less than three pounds weight are returned to the water. Smaller animals shown included a bob cat, foxes, woodchucks, rabbits, porcupines, and squirrels. Of pictures of birds there were shown ducks, bluejays, moose birds, woodpeckers, crows, hawks, etc.

The last picture shown revealed Mr. Moore at work with his first camera and gave an interesting insight into

FISH AND GAME ASSOCIATION HELD MEETING

Interesting Discussion on Salmon Angling—B. S. Moore Talks on Wild Life Photography.

A meeting of the York-Sunbury branch of the New Brunswick Fish and Game Protective Association in the Salvage Corps rooms last evening was presided over by President G. H. Clark and upwards of thirty members were present. Some correspondence exchanged with Mr. W. A. Found, Federal director of fisheries, over some suggested changes in the salmon fishing regulations created an interesting discussion, which was participated in by H. G. Chestnut, Adam Moore, W. H. It was decided to make further representations to the department with a view of having changes made which will tend to encourage salmon angling on the Saint John River.

Wild Life Photography.

Mr. Burton S. Moore of Andover gave a very interesting talk on his experience as a photographer of wild life on the Tobique. He said that hunting with the camera was a very fascinating pastime, although to be successful great patience had to be exercised. For instance he said that it took him the best part of a month to secure a picture of a partridge in the act of "drumming". Mr. Moore's account of his experiences was listened to with close attention.

Col. J. W. Bridges, being called upon gave an account of his experience at muskrat ranching at his old home in the Parish of Sheffield.

Salmon in the Keswick.

Dr. Morehouse created some surprise by informing the gathering that hundreds of lake run salmon annually made their way up to the headwaters of the Keswick stream. They were female fish heavy with spawn and provided sport and food for some of the residents. As the water is shallow in many places hundreds are impaled on pitchforks and salted away for use during the winter months.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to Mr. B. S.
