

## TWO CHAIRS AT UNIVERSITY OF N. B. FILLED

**H. B. Hachey to New Chair of Physics—R. W. B. Pugh to Modern Languages Chair.**

The following appointments to the staff of the University of New Brunswick for the next academic year are announced:

Mr. H. B. Hachey has been appointed to the Professorship of Physics. Mr. Hachey received his B. Sc. degree from St. Francis Xavier in 1923. After graduation he was awarded a Bursary by the National Research Council of Canada and has since been in attendance at McGill University. He received his Master's degree from McGill University. He is at present demonstrating in Physics Laboratory, and doing research work in preparation for his Doctor's degree. Prof. Eve director of the department states that as a demonstrator he has been noteworthy for the clearness of his exposition and for the interest which he evokes in his students. He further states that in his judgment we are fortunate to obtain Mr. Hachey but from the point of view of his own department he would prefer to retain his services for some years longer.

Other Professors at McGill bear out Professor Eve's estimate of Mr. Hachey as do also the Professor's under whom he took his undergraduate work. He was a former member of the St. Francis Xavier foot-ball and basket-ball teams.

French and German.

Mr. R. W. B. Pugh is the appointee to the Chair of French and German. He is a former Kings' scholar of Eton and a prize man in French. Later he graduated at Keble College, Oxford receiving his B. A. Degree in 1916. He graduated with Distinction in the final Honors School of Modern Languages. He was also during his undergraduate course the Organist at Keble College. He has had military service and has spent considerable time on the continent of Europe studying both French and German. Recently he has been studying and lecturing at Strasbourg University. At Strasbourg he was largely employed in delivering University extension lectures and lecturing to foreign students. He has published a number of works in the French language and also papers in English dealing particularly with his studies at Strasbourg.

Both Mr. Hachey and Mr. Pugh have intimated their acceptance of the appointments.

## WOULD PUT FIVE IN GAOL IF POSSIBLE

**The Magistrate Dismissed First Ward Assault Case with Cautious Comment — Little Doubt of Perjury.**

This morning the assault case The King on the information of Earle Ward vs Harry Jones, was dismissed by Police Magistrate Limerick with some very cautious comment. The second case of the kind, The King on the information of Earle Ward vs Roy Ward, is to be heard on Tuesday next. The Magistrate had understood that the two cases were to be tried together but F. H. Peters for the defence would not agree.

This morning evidence was completed by Harry Jones and Mrs. Charles Forbes also gave evidence.

Counsel then summed up for their respective sides C. R. Hawkins for the informant and F. H. Peters for the defence. Both made pertinent comment upon the contradiction in evidence. Mr. Peters referred pointedly to the reading of the scriptures in court by Gordon Parlee star witness for the informant.

Disgraceful and Disgusting.

His Honor dismissing the case said that it was disgusting and disgraceful that occurrences such as those which had been described in the evidence could occur. He said that as far as the evidence was concerned he was more or less accustomed to encounter perjury in liquor cases but he never had heard a case in which he felt surer that perjury had occurred than in this.

Continuing His Honor said that the law would not permit him to convict both sides in the case, however if he had the power he would send Mr. and Mrs. Earle Ward, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Ward and Gordon Parlee to gaol, after the evidence which had been given. His decision would be that the case would be dismissed.

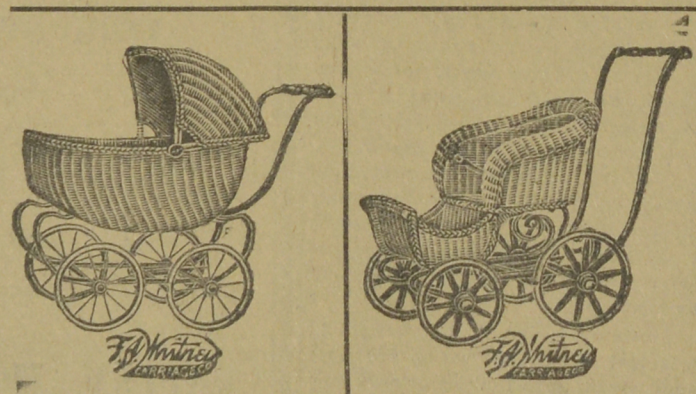
