POLITICAL CHANGES.

Hon. Robert Rogers in a speech delivered in the House of Commons recently stated that he had been over twenty years in public life and was occupying a seat at the left of the Speaker for the first time. Ex-Premier Veniot will be in a position to make a similar statement when the Legislature meets. He was first elected to the Legislature in 1894, and during the coming session he will sit in the cool shades of opposition for the first time. Premier Baxter has had a more varied experience. He was elected to the Legislature in 1912 as a government supporter and two years later became Attorney General. From 1917 until 1921 he sat with the opposition members, part of the time acting as his party's leader. In 1921 he was elected to the House of Commons and sat in opposition there for four years. Now he returns to the Legislature as leader of the Government and Attorney General, the portfolio which he held in the old administration. Hon. Mr. Baxter has the distinction of being the only New Brunswick premier who before taking office served as a member of the Federal Government, he having been Minister of Customs for a short time in the Meighen administration.

THE EFFECT OF THE MOVIES.

Ben B. Lindsey, for years judge of a juvenile court in Denver, and Ellsworth Faris, head of the department of sociology, University of Chicago, held common ground before the national conference on motion pictures, in Chicago. They agreed that the movies do not make people bad. People do not imitate things they see in the movies except where the sight stimulates an attitude already acquired through experience. Prof. Faris said. He explained that the conservative, well brought up young woman, seeing immodesty of debauchery in the movies, would only be more confirmed in their good taste in refraining from such things, whereas the girl unstable emotionally would be confirmed in her attitude of life. Judge Lindsey made the broad assertion that "far more children had been made good than bad by seeing moving pictures." He said censorship would do far more harm than good. One may agree with both those authorities and still feel that something could be cut from some movies to avoid "stimulation" of the attitudes of the less emotionally controlled. But the same is equally true of the spoken stage and of literature.

New Brunswick unlike Nova Scotia has no Department of Natural Resources with a Minister in charge, but Premier Baxter announces that it is the intention of the government to carry on a scheme of development of the natural resources of the province and make an effort to attract new industries and fill up vacant farms. Hon. J. A. Murray, ex-Premier of the province, will be placed in charge of the work and will have an office in St. John. The move being made by the Government is certainly along the right lines and we believe will meet with public approval. As an ex-Premier and former Minister of Agriculture, with a large commercial experience, Hon. Mr. Murray is singularly well equipped to take charge of the important service which the government is about to inaugurate. His task will be to give New Brunswick a large place on the map and he should have the hearty cooperation of all citizens who have the welfare of the good old province at heart.

Although it has been announced that the Province of Nova Scotia is in a serious condition financially, the statement made public by the chartered accountants who recently completed an audit of the public accounts indicates that New Brunswick has very little to boast about when comparisons are made. The capital liabilities of New Brunswick at October 31st 1925, were set down as \$37,999,214, which is about \$800,000 less than those of the sister province. The net debt of Nova Scotia is given as \$25,000,000 while that of New Brunswick at the close of the last fiscal year was \$30,722,459. In

making the comparison it must not be forgotten that Nova Scotia has a population 135,000 greater than that of New Brunswick.


