Some Ways to Serve Oysters.

Oyster cocktail is not just a company dish, nor is it one to be had only when dining in restaurants or hotels. There is no reason why a so simple and easily prepared dish should not be served to the family several times a week if they wish it. It certainly would make them think they were getting lots of attention, and what family does not love to feel that time and attention are being lavished on it? Many an otherwise scrubby meal is perfectly satisfactory to those eating it with the addition of an oyster cocktail to start with.

It takes only six small oysters to a person, and these dropped into a glass containing one tablespoon of tomato catsup, one-half tablespoon of lemon juice, a drop or two of

tabasco, salt and a tablespoon of horseradish—all thoroughly chilled—is all that is necessary to serve one person with an oyster cocktail. To serve four people simply make four times as much sauce.

Oysters on the half shell are also easy to serve and look pretty when put on the table. The Sunday roast which is never so good looking on Monday, is much enhanced with the oyster course served just before it appears. Cut lemons in quarters and serve a quarter with each serving of oysters.

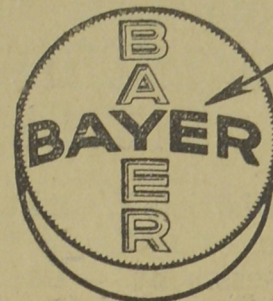

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PLUM AND RAISIN PIE.

From Mrs. B. F. comes a request for a pie recipe in which canned fruit can be used.

This one we think especially good:

- 1 cup raisins
- 1 cup canned pums (drained and cut in small pieces)
- 1 cup water
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1-2 cup sugar
- Pastry for a two-crust pie

Bring water to boiling, add raisins and simmer until the fruit is plump and tender. Add sugar, blended with flour, and the plums. Continue cooking until the mixture is thickened. Bake between two crusts. If the plums used are very tart it may

be necessary to add a little more sugar.

We've had so many requests for orange desserts lately that we think it may be helpful to other readers to have several which we've given out during the week.

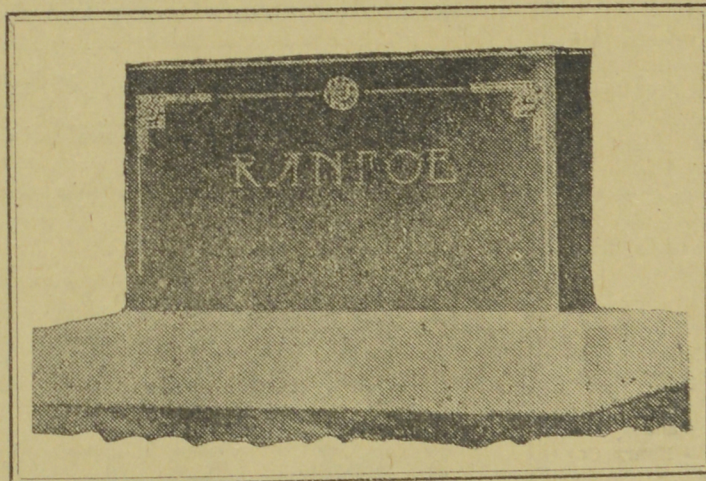
