

ARTISTS FROM FREDERICTON AT CNRA ON FRIDAY

Complete Instrumental and Vocal Program by Well Known People of This City and Vicinity.

A complete company of artists from Fredericton and vicinity is to broadcast from Moncton by means of Station CNRA Friday night. The troupe has been organized by George A. Tennant, choir-master of the Brunswick street Baptist Church, at the request of the manager of CNRA. It includes a large number of prominent vocalists and instrumentalists. The company will proceed to Moncton Friday via C. N. R.

Those in the company will be Devon Male Quartet, Mrs. E. Allison MacKay, Cecil D. Holder, Olaf Thompson, Mrs. G. A. Tennant, Mrs. F. C. Cooper. The Fredericton program is set for 9 p. m. Atlantic Time, Friday, and radio fans in this section will take special pains to tune in. The CNRA length is 291 metres.

The Conciliation Commission appointed by the Provincial Government in the matter in dispute between the Minto Coal Company and the miners in its employ, left for Minto this morning with the intention of meeting this afternoon as well as investigating conditions in that locality. The members of the Board are E. R. Teed, Woodstock, chairman; G. A. Stone, Moncton, and L. S. Morrison, Fredericton. The miners held a meeting on Sunday last and it is reported they presented certain proposals to the company's representatives on Tuesday which were not acceptable by them. When the commission was in session here last week it seemed as if the two parties would be able to get together and reach a settlement. Reports today were the contrary.

BATHURST SCHOOL MATTER CONSIDERED

Two Districts Want Portions of Bathurst Co. Assessment — Board of Education Hears Delegations Today.

The Board of Education was in session all morning and its work was continued this afternoon. Bathurst school matters occupied much attention this morning when a delegation was heard. Another delegation presented the other side this afternoon.

The matter in dispute was the allotment of the school taxes paid by the Bathurst Company between two school districts in which their properties lie. As the company pays a considerable amount in school taxes the matter is one of importance to the districts concerned.

French Textbooks

The Board also considered the matter of French textbooks. A delegation composed of Rev. Father L. Blanc principal of St. Joseph's University, Rev. Father de la Motte of Bathurst and Calixte Savoie principal of Edmundston High School, was heard and made representations concerning teaching of French and the use of textbooks.

His Honor the Lieutenant Governor was in attendance at the meeting and also the majority of the members of the Provincial Government. E. A. Reilly and Hon. D. A. Stewart had not arrived last night when the meeting of the cabinet began.

Arrested for Non-Support

Aaron Gamblin who was arrested in King's County on a warrant having been charged by his wife residing in this city with non-support appeared in the police court this morning. He engaged counsel after his arrival here and an arrangement made for a hearing this afternoon.

AGRICULTURAL CONFERENCE HERE ON THURSDAY

Provincial District Representatives to Meet Minister and His Deputy—M. A. McLeod is Completing Duties.

Hon. Lewis Smith, Minister of Agriculture, on Tuesday visited the New Brunswick Agricultural School at the Dominion Experimental Station where the course in Household Economics is now being given to a number of young ladies. The Minister addressed the class.

On Thursday the Minister is to meet Representatives of the Department Representative of the Department who have been summoned to meet him here. The Deputy Minister, Harvey Mitchell, also will attend the conference. The latter will be for the purpose of planning work for the year and discussing the general work of the Department of Agriculture and particularly that portion which comes under the District Representatives.

The resignation of M. A. McLeod as Supervisor of Agricultural Societies leaves his office vacant. It is understood that a successor will not be appointed but that his duties will be apportioned among the District Representatives. This matter will be discussed at the conference Thursday it is expected.

Completing Duties This Week

Mr. McLeod is completing his work as Supervisor of Agricultural Societies with the present week and will leave for Sussex where he will resume his duties as editor of the Maritime Farmer.

Director of Organization

Arthur J. Gandet, B.A., of St. Joseph's has been appointed Director of Agricultural Organization Work in the French Speaking Districts of the Counties of Kent, Westmorland, Victoria and Madawaska.

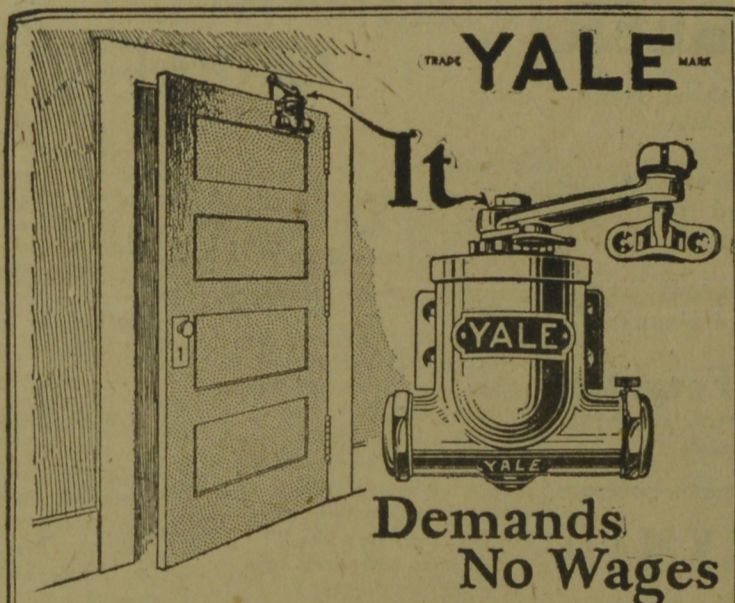
