ELECTRIC POWER DEVELOPMENT IN WEST LEADS U. S.; VAST SUMS WILL BE EXPENDED IN 1926

(San Francisco Chronicle.)
With the eleven Western States
leading all other parts of the country
in the development of hydro-electric-
ity, the West is making a greater use
of electric power than any other part
of the world. California takes the lead
among the Western States not only in
projects already developed and in use
but in the general consumption and
application of electricity to all uses
and especially in industry.

A total of 11,594,000,000 kilowatt
hours of energy was generated in 1925
in the eleven Western States. Califor-
nia produced better than half of this,
or a total of 6,090,000,000. Washington
was second with 1,818,000,000 and
Montana third with 1,238,000,000. Cali-
fornia also leads in numbers of con-
sumers, having 1,499,350, being exceed-
ed only by New York and Illinois,
which have 2,015,600 and 1,532,550, re-
spectively.

In commercial lighting consumers,
California is second only to New York
with 247,000 against 405,000. In indus-
trial power consumers, California
takes first place with 97,850. New
York has only 55,800.

Power For Irrigation.

In point of energy generated, Cali-
fornia is exceeded in the United
States only by New York with 10,-
050,000,000 and Pennsylvania with 6,-
430,000,000 kilowatt hours.

No other part of the world makes
as great a use of electric power in the
lumber and mining industries as Cali-
fornia, while in the use of power for
irrigation purposes California leads
the world. Tens of thousands of acres
of California's richest and most pro-
ductive irrigated farms are watered
from wells sunk often to more than
2000 feet, the water being raised by
electric power generated in the dis-
tant mountains.

A distinctive feature of the hydro-
electric development in California is
that it goes hand in hand with irri-
gation development. The construction
of great storage reservoirs serves two
purposes; the storage of the run-off

water to be used in the dry period
for generating power, the water then
flowing into irrigating canals to sup-
ply the thirsty farms of the wide val-
leys.

Three Projects Completed.

As for several years, the most im-
portant new construction during the
year just past has been in California
where three new major projects have
been completed, while two important
additions have been finished. These
are the pit No. 3 plant of the Pacific
Gas and Electric Company, which de-
velops 75,000 kilowatt capacity; the
Moccasin Creek power plant of the
City of San Francisco's Hetch Hetchy
project, with a present capacity of 80,-
000 kilowatt and an ultimate capacity
of 120,000; and the 30,000 kilowatt
plant of the California-Oregon Power
Company at Copco, on the Klamath
river. The Southern California Edison
Company made substantial additions
to its Big Creek Nos. 1 and 2 plants.

Future Development

Under construction, some of which
will take several years to finish, are
many projects of enormous capacity,
and upon which many millions of dol-
lars will be expended. As listed in the
San Francisco Journal of Electricity,
they include:

Buck's Creek plant of the Feather
River Power Company, ultimate ca-
pacity 40,000 kilowatt. This has the
remarkable head of 2548 feet.

San Joaquin Light and Power Cor-
poration project on Kings river, to
develop 124,000 kilowatt from a head
of 2381 feet.

Melones plant of Pacific Gas and
Electric Company on Stanislaus river
to develop 27,000 kilowatt.

Exchequer plant of the Merced irri-
gation district on the Merced river to
develop 30,000 kilowatt.

Big Creek No. 2-A of the Southern
California Edison Company, capacity
80,000 kilowatt developed under a
head of 2419 feet.

WOULD ADOPT QUEBEC SYSTEM IN NEW YORK

New York, April 4—Dr. Nicholas
Murray Butler, President of Columbia
University, intransigent anti-prohibi-
tionist and leader of political thought,
is again to the front with a statement
in which he advocates adoption in
New York state of the Quebec system
of liquor control, repeal of the eigh-
teenth amendment, repeal of the en-
forcement act known as the Volstead,
and insists that the major issue in the
elections of 1928 will be the question
of prohibition.

Dr. Butler's statement, character-
ized by the supporters as one of the
plainest yet, says: "There can be no
compromise in this matter since the
existence of the eighteenth amend-
ment, quite apart from the subject
with which it deals, challenges the
very foundation of our constitutional
system."

to the amount of energy available for
domestic industrial and agricultural
use.

Distribution Keeps Pace.

Along with the plant development
has gone heavy construction of high
voltage transmission lines, and exten-
sive distribution systems.

With the greater part of the elec-
tric development of the West cen-
tered in California, the expenditure
of money in this State has been cor-
respondingly large. The construction
budget for 1925 in all the eleven West-
ern States totaled \$127,500,000, divid-
ed as follows: Power plants, \$74,250,-
000; transmission lines, \$15,650,000;
distribution systems, \$37,700,000.

The same companies in the same
States have set aside \$153,000,000 for
new work in 1926. More than half of
the 1925 money was spent in Califor-
nia and more than half of the 1926
budget will also go to this State.




