Acadia University Now Entirely Out of College Sports

Resigned From Western Section and Was Refused Admittance to the Eastern — Maritime Conference in Special Session at Truro — Dalhousie Makes Overtures to Reenter Conference.

As a result of the special meeting of the Maritime Intercollegiate Conference held on Friday last at Truro, Acadia University has dropped out of all athletic relations with any other college beyond what may be arranged in the future. The six colleges belonging to the Conference were represented and Dalhousie University was represented in addition through King's College.

The resignation of Acadia from the Western Section the other members of which are Mt. Allison and University of New Brunswick, was received with regret. Acadia then made application for admission into the Eastern Section composed of St. Francis Xavier, Nova Scotia Technical College and King's College. That section evidently to the surprise of Acadia declined to admit the fourth college. The reason assigned was that no rearrangement was desired which would increase the burden of intercollegiate athletics, already heavy. This action left Acadia with no intercollegiate relations having resigned from one section and not having been admitted to another.

Another meeting of the conference is to be held next autumn, those colleges decline stating that the regular time of meeting. It is

hoped that by that time Acadia will lie in Halifax was not sufficient to be able to see the way clear to participate in inter-collegiate athletics once more. Even a partial participation such as football or basketball would be welcomed by the other colleges.

The reason assigned for the withdrawal of Acadia from the Western Section was the expense involved in making the long journey to Fredericton to meet the U. N. B. teams. Hockey was the chief source of objection it being alleged that the Acadia players because of playing also with town teams in the various Nova Scotia Leagues found it very difficult to spare the time for the trip to Fredericton. The information also was given that it was the two lower classes at Acadia which had given the majority in favor of withdrawal from the Western Section.

Dalhousie University which several years ago withdrew from intercollegiate athletics made overtures toward returning. They concerned hockey particularly the proposal being made that Dalhousie enter the Eastern Section if not entering a team in the Halifax City League next winter. There is also believed to be a possibility of Dalhousie coming into the Conferences in other lines of sport.

Suggestion Not Adopted.

In an effort to rearrange the conference so as to preserve the balance and at the same time meet the views of Acadia the U. N. B. representation suggested that either King's or Nova Scotia Tech enter the Western Section leaving a place for Acadia in the Eastern. Both for Acadia in the Eastern. SUMMER HOCKEY TO BE PLAYED IN N. Y.

Tex Rickard Behind a Great Scheme for Sporting Arena — To Be in Long Island City.

New York, April 5—The Metropolitan area which nestled pro hockey to it in the introductory season here may set the fad of summer hockey battles.

The Metropolis is to have a new \$15,000,000 stadium in 1927. Tex Rickard one of the backers of the New York Hockey Club, announced that yesterday. He said the new arena would be available for the ice game, football, boxing, circuses, rodeos, and possibly baseball—the greatest of its kind on the Continent. He declared his ice-making plant could be put in operation when the temperature is 70 degrees in the shade and that he would be willing to stage hockey matches then if the players cared to perform.

The proposed stadium will likely be situated in Long Island City. Rickard declares the same interests that backed him in the new Madison Square Garden are behind him in the project.

SUZANNE TO MARRY SOON

Paris, April 5—Mlle. Suzanne Lenglen, woman tennis champion of the world, is engaged to be married. Her fiancé is Jacques Brindejones Offenbach, and he is not a tennis player, or even a fan, but a poet and critic—described as one of the best of the younger generation. He is a grandson of the famous composer, Offenbach, whose "Tales of Hoffman" is an operatic classic.

While the marriage will take place at an early date, it is not definitely known whether it will be before or after the Wimbledon tournament but it is understood that Mlle. Lenglen's entry in that tournament will stand in any case. Likewise it has not yet been decided whether she will continue to play tournament tennis after her marriage or definitely retire from the championship. The couple expect to make their home in Paris.


MONTREAL A. A. A. BEAT BROADVIEW
