## Of Interest to the Women

EVEN CONVICT STRIPES  
ARE FASHION INSPIRATION.

Knitted jumper frocks with accom-  
panying coats make a very practi-  
cal ensemble. Sometimes the blouse  
is of a jacquard pattern. Or the  
order may be reversed. Two tone  
effects very good. Very sheer  
sweaters of lacelike construction  
are on the market. Sheared wool  
clipped and dyed makes the best  
trimming for knitted coats.

If the sweater worn by golf  
enthusiasts at the various Southern  
resorts are a criterion, horizontal  
stripes have the day. These stripes  
are anywhere from an inch or less  
wide to a three or five inch width  
in some instances. Featuring a  
subtle color scheme such as rose  
and pink—or brown and beige.  
Fair Isle sweaters are also very  
popular, with stockings often match-  
ing the sweaters. Violent contrasts  
are for the most part avoided—the  
color range for sports being more  
of the dusty, or two-toned variety.

WINDOW SHOPPING  
ALONG FIFTH AVENUE.

The windows of Fifth avenue are  
always a sparkling colorful array—  
replete with fashion's latest whims  
and presented with artistry and wit.

The popular jumper mode is first  
revealed—in newer versions. The  
flaring jumper is shown in heavy  
crepe with bois de rose coloring de-  
corated with silver nail heads and  
silver braid. These blouses are  
rather longer than finger tip length  
with a circular or pleated flare  
placed at the bottom. Other jumper  
suits are of gayly printed silk, bel-  
ted with narrow colored suede.

The vogue for black taffeta is  
next confirmed. Net and lace are  
the featured embellishments with  
occasional splashes of colorful em-  
brodery.

### CINNAMON ROLLS.

Follow the recipe for hot-cross  
buns omitting the lemon rind and  
juice, also the currants. When the  
last flour is added to the mixture  
turn the dough on a floured board  
and knead until smooth and  
elastic. Return to the mixing bowl,  
cover and again set to rise until  
double in bulk. Again turn on a  
lightly floured board, knead slight-  
ly and roll out into a sheet one-  
fourth an inch thick; spread gener-  
ously with soft butter, sprinkle  
thickly with sugar and cinnamon  
sifted together, allowing one-third  
cup of sugar and one-half tablespoon  
of cinnamon. Roll like a jelly roll,  
cut off slices one-half inch thick,  
set them close together cut side  
down in a buttered dripping pan.  
Brush between rolls with melted  
butter, cover and set to rise. When  
light bake thirty minutes in a  
moderate oven; remove from the  
oven and brush over with the yolk  
of egg diluted with two tablespoons  
of milk. Return to the oven to  
brown; repeat to give them a glossy  
appearance.

The success of both the hot-cross  
buns and the cinnamon rolls de-  
pends largely on the care with  
which flour is added to the mixture  
the dough should be as soft as can  
be conveniently handled.

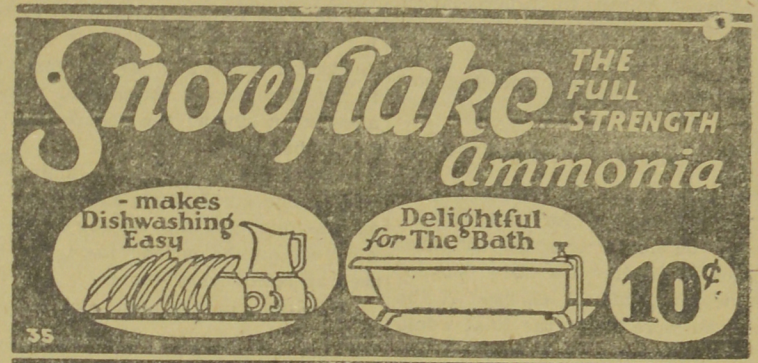

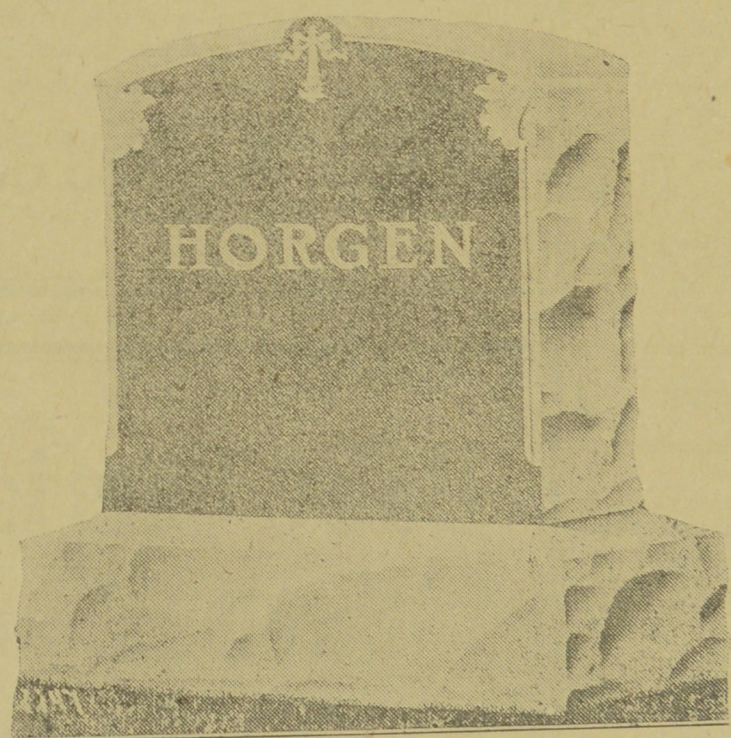

name can be cut in the apex instead of the little design shown. The prices quoted below are for the Monument  
Completely erected on a concrete foundation in Fredericton or vicinity. The sizes are for the diepiece or top  
stone and the bases are in proportion.

2-6x1-0x3-0 ..... \$200.00.  
2-4x1-0x2-9 ..... \$175.00.  
2-2x1-0x2-6 ..... \$150.00.

This Monument can be made in smaller sizes with 8 inch diepiece at proportionately lower prices; but
